Section 108 Study Group

- Independent group
- Convened by US Library of Congress/NDIIPP and US Copyright Office
- Goal: To re-examine exceptions for libraries in Section 108 and make recommendations for amending the law for the digital age

Section 108 Study Group

- 19 members, mostly from library/archives community and right holder community
- Report issued March 2008
- Report available at http://www.section108/gov.

Shortcomings of Current US Law

- No copying of published works in library's collection until damaged, deteriorating, lost, stolen or obsolete format
- 3-copy limit
- No copying for acquisition (creates problems for preserving internet content)

Recommendations

New exception for proactive preservation of at risk publicly disseminated works in library's collection

- Only for libraries qualified for digital preservation
- Must use best practices for digital preservation
- Must restrict access to preservation copies

Recommendations

New exception for preservation of publicly available internet content

- * publicly available=unrestricted
- * opt out by right holders permitted
- * library may allow on-premises access, and after a reasonable time, off-premises access

Recommendations

Recommended changes to existing replacement provision include:

- Changing 3-copy limit
- Adding "fragile" as a trigger

Recommendations re Eligibility

Add functional requirements

Museums should be eligible

 Use of outside contractors permitted, with restrictions to protect right holders

Section 108 Study Group: Recommendations/Open Areas

- Recommendations made on unanimous consensus basis
- They reflect concerns on all sides, and compromise
- Expanding exceptions in some areas may mean restricting, or at least not expanding, in others

Section 108 Study Group Report

- High level recommendations, open areas
- The report goes into detail about the concerns in various areas and why it was difficult to reach agreement.
- Many other recommendations

Section 108 Group Report: What's Next?

- Report was sent to the Copyright
 Office at the end of March.
- Copyright Office will review and decide how to move forward
 - May solicit additional input
 - Even in areas of agreement, open issues
 - Unlikely to propose legislation before 2009.
