#### **CONCLUSIONSBYTHECHAIR**

#### Introduction

- 1. ThefirstsessionoftheAdvisoryCommitteeonEnforcement(ACE)wasopenedby Mr. WolfgangStarein,Director,EnforcementandSpecialProjectsDivision,whowelcomed theparticipantsonbehalfoftheDirectorGeneralandalsoactedasSecretary.
- 2. The ACE unanimously elected, for one year, Mr. Henry Olsson, Special Government Adviser, Ministry of Justice, Sweden, as Chair.
- $\label{eq:thm:policy} 3. The Draft Agenda (Document WIPO/ACE/1/1) was adopted unanimously, as proposed. The ACE discussed administrative matters as well as its mandate and scope of activities on the basis of paragraphs 1 to 12 and 14 (i) of document WIPO/ACE/1/2. It also considered is suespertaining to the enforcement of intellectual property rights, coordination, training, and development of enforcement strategies and matters concerning the electronic exchange of information set out indocuments WIPO/ACE/1/3 to 5. Furthermore, the ACE discussed its future work and agreed on a themefor its next session in 2004, taking into account the proposal softhe Secretariat contained in paragraphs 13 and 14 (ii) of document WIPO/ACE/1/2. The results of the discussions are reflected in the Conclusions by the Chair, in paragraphs 4 to 22, below.$

#### ConclusionsbytheChair

4. The Members of the Committee expressed their great appreciation for the setting up of the Committee as a forum for discussion one n forcement matters, in particular as regards technical assistance and cooperation, while noting that norm - setting was excluded from the mandate.

- 5. The Committee agreed that the issue of enforcement of intellectual property rights is of greatimportance and that WIPO is in a minerally appropriate position to provide technical assistance and education and to contribute to the creation of awareness in this field.
- 6. The Committee noted the setting up of the Enforcement and Special Projects Division within the Secretaria tand the establishment of the Electronic Forum on Intellectual Property Issues and Strategies (the IPEIS For um) which, in the view of the Committee, provides an excellent mechanism for the exchange of information in this field.
- 7. TheCommitteeheardgeneralstatementsbytheGroupofLatinAmericanand CaribbeanStates(GRULAC)andGroupB.Bothsta tementssalutedtheestablishmentofthe Committeeandsaidthatitsworkwasconsideredimportant.TheGRULACstatementnoted furthermore, *interalia*, that,intheirview,theexclusionofnorm -settingimpliedthatthework oftheCommitteewouldcovert heimplementationofexistingobligationsinthefieldof enforcementandexcludedmeasuresofaprescriptivenatureandthattheissueofenforcement shouldbeseeninthebroadercontextsofsocietalinterestsandobligations.
- 8. TheCommitteadoptedtheproposalsinparagraphs1to12ofdocument WIPO/ACE/1/2.PendingtheoutcomeoffurtherinformalconsultationstheCommittee decidedtodeferthedecisionsontheadmissionoftheEuropeanCommunitiesasanon -voting MemberoftheCommittee andoftheCivilSocietyCoalitionasanObserver,onthe understandingthattherequestswouldbetakenupattheearliestopportunity.Mentionwas,in thatcontext,madeoftheneedfortheinvolvementofthewidestpossiblenumberof stakeholders.
- 9. Following a comprehensive discussion on the subject, the Committee agreed that the document entitled WIPO/CME/3 which was annexed to document WIPO/ACE/1/3 should be considered purely as a source of information to serve as background for the discussion on future work under Agendaitem 6.
- 10. The Committee took note of the comments and remarks made by Member States and Observers. It noted with particular satisfaction the considerable number of WIPO expert missions, training and study visit sands eminars and workshops, as well as other activities mentioned indocument WIPO/ACE/1/4, and encouraged WIPO to continue to include enforcement is sue sinit sactivities, both in the context of Cooperation for Development and in other contexts, such a stheoner elated to Small and Medium Sized Enterprises (SMEs). As in the past, cooperation should, in the view of the Committee, be sought both with other intergovernmental organizations (such as the World Trade Organization (WTO), the World Customs Organization (WCO), the World Health Organization (WHO), the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), and regional organizations) and with non -governmental organizations, some of which have a considerable experience in enforcement is sues.
- 11. The Committee expressed its great appreciation for the activities carried out in the framework of the IPEIS Forum as being a particularly appropriate to olfor exchange of information and experience in the field of enforcement.
- 12. TheCommitteeagreedgenerallywiththeproposalscontainedinparagraph8of documentWIPO/ACE/1/5.Thus,workingdocumentsshouldbepostedontheForumonlyin theirfinalform,andparticipationintheForum wouldnolongerberestricted;registration

wouldnolongerberequiredasapre -conditionforaccesstotheForum. Also, the WIPO websitewould provide a link to the Forum.

- 13. The Committee encouraged the Secretariattos tructure theinform ation available on the Forumin such a way that the different categories of information could be easily accessible and searchable.
- 14. The Committee agreed with the suggestion made by the Secretariatto the effect that it encouraged Member States to invite officials, in particular from enforcement agencies and intellectual property of fices, to submit information for publication on the Forum.
- 15. Inaccordancewiththeproposalsinparagraph9ofthedocumentatissue,theopinion wasexp ressedthattheSecretariatshouldbearnoresponsibilityforthecontentsorthe accuracyoftheinformationposted.AsregardstherightoftheSecretariattodecideona case-by-casebasiswhetherinformationsubmittedshouldbeexcludedfrompublicati onin wholeorinpartoronlybepublishedinamendedorneutralform,theopinionwasexpressed thatthatoptionshouldbeusedinaprudentway.
- 16. The Committee agreed with the principle of a thematic approach as proposed by the Secretariat in paragraph 13 of document WIPO/ACE/1/2.
- 17. TheCommitteediscussedthemespertainingtotheenforcementofintellectualproperty rightstobeaddressedinfuturemeetings,includingthefivethemessuggestedbythe Secretariatinparagraph13 ofdocumentWIPO/ACE/1/2.Italsonotedanddiscussedthe considerablenumberofthemessuggestedbyMemberStates.Somesupport,aswellas reservations,wasexpressedforthethemesraisedduringthemeeting.Remarksweremade andclarificationssough t.TheCommitteenotedtheremarksandclarificationsofferedby variousspeakers.TheCommitteeagreedthatthesuggestedthemesandthequestionoftheir priorityshouldbethesubjectofafurtherandmorecomprehensivediscussionanddecisionat the nextmeetingoftheCommittee.TheCommitteeinvitessubmissionsbyinterestedparties inthisregard.
- 18. InaccordancewithasuggestionbytheSecretariat,thenextmeetingoftheAdvisory Committeewouldincludepresentationsontheroleof thejudiciaryandquasi-judicial authorities,aswellasofprosecution,inenforcementactivities(includingrelatedissuessuch aslitigationcosts).
- 19. Furthermore, the Committee encouraged the relevant stakeholders to provide the Secretaria twithin formation about their experiences, including those pertaining to national enforcement strategies.
- 20. The Committee noted the views expressed on the option of having meetings of the committee outside of Geneva. There was, however, no con sensus on this issue.
- 21. The Committee noted the various specific practical issues raised by Member States in the course of the discussion, such as the one sraised by the Delegation of India on enforcement by customs authorities. Those is sues a reor will be published on the IPEIS website (<a href="https://www.wipo.int/ipeis/">www.wipo.int/ipeis/</a>) for discussion and will be kept in mindin the future work of the Committee.

- 22. The Committee noted are quest by the Delegation of Saudi Arabia, supported by some other Delegations, that working documents be prepared in Arabic. The Secretaria tresponded that a decision had been taken that the documents would be available in English, French and Spanish but that the matter will be submitted to the Assembly for consideration.
  - 23. The Committee adopted the Conclusions by the Chair, set out in paragraphs 2 to 22, above.
