INPI and South-South Cooperation

Between **2012 and 2017**, **Brazil** maintained a **Cooperation Agreement** with **WIPO** to expand the capacity of developing countries to use intellectual property instruments.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs coordinated and monitored the agreement. The INPI was responsible to execute the activities. The WIPO participated in the design, programming, monitoring and evaluation of activities, in addition to the management of financial resources through a Fund-in-Trust (FIT).

During the period, the **Brazilian government invested around US\$410,000**, which resulted in activities such as: Courses for Latin American Patent Examiners; Workshops on Technology Transfer to Mercosur countries; Trademark Examiner Training for Portuguese-Speaking African Countries and a Regional Workshop on Free and Open Software Tools for Patent Analysis.



INPI and DA Projects

Since the creation of CDIP, Brazil has benefited from 5 projects – 2 already completed and 3 in the implementation phase.

Among these ongoing projects, INPI is participating in two:

- Registration of the Collective Marks of Local Enterprises as a Cross-Cutting Economic Development Issue
- Empowering Small Businesses Through IP: Developing Strategies for Supporting Geographical Indications or Collective Marks in the Post-registration Period





Partnerships

DAs projects implemented in Brazil adopt an institutional alliance approach.

The projects have a national team structured as follows:

Ministry of Foreign Affairs – Coordination

INPI – Technical aspects of intellectual property

Brazilian Support Service for Micro and Small Enterprises – Promotion of competitiveness, technical improvement and entrepreneurship





National Innovation System



The project was proposed by Bolivia and approved by CDIP in November 2019. In addition to **Brazil** and **Bolivia**, the project is also being implemented in **Tunisia** and the **Philippines**.

Specific Outputs:

- Scope study;
- Workshops with consultants;
- Elaboration and adoption of rules for the use of the collective mark;
- Creation of a logo;
- Registration of the collective mark;
- Launch event.

General Outputs:

- Practical guide on the development, registration and use of collective marks;
- Awareness material promotional brochure and video.



Tefé, Amazonas, Brazil









- The beneficiary of the project is the Association of Agroextractive Producers of the National Forest of Tefé (APAFE).
- The association was created in 2003 and it has around 420 producers.
- They produce foodstuffs of plant origin: manioc flour, nuts, oils and honey.

New Alliances

Throughout the project, other institutions joined the initiative.

Mamirauá Sustainable Development Institute - works for the economic and social development of amazon communities, taking into account the conservation and sustainable use of the region's biodiversity.

Chico Mendes Institute for Biodiversity Conservation - manages, protects, inspects and monitors the federal government's Environmental Conservation Units.

Trademark application filed in the INPI in February 2022.

GI Project

The project was an initiative of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and it had the support of INPI and SEBRAE in its elaboration. CDIP approved the proposal in November 2021. The initiative will benefit four countries — **Algeria, Brazil, Pakistan and Uganda** — over a three-year period.

Expected Outputs:

- Study on challenges after registration;
- Strategies, guides or training material developed to strengthen the collective management of GI;
- Workshops and training activities;
- Control and certification systems developed and implemented;
- Branding and commercialization strategy;
- Awareness raising activities and material.

The next step is selection by WIPO. The GIs nominated by the Brazilian national team were:

Aroeira Honey from North of Minas
