INTRODUCTION

1. InSeptember2000, the twenty -sixthsession of the General Assembly of WIPO, approved the proposal by the International Bureautorealign and refocus certain planned WIPO activities as well as create a substantial new program of activities focusing on the intellectual property -related needs of small and medium -sized enterprises (SMEs), including micro-enterprises. The proposal hinged on the recognition that the reiso ften as ignificant discrepancy between SMEs' im portant contribution to the economy and their low use of the intellectual property system and that more should be done to promote the use of the intellectual property (IP) system by SMEs to improve their competitiveness. To implement the decision of the General Assembly, the Director General of WIPO created the SMEs Division in October 2000.

I.SMALLANDMEDIUM -SIZEDENTERPRISES ANDINTELLECTUALPROPERTY

- 2. SMEsinAsiaandthePacificregionrepresentanimportantengineofgrowth.Over 95% ofthetotalnumberofenterprisesfallunderthenationaldefinitionsofSMEs ¹employing between40% and80% oftheworkforce.EstimatesoftheircontributiontonationalGDP varybetween30% to60%.Accordingtoarecentstudythatfocusedonasel ectedgroupof8 non-OECDAsiancountries,SMEsaccountedfor35% of direct exports. The figure compares favorably to SMEs in the OECD region where the contribution to direct exports is estimated at 26%. ²
- 3. Availablestudies/researchontheus eoftheIPsystembySMEsworldwidearelargely limitedtotheuseofthepatentsystem. Thisempiricalevidencepaintsapictureinwhichthe propensitytoapplyforpatentsishighlyrelatedtothesizeofthecompany. Forexample, a recentDerwent study, surveying theuseoftheIPsystembySMEsintheEuropeanUnion, concludes that aminority of European SMEs filepatent applications. According to the survey, the most wides preadre as on sforn ot patenting are that (1) patents are not considered relevant to the line of business of the company, and (2) the patent system is to ocostly and complex. An UK study concluded that small business owners placed most emphasis on informal methods of protection of their intellectual property (i.e. lead -time, relationships based on trust, limited information sharing, etc.) rather than on formal registrable IP rights.

- 4. IftheliteratureontheuseoftheIPsystembySMEsinEuropeisscarce,itisevenmore soinmanyotherregionsoftheworld,i ncludingAsiaandthePacific.Oneofthecrucial problemsisthelackofdisaggregateddataonpatent,trademarkandindustrialdesign applicationsbySMEs,orbydifferenttypesofSMEs.AlthoughinmanyAsiancountries, particularlytheNewlyIndust rializedEconomies(NIEs),dataonresidentpatentapplications areevidenceofanincreaseinoverallpropensitytopatent,thereislittleindicationastothe contributionofSMEstotheincreaseinpatentapplications.IntheRepublicofKorea,oneof thefewcountriesforwhichdisaggregateddatahasbeencompiled,itisestimatedthat25.3% ofapplicationsforIPrightsarefromSMEs. ⁵ArecentsurveyinHongKong,China,onpublic awarenessofintellectualproperty,providessomeevidenceoftheove ralllowlevelof awarenessofintellectualpropertyissuesinthepopulationatlarge.
- 5. TheuseoftheintellectualpropertysystembySMEsisgenerallyhighlyrelatedtotheir levelofinnovativeandtechnologicalcapacity.Inthisrespec t,asinmanyothers,SMEsare anextremelyheterogeneousgroup.Theirinnovativecapacityandabilitytodevelopnewand innovativeproductsvariessignificantly,basedontheirsector,size,focus,resourcesandthe businessenvironmentinwhichtheyo perate.Incertainhigh -technologysectors,suchas semiconductorsandbiotechnology,innovativeSMEshavebeenakeytothegrowthand dynamismofthesesectors.Insuchsectors,patentingactivityiscomparativelymuchhigher thaninothersectors.

ArecentOECDpaperdividesSMEsintheEuropeanUnionintothreebroadgroups:

- i) Technologydevelopers(representing1 -3% of the total SME population).
- ii) Leadingtechnologyusers(ofvaryingR&Dcapacity,whichare10 -15% of SMEs).
- iii) Technologyfollowers(totalingbetween80 -85% of SMEs) ⁷.
- 6. Whilethepercentagesmaybedifferentincountriesofthe Asia and the Pacific region, a similar categorization may be useful as an analytical tool. The heterogeneity of SMEs in terms of their ability to innovate and to incorporate existing technology is reflected in the ways that such enterprises may use and be nefit from the intellectual property system. The crucial point is that SMEs of varying sizes and levels of technology may be nefit from different aspects of the intellectual property system according to their specific needs and technological capacity.
- 7. WhilethemostinnovativeSMEsmay,as"technologydevelopers, "beparticularly interestedinobtaining patent protection or their inventions, SMEs using leading technology available on the market may prefer to use patent information to identify such technology and

toenterintoagreementsonthelicensingofpatentedtechnologyandknow -how.Forthe largegroupof"technol ogyfollowers,"tradeandservicemarks,includingcollectivemarks and certification marks, as well as geographical indications and industrial designs are indispensablemeansfordeveloping and communicating their distinctive image and identity, and ford ifferentiating their products and services from those of their competitors. In other words, these SMEs rely on developing attractive designs and other creative means to helptheminmarketingtheirproductsandservicestocustomers. Differenttypes of **SMEsrelyto** avaryingdegreeonthecopyrightandrelatedrightssystemfortheirexistence, marketing and/orbusinesssuccess,especiallyinthecopyright/culturalindustriessector.Safeguarding theirtradesecrets(confidentialbusinessinformationo fcommercialvalue)isoftenacrucial asicknowledgeof,andsimplifiedaccessto.the concernformanySMEs.Therefore.ab intellectual property system by SME owners and managers will allow them to make sensibledecisionsaboutwhichelementsoftheIP systemtouse, based on a proper cost analysis and to the possibility of using the IP system to meet their needs. In other words, the natureandextentofuseoftheIPsystemshouldbeaninformeddecision,basedonaproper understandingofthe IPsystem, and not on vague perceptions and mythsorfear of the unknown.

II.WIPO'SSTRATEGYFORSMES

8. Giventheincreasingimportanceofnewandoriginalknowledgeinremainingaheadof thecompetition, WIPO's strategy for assisting SMEs worldwide has a clear and over arching objective: to enhance their competitiveness through a wider and more effective use of the intellectual property system. In this respect, the Milan Plan of Action (see Annex 1), has established a clear direction for future initiatives. It simple mentation requires working towards the achievement of two mains used to be objectives: a) to promote a wareness in order to enable SME stomake informed decisions concerning how to fully exploit their innovative and creative potential through an effective use of the IP system and b) to improve the policy framework and business environment to make it conductive and easier for SME stouse the IP system.

Inordertoachievetheabove -mentionedobjectives, WIPO's SME strategy focuses on 6 main pillars:

- i) <u>Targetinganewaudience</u>: bringingintellectual property is sue stobusinesse vents, articles and interviews in business magazines, building IP component in innovation promotion programs for SMEs and intraining programs for entrepreneurs, etc;
- ii) <u>CreatingsimpleSME -friendlymaterialonIP</u>:drafting,publishingandassistingin thepreparationofpromotionalandtrainingmaterialforSMEs,includingwebsites, brochures,IPguidesandtrainingmanuals;
- iii) <u>Focusingonnewareas</u>: expanding WIP O'straditional activities to neware as such as intellectual property and financing, IP and taxation, IP services within publicly and privately provided Business Development Services (BDS);

- iv) <u>Gatheringandprovidinginformation</u>:collectinganddisseminatin ginformationon "bestpractices" by institutions assisting SME stomake an effective use of the IP system; collecting and disseminating information on case studies of SME susing the IP system; conducting and commissioning research on IP is sue so frelevanc eto SMEs;
- v) <u>Establishingnewpartnerships</u>:expandingthenetworkofpartnerstoincludeSME associations, chambers of commerce, government SME supportinstitutions and other relevant publicand privates er vice providers for SMEs; and
- $vi) \underline{Strengthening outrea\ chactivities of IP of fices} \ : working together with national and regional IP of fices to strengthen their outreach activities for SMEs.$
- 9. AttheheartofWIPO'sstrategyforSMEsistheconvictionthatintellectualproperty representsanimportan ttoolforthedevelopmentofadynamicandcompetitivesmalland medium-sizedenterprisessector. This conviction goeshandinhand with the understanding that WIPO's objective requires dove tailing of IPpolicies for SMEs with a widerange of policies in an umber of other areas a imedat promoting the development of a vibrant SME sector. A strategy that seeks to promote the use of the IP system by SMEs should therefore promote the inclusion of IP is sues within the overall frame work of assistance and support for SMEs provided by government in stitutions, NGOs, chambers of commerce, international organizations, SME associations, business consultants and other institutions.
- 10. WIPO's strategy, therefore, requires a strong network of cooperation withpartnersat thelocal,national,regionalandinternationallevel. This is an ecessity not only due to the nature of the objectives and the sheer number of SMEs worldwide, but also is a direct implicationofWIPO'sstrategyofaddressingtheissuef romthebroaderperspectiveof promoting the development and competitiveness of SMEs in a holistic framework. As a result, WIPO is focussing on assisting Member States and their various institutions involvedinsupportingSMEsinintegratingintellectual propertyaspectsintheformulationand implementation of programs, policies and activities for strengthening the competitive position of SMEs in the market place. As such, WIPO seeks to work closely with national and regionalIPofficesfordevelopment oftheiroutreachactivitiesandwithSMEsupport institutionsforbuildingtheirIP -relatedcapacityinvariousways, suchasthroughawareness raising events and publications, practical guidance through workshops and by including IP related contentindi fferent types of guides for SMEs, and various other types of assistance on IPmatters. Activities are generally demand -drivenand, wherever possible, a "training the trainers" approachistakentomaximizeresults from events. This approach has been followed, for instance, in India where WIPO contributed to developing an IPR awarenesscampaigntogetherwiththeMinistryforSmall ScaleIndustriesthroughaseriesof16 seminarsinasmanyIndiancities.WIPO'sSMEsDivisionparticipateddirectlyinthe first two seminars and as sisted in the overall planning and structure of the remaining 14 events.
- 11. CrucialtoWIPO'sstrategyconcerningSMEsistopresenttheutilityoftheIPsystem fromtheperspectiveofthebusinesscommunity. Insee kingtoaddresstheintellectual propertyneedsandconcernsofSMEs;thefirststepistoassesstheoverallneedsand constraintsfacedbySMEsintheirbusinessactivities,inordertoidentifywaysinwhichthe intellectualpropertysystemmayassistt heminaddressingthoseneedsandconcerns. The focusis, therefore, on how an IPstrategy can be an effective part of the overall business

strategyoftheSMEsforenablingittofacesomeoftheircommonbusinesschallenges, includingraisingfinances, increasingthemarketvalueofthefirm,marketingproductsand services,findingpartnersandsuppliers,exporting,acquiringtechnology,facilitatingbusiness transactionsontheInternet.etc.

A. TheSMEsWebSite

OneofWIPO'smajori nitialactivitieswasthecreationofanSMEwebsite, asadistinct partofWIPO'smainwebsite. The section on IP for Business on the SME's website explainsbasicIPissuesinrelationtosomepracticalbusinessconcernsinasimple, business friendlylanguage. The websiteal ready has over a hundred pages of substantive information and advice, in addition to full text of some very useful documents and links to gether parts of WIPO'swebsiteoroutsidelinkstovariousissuesofinteresttoSMEentrpreneurs, managers, investors and business consultants. Through the content on the website, the $SMEs Division of WIPO seeks to reach out to the largest number of SMEs and SME support \cite{Matter SMEs} and \c$ institutionsinalow -costandreader -friendlymanner.Itallowsrea derstorapidlyselectthe informationtheyareinterestedinandhavetheoptiontofollowlinksformoredetailed discussions of certain issues. Finally, publication on the Internet gives the possibility to updateinformationregularlyandmaintainrea dersinformedofthelatestevents. The disadvantage related to such an endeavor is the limited access and spread of the Internet in the contraction of the contractimanycountriesandthereforetheinabilitytoreachouttoalargenumberofpotentialusersin committedtoprovidingpapercopiesofthematerialavailable SMEs.WIPOistherefore therein, including documents, presentations and IP guidestoenter prises and institutions requesting the information in paper format. ACD -ROM, with a search function, containing thefullcon tentoftheSMEswebsite,inthreelanguages(English,FrenchandSpanish),is presentlyunderpreparation.

13. TheoverallaimsoftheSMEwebsiteareasfollows:

- a) ToprovideanoverviewofthemainreasonswhySMEsshouldconsiderIPiss ues whenpreparingtheirbusinessplansandstrategies;
- b) Toofferpracticalinformationonhowtoprotect,manage,license,andenforcea company's IP assets and how to deal with IP issues ine -commerce;
- c) Todisseminateinformationon"bestpractices "aimedatassistingSMEstousethe IPsystemand"casestudies"oncompaniesthathavebenefitedfromasoundIP strategy;and
- d) ToprovideinformationontheSME -relatedactivitiesofWIPOingeneral,andof theSMEsDivisioninparticular.
- 14. Giventheinternationalnatureoftheinformationprovided, thereissignificantscope for nationalcustomizationoradaptationoftherelevant contenton the SMEs website based on the national legal and institutional system. WIPO encourages nationa li Poffices and other SMEs upport and financing institutions to use the material and adaptitac cording to the needs of national entrepreneurs, and is willing to provide advice, guidance and/or other support in this respect.

15. The SMEs websit eiscurrently available in English, Spanish and Frenchat www.wipo.int/sme/and partsofit in Chinese, Arabicand Russian.

B. Collectionof"BestPractices"

- 16. TheSMEsDivisionofWIPOalsoseekstocollec tinformationonpolicies,programs, and activities of a range of national institution sto assist SMEstouse the IP system effectively. In May June 2001, the International Bureau of WIPOs entaquestion naire to IP of fices, focal points on SMEs withing vernments, chambers of commerce and anumber of other institutions (primarily SME associations and incubators) requesting information on the activities conducted by each institution related to the initiative stobe under taken under the Milan Plan of Action. The information was gathered with a view to compiling "best practices" and allow for wider information sharing and exchange of experiences among and within countries (see Annex III). Additional information on other such best practices from a round the world would be put on the website of the SMEs Division of WIPO and when it is made available; all concerned are, therefore, requested to help the SMEs Division of WIPO in this process.
- 17. Repliestoquestionnairesreflectawiderangeofin itiativesinthisareaaimedeither directlyattheSMEscommunityorhavinganimpactonbringingtheIPsystemcloserto SMEs.Initiativeshavebeengroupedintosixbroadcategories.Thefollowingisanon exhaustivelistofthetypesofactivities thatwerementioned:

The WIPO Milan Forum on Intellectual Property and Small an d Medium Sized Enterprises, having metin Milan on February 9 and 10,2001, at the invitation of the Italian Government and the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) to address the issue of enhancing the competitiveness of small and medium - sized enterprises (SMEs) through optimal use of the intellectual property system,

recognizing that SMEs playavital role in employment creation, investment and exports, significantly contributing to national economic growth;

*noting*thatSMEs,theworldover ,are proven innovators with greater eative capacity and the driving force behind many technological advances;

takingintoaccount that SMEs arean heterogeneous group with many differences according to business sector, capital assets, working capital, te chnological capacity and intellectual property assets;

considering that SMEs, through a dequate and effective management and commercialization of intellectual property (IP), can significantly enhance their competitiveness, export opportunities, markets har eand their overall market value;

realizing that SME scansignificantly benefit from the wealth of technological information available in patent databases, thus avoiding duplication of research and development (R&D) efforts, and use such information for he development of new products, process and services and the conclusion of license agreements;

beingaware that SMEs, in particular indeveloping and least -developed countries, often do not sufficiently exploit the potential of the IP system for increasing their competitiveness, innovative capacity and market access;
