

### CanOpener

Mr. Sungho ChoofBong -ChungIndustryLtd.was struckbyanideawhenhiswifehurthernailwhile tryingtoopenabeveragecan. Hisideawastoputthe elasticsteelplateundertheopenerandtoformagap betweencanandopenerbypressingthesteelplate.

Mr.Chowasgrantedpatentsinmorethan60countries. Proposalsforlicensingarerushingfromhomeand abroad.

Case1:Successinpatentinganidearelatingtodailylife

### **LightingBallpointPen**

Mr. Dongwhan Kimgotanideaonenightwhenhesaw atrafficpolicemanwritingwhilestrugglingtokeepa flashlightbetweenhisshoulderandneck. Heinvented aballpointpenwithfluorescentmaterialatitstip.

Henowreceivesroyaltiestotaling7milliondollars everyyear.

Thesetwocasesarefrequentlycitedduringthe Campaignasexamples of IPRs createdby ordinarypeople.

### **Case3:Loanbypatentsecurity**

Ceratech Ltd.,amanufacturerofinductorsfor computers,neededmoneyurgentlyforfacility investmenttocopewithasharpincreaseinexport demand.

Thecompanyborrowed1milliondollarsonthe securityof11patentrights, which resulted in successfully extending the scope of its business.

IPRs canbeusedasasecurityincaseswhere thereisnotangibleobjectforasecurity.

### Case4:IPRmanagementthrougharetiredprofessor

Sang-a frontech, amanufacturer of an overheat preventing device formic rowave ovens, was accused of an infringement of a patent by a Japanese company.

Sang-a frontech wonthecasesinceithademployed aretiredprofessoranddesignedthedeviceavoidingthe infringementofpatents.

Precautionarymeasurewithlowcostssaved thecompanyacriticaltime.

### **Case5:HuntingforarelevantIPR**

Ilkyung IndustriesLtd.boughtapatentfroman individualinventor.Thetechnologywasrelatedtoa shock-reducingdevicethatuseswastetires.

- a\$25,000lump -sumandaroyaltyof5%ofsales

Thiscompanyisdoinggoodbusinessbysellinga lotoftheproductsnationwide.

HuntingforarelevantIPRcouldbeakeyfor raisingcompetitiveness.

### Case6:AnIPRasasourceofincome

CompanyLgotapatentforanantibioticbutwas unabletocommercializeitduetoapoorlyequipped facility.

Ittransferredthepatentto" Glaxo"UKfora\$15 milliondollarlump -sumpaymentandaroyaltyof7% ofsales.

Case7: Creating demand via Int 'l Invention Fairs

Thefollowingcompaniescreatedhugedemand bywinningprizesinInternationalInventionFairs.

- Ivex (cosmetics):3goldprizes
- Cheong-Pung (airpurifier):11goldprizes

ParticipationinInt 'IlnventionFairsisaneffective meansofshowingtechnicalinnovation, demonstrating thebenefitsandattractingprospectivecustomers/users.

### Case8: Tacitpermission of patentin fringement

Sinoo WatersLtd.,atoiletbowlmanufacturer,had tacitlypermittedtheinfringementofapatentofa competingcompany.

Itmadealicensingcontractonlyafterstandardization hadoccurredinthemarketandthedemandhadleveled.

Cooperationwithacompetitortoreduce publicityactivityandstandardizationcosts.

### LessonsfromtheCampaign

### Tobetterassist SMEs in IPR management,

PatentOfficemustplayacentralrole, cooperatewithR&D -relatedgovernmentalentities, raisetheIPRawarenessamonggovernmentofficials, attract SMEs tothebenefitsof IPRs inbusinessand build-upIPservicesystems,includingpost -registration system.
