Nepal Kirat Kulung Bhasha Sanskriti Utthan Sangh (Association of Nepal Kirat Kulung Language and Cultural Development) is an autonomous, and representative organization of Kulung community at the national level. It has been formally registered with the District Administration Office, Sunsari under the social Act of His Majesty's Government of Nepal (HMGN) in 1993 (2049 BS).

The Association of Nepal Kirat Kulung Language and Cultural Development (ANKKLCD) has been working for social and economic development as well as for the linguistic and cultural development of the Kulung community since its inception. Its central office is located at Panchkanya-5, Dharan with a branch office in Kathmandu (Basanteshor Gully, Dillibazar). It also has district committee offices at six districts (Solukhumbu, Sakhuwasabha, Sunsari, Morang, Jhapa and Kathmandu) and 18 village committees in different districts.

Association of Nepal Kirat Kulung Language Culture Development is the representative organization of Kulung community at the national level. Within the Kulung community, there are a lot ancient traditional intellectual properties. The Kulungs are one of the indigenous communities of Nepal, having their own language, culture, history and traditional skills and knowledge.

They have their own social structure for their whole social life cycle. But due to the discriminatory policy adopted by the past government, the Kulung community is marginalised from all development spheres. Accordingly their language, culture and traditional knowledge, skills are in shadow. Many of the knowledge and skills in the verge of extinction together with language, cultures.

ANKKLCD is making effort to protect and promote the traditional knowledge, skills and cultures. I would like to share the situation of Kulung community including its intellectual property matters.

I'm interested to learn intellectual property matters; I have not formal knowledge about it. Just I have been advocating of intellectual property on the basis of my informal knowledge.

Country in which the Organization is primarily active:

Association of Nepal Kirat Kulung Language and Cultural Development has been mainly working in Solukhumbu, Sakhuwasava, Bhojpur, Sunsari, Morang, Taplejung, Ilam, Terhathum, Dhankutta and Udyapur districts where the population of indigenous Kulung community is over 60%. Those districts are situated in the remote area of eastern part of Nepal which called as kingdom of mountains and hills.

<u>Additional Information</u>: Please provide any additional information which you feel may be relevant (maximum 150 words)

The Kulungs have their own social structure for their whole social life cycle. They are endogamous in particular. It has its own economic activities within the group prior to the modernization. Their traditional land is "Mahakulung" which falls under one of the remotest part of the country. Presently Mahakulung is known as Bung, Chheskam, Gudel and Sotang VDCs which is in Solukhumbu district in the eastern part of Nepal. At present, the Kulung communities are living in 22 districts of Nepal. However, the major settlements are found in Solukhumbu, Sankhuwasabha, Bhojpur, Khotang, Sunsari, Morang, Jhapa, Ilam, Tehrathum and Kathmandu. The total estimated population of the Kulungs in the region ranges from 150,000 to 200,000.

Kulung community is one of the most marginalised ethnic groups in the country. As this community resides in the remote hilly areas, the basic infrastructures and services like motor roads, electricity, clean drinking water, education, communication and health services are not available to them. The majority of the Kulungs are depended on traditional agricultural practices. Due to the unproductive land conditions, they are not able to produce adequate food from their farms. They do not have education and therefore have no access to productive resources and decision making process. They are compelled to migrate in search of jobs of porter and agriculture labourers for their livelihood.

After the restoration of multi-party democracy in Nepal, the government has established National Foundation for Development of Indigenous Nationalities (NFDIN) under the NFDIN Act-2058 with the aim of mainstreaming the marginalised ethnic groups. The NFDIN, an autonomous body is established under the Ministry of Local Development being registered as a separate group under the special programmes for the development of indigenous nationalities chaired by the Prime Minister.

The Kulung community has adequate basis for being listed in the list as per the NFDIN Act-2058. But has been denied registration to establish its identity as the "Kulung Community" due to which, the Kulung community has been continuously deprived of the development opportunities. The ANKKLCD is continuously making efforts towards its solution.
