LOVERVIEW

- 1. Atitsthirdsession,inJune2002,theIntergovernmentalCommitteeonIntelle ctual PropertyandGeneticResources,TraditionalKnowledgeandFolklore("theCommittee") adoptedaproposalforenhancedtechnicalcooperationonthelegalprotectionofexpressions offolkloreatthenationallevel.Theproposalincludedregularreport ingontechnical cooperationundertakenbytheSecretariat.Thisdocumentisthefirstsuchreport.
- 2. TheSecretariathasprovidedawiderangeoftechnicalcooperationonthistopic, throughmanyworkshopsandmeetings, expertandfact -findingmissions, legislative drafting and advice, education and training, and the provision of equipment. This includes activities specifically focus sed on the legal protection of expressions of folklore (including those dealing with the overlapping area of training additional knowledge), and more general activities which address this is sue along with other areas of intellectual property. Indeed, due to the strong expressions of interest in this area by Member States, most recent national and regional meetings ongene ralint ellectual property them eshave addressed this area in some way.
- 3. Thispaperseekstorecordtheactivitiesthathavebeenundertakeninthisarea, approximatelysincetheCommitteewasestablished.Thisisanillustrativelistonly,an notincludeeveryrelevantactivityundertakenbytheSecretariat.Itdemonstratesthe

continuingstronginterestinpracticalandpolicyissuesinrelationtotheprotectionoffolklore and expressions of traditional culture, as a distinct set of neds and expectations, in the context of the increased attention recently paid to broader traditional knowledge and related genetic resources is sues.

II.BACKGROUND

4. The FinalReportonNationalExperienceswiththeLegalProtectionofExpr essionsof Folklore (documentWIPO/GRTKF/IC/3/10)wasconsideredbytheCommitteeatitsthird sessioninJune2002.TheCommitteeapprovedthefollowingtaskproposedinthereport:

Enhancedlegal -technicalassistancefortheestablishment, strengthenin gandeffective implementation of existing systems and measures for the legal protection of expressions of folklore at the national level.

- 5. Aspartofthistask,itwasproposedthattheWIPOSecretariatprovidebriefreportsto theCommittee onrelevantworkithasundertaken.
- 6. Thelegalprotectionofexpressionsoffolklore,togetherwiththerelatedareasof traditionalknowledge(TK)andintellectualproperty(IP)aspectsofgeneticresources,isa subjectofgreatcurrentinte restonthepartofMemberStates,intergovernmental organizations,non -governmentalorganizationsandotherstakeholders. Asaresult,many activitiesonIPmoregenerally,suchassymposiums,seminars,conferencesandadvisory missionsundertakenbythe WIPOSecretariatnowincludefolkloreandTKasatopic. These moregeneralactivitiesarenotreportedoninthisdocument. ArecentoverviewofWIPO's overallprogramofcooperationfordevelopmenthasbeenprovidedindocument PCIPD/3/3 ("CooperationforDevelopmentActivities:StrategicHighlights").
- Technical cooperation activities are undertaken at the request of the Member States concerned. The WIPOS ecretaria thas received a number of requests for specific forms of legal-technical assistance, directly relevant to the approved task, including in the normal course of WIPO's program of cooperation for development. To ensure that this first reportgivesarepresentativepictureofthekindsoflegal -technicalassistancethathavebeen requested, it covers activities undertaken by the Secretariats ince 2000, they ear in which the CommitteewasestablishedbyMemberStates.Itgivesanillustrativelist,andmaynotcover allactivitieswhichhavesomerelevancetothisarea,including thosewhichdealwiththe overlapbetweenIPprotectionandtheprotectionoffolklore.Forexample,theWIPO Performances and Phonograms Treaty (WPPT) stipulates that the rights of performers extendtothosewhoperformexpressionsoffolklore -henceas sistanceprovided with the implementation of the WPPT may be considered relevant to the protection of folklore, but it is a considered relevant to the protection of the transfer of the protection of the transfer ofnotcoveredinthisreport.
- 8. Theactivitiesmentionedinthisreportillustratethewidevarietyofrequestsfor assistanceinrelationtoexpressionsoffolkloreandtraditionalknowledgefromalmostall regionsoftheworld. The WIPOS ecretariatattempts to comply with all requests received, but cannot always do so due to budget ary and human resource constraints. Request sfor information and legal -technical cooperation and technical advice are received not only from Member Stategovernments, but also from other intergovernmental and non -governmental organizations (NGOs).

III.REPORTONACTIVITIES

- 9. Theacti vitiesarelistedunderthefollowinggeneralcategories:

<u>SpecificWorkshopsandMeetings</u>

- 10. The fact finding missions conducted in 1998 and 1999 identified national and sub-regional workshops for Government of ficials, Indigenous peoples and traditional communities and other stakeholders as a primary need. Since the establishment of the Intergovernmental Committee in September 2000, there has been an increased demand for such works hops. The workshops have taken an integral approach to providing technical assistance, and under taking consultations on the substantive is sue sconsidered by the Committee, so that the work of the Committee is informed by as broad a range of stakeholder input as possible.
- 11. Themainobjectivesoftheworkshopsareto:(i) provideMemberStates,Indigenous andlocalcommunities,relevantorganizationsandotherstakeholderswithaforumwherethey canconsiderandreflectonthetechnical,legal andpolicydimensionsoftheissuesthatarise inthecontextofthemandateoftheIntergovernmentalCommitteeand,(ii) ensurethatStates, Indigenouspeoplesandlocalcommunities,andotherstakeholdershaveaclearideaofthe workandmandateofthe IGC,sothattheymaycontributetoitsdeliberationsinaneffective way.WIPOhasfinancedtheparticipationofGovernmentofficialsfromdevelopingcountries andnominatedrepresentativesofIndigenousandlocalcommunities.

ExpertandFact -findingMissions

- 15. In 2000, at the request of the relevant Omanian dEgyptian authorities, amission was undertakento Omanan dEgyptto provide IP advice to national cultural herit age institutions on the on-line exploitation of such heritage. The mission held discussions with the national authorities responsible for cultural heritage in both countries and identified existing national capacity for the management and commercialization of such material as well as possibilities for improving the IP aspects of ongoing work in both countries.
- 16. In April 2000, WIPO participated in a finding and expert mission with the International Trade Centre (ITC) to Colombia on the leg alprotection of original craftitems.
- 17. InAugust2002, an expert mission on the documentation and protection of traditional knowledge and cultural expressions was undertaken in the Lao People's Democratic Republic at the request of the Intellegent of the Intellegent Property Office of that country.
- 18. AttherequestoftheInternationalLaborOrganization(ILO),in2002WIPOprovided intellectualproperty -relatedinformationforanILOprojectconcerningenterprise developmentandemploymentcreation intheculturalsectorintheSouthernAfrican DevelopmentCommunity(SADC)area.Inthisrespect,WIPOparticipatedinanILO NationalWorkshoponEnterpriseDevelopmentandEmploymentCreationintheCultural SectorinZambia:NationalandLocalStrate gies,Lusaka,Zambia,inOctober2002.
- 19. WIPOwasinvitedtoparticipateinanInternationalForumonthePromotionof TraditionalWomen'sCraftsintheMediterraneanCountries,takingplaceinTunis,Tunisiain October2002.WIPOwasnotable toparticipateforresourcereasons.
- 20. InOctober2002,theWIPOSecretariathaddiscussionswithrepresentativesoftheGulf CooperationCouncilFolkloreCentre,inDoha,Qatar.TheCentrerequestedIP -related informationandassistanceinr espectofitscollection,recordalandpreservationactivities.

- 21. Afact -findingmissiononfolkloreprotectionwillbeundertakeninChinainlate November 2002 at the invitation of the Chinese government.
- 22. The WIPO Secretariatal soreceives requests for information and assistance from Indigenous and other non -governmental organizations (NGOs). For example, in 2001, a Peruvian NGO requested information from WIPO in relation to a project it was contemplating to promote a specialty peof contract for regulating access to and use of expressions of folklore. A Canadian NGO, which wished to assist the Peruvian NGO with this project on the basis of its experiences with protecting Inuither itage, also requested information from WIPO. Another Canadian Indigenous association has requested assistance with its efforts to protect a particular craft using industrial designs, copyright and trademarks law.

<u>LegislativeDrafting,CommentsandInformation</u>

23. Withinthecontextofthe Secretariat's normal and ongoing Development Cooperation functions, the WIPOS ecretariath as provided comments and information on the protection of expressions of folklore and traditional knowledge to many countries which have requested this aspart of the irdrafting of IP laws or review of existing laws. Since 2000, the Copyright Law Section, Cooperation for Development (Intellectual Property Law) Department of WIPO has provided as requested comments and information specifically on folklore in respect of pieces of legislation. Requests for such assistance continue to be received by the Secretariat. They are also received from regional intergovernmental organizations.

For example, at the request of Pacific Island States through the SecretariatofthePacific Community(SPC)andthePacificIslandsForumSecretariat(PIFS),theSecretariathas providedinformationandlegislativedraftingcommentsandadviceinrelationtothe development of a Regional Framework for the Protection of TraditionalKnowledgeand Expressions of Culture for Pacific Island countries. WIPO participated in a SPC/PIFS/UNESCOW orkshop for Legal Experts on the Protection of Traditional KnowledgeandExpressionsofFolklore,Noumea,NewCaledonia,February2001;provi dedwritten commentsonadraftmodellawfornationallawsin2001;and,inJune2001,participatedina further Workshop for Legal Experts on the Protection of Traditional Knowledge and Traditional Knowledge anExpressions of Folklore, held in Noumea, New Caledonia. EducationandTraining

- 25. Thetopicsofgeneticresources, traditional knowledge and folk lore are now frequently included, at the request of Member States, in many training workshops, seminars or briefings or ganized by WIPO, both within its program of cooperation for development (including the WIPO Worldwide Academy), and in its outreach programs dealing within dustry and civil society. The numerous relevant activities are not listed in this document.
- 26. Theseactivities will be supplemented in the near fut ure by a nonline Distance Learning Course on traditional knowledge and expressions of folklore, which is currently being developed by the WIPO Academy and the Traditional Knowledge Division.

<u>ProvisionofEquipment</u>

27. The WIPOS ecretariath as received Member Stater equests for equipment and related technical assistance for the collection, recordal and preservation of expressions of folklore, in view of the linkages between these activities and the legal protection of expressions of folklore.
