More than 75% of the US population has had their name registered on the most popular TLDs (but not registered by themselves)

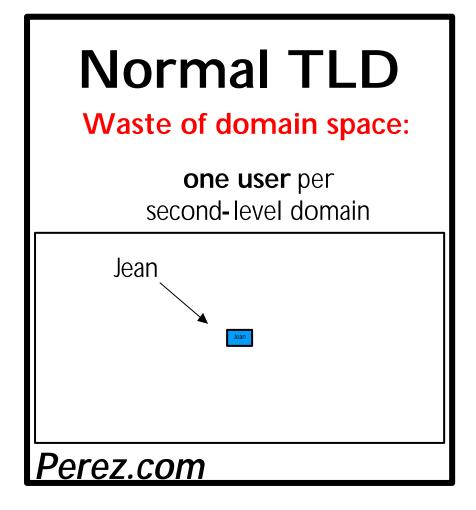
...but only 0.0054% of the same population could register these names

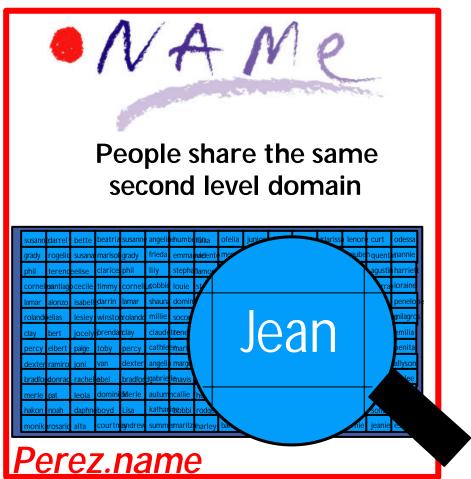


More than 60% of the population in Internet-Europe has had their name registered on the most popular TLDs (but not registered by themselves)

Namewatch

- A detection and monitoring service against abuse:
 - Coca-Cola -> Cocacola.sucks.name
 - Disney -> Cheap.Disney-Products.name

- Subscribers receive a report summarizing all new .name registrations containing a defined character string

Premium

- blocks string on both 2nd &
 3rd level
- ANY combination is blocked from registration
 - IBM.Thinkpad.name
 - IBM.Products.name
 - Server.IBM.name
 - Solutions.IBM.name
 - *.IBM.name
 - IBM.*.name
- Premium option
 - Approx 1500 USD

A Defensive registration must be **identical to a trademark**, nationally registered prior to April 16, 2001

Only available until November 12

Rollout progress

- Marketing campaigns and co-marketing
 - Co-marketing campaigns about to start
 - Material for Registrars and their resellers
- Registrars
 - .name Registrar Extranet opened Aug 15
 - 40 registrars completed .name agreement
 - 15 registrars doing .name pre-registrations



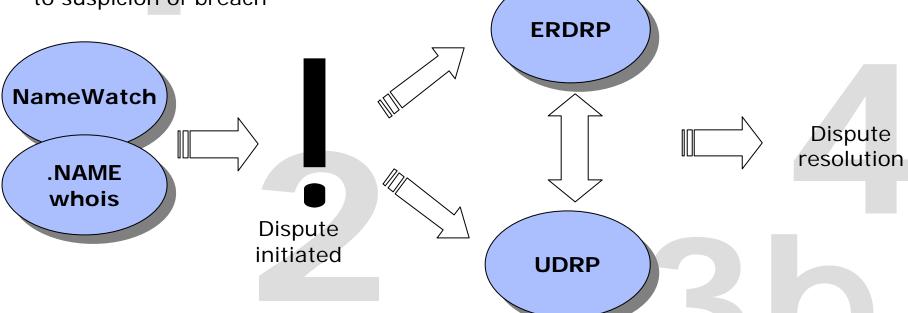
Dispute resolution

- ERDRP is being implemented
- Eligibility requirements
 - Defensive Registrations: Registered trademark
 - NameWatch: None
 - Personal Names: =name or fictional character
- ICANN Accredited Dispute Resolution Providers
 - WIPO and Eresolution preparing process
- Two types of disputes available
 - Defensive Registrations from Nov 12
 - Personal Registrations from Dec 13

Dispute process

NameWatch report or investigation in the centralized WHOIS leads to suspicion of breach A new process exclusively on the .name TLD Faster and cheaper process.

Enforces the Eligbility Requirements on .Name Remedies breaches



Proven mechanism and a good **safeguard** Enforcement **only for "Bad-faith"** behavior

Timeline for .name rollout

- Approval Process: Aug 15- Nov 1
 - Registrar Accreditation
- Sunrise Period: Aug 15 Nov 12
 - Registration of NameWatch and Defensive Registrations
- Landrush Period: Aug 15 Nov 22
 - Pre-registration of domain names and SLD Email forwarding
- Processing period: Nov 22 Dec 13
 - Random allocation
- Commencement: Dec 13
 - Registrations go live in DNS

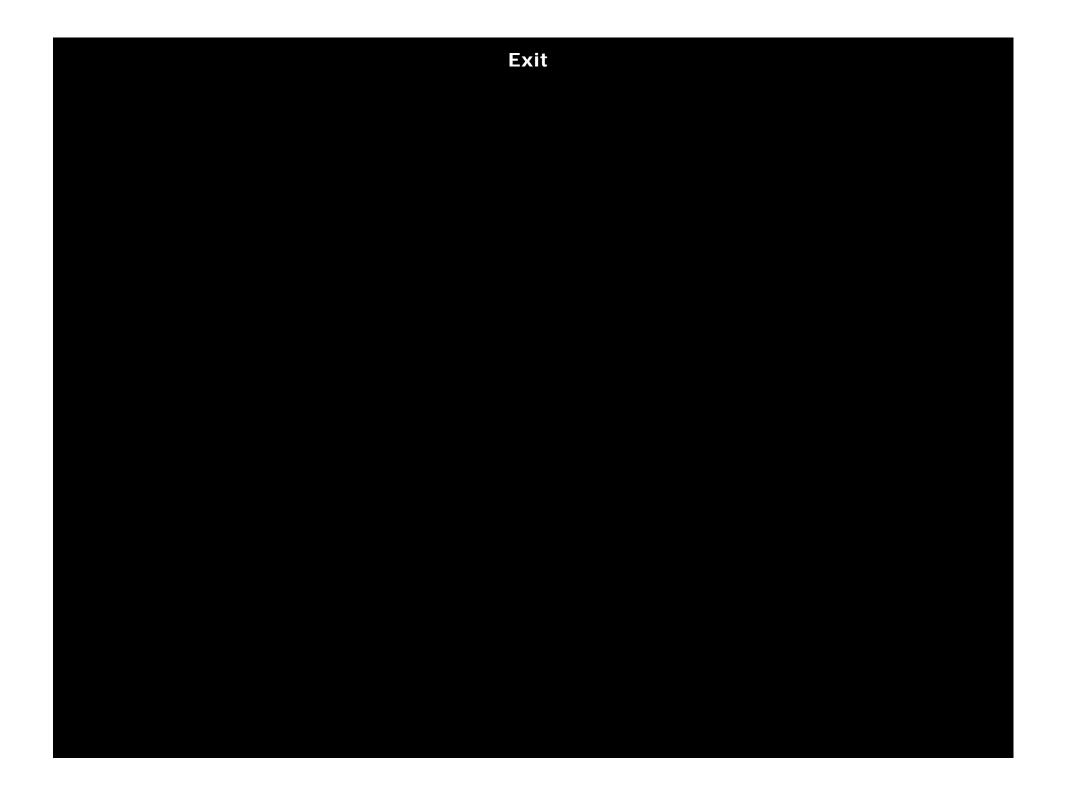

WHOIS

Whois

- Two tier structure:
 - Extensive WHOIS service for Intellectual property owners
 - Privacy Whois for public access
- Illegal to use WHOIS for spamming, data-mining and marketing purposes
- New Feature in Extensive WHOIS: "Registration pattern"
 - Trace the registration pattern of a Registrant
- Whois is available from Dec 12



Extensive Whois

Information required for Extensive Whois

- A declaration that the data is being requested for a lawful reason, and that the data will not be used for marketing purposes, spamming or any other improper purpose.
- A declaration that you are:
 - Investigating and defending a possible violation of intellectual property; or
 - Seeking information for use by a law-enforcement agency
 - In pursuit of defamation proceedings; or
 - Collecting information for use within the applicable Dispute Resolution Procedures under the UDRP or ERDRP
 - Understanding that providing false information is ILLEGAL
- Your full contact details and the email address where the report will be sent

More on Defensive Registrations

Eligibility for Defensive Registrations

- Nationally Registered Trademark, prior to April 16, 2001
- Trademark identical to Defensive Registration
 - Where there is a space between the textual elements of a registered mark, the tradmark owner may elect at its discretion to replace the space with a hyphen, combine the elements together to form a continuous string, or register the mark as a combined second and third level Defensive Registration.
 - Thus, for example, the registered mark "Sample Mark" could be registered as any or all of the following:
 - (1) <any string>.samplemark.name;
 - (2) <any string>.sample-mark.name;
 - (3) samplemark.<any string>.name;
 - (4) sample-mark.<any string>.name;
 - (5) samplemark.name;
 - (6) sample-mark.samplemark.name;
 - (7) samplemark.sample-mark.name;
 - (8) sample-mark.name; or
 - (9) sample.mark.name

Challenge and consent

Challenge:

- A Defensive Registration can be challenged in the ERDRP by a person whose name has been blocked by the Defensive Registration
 - Example: A Premium Defensive Registration on "Smith" would block any person with the name
 Smith from registering. John Smith could challenge the Defensive Registration "Smith"
- Should a third successful challenge to the Defensive Registration happen, the Defensive Registration will be cancelled ("three strikes")
- The costs of a successful challenge shall be borne by the Defensive Registrant
- The costs of an unsuccessful challenge shall be borne by the challenger

Consent:

- The Defensive Registrant may alternatively consent to the registration of a domain name that conflicts with such Defensive Registration.
- A consent <u>does not</u> count as a strike for the purpose of challenge.
- No monetary or other remuneration may be demanded in return for the consent
