Memorandum of the Director General

I. ADMISSIONOFINTERGO VERNMENTALORGANIZAT IONSASOBSERVERS

- 1. Attheirprevioussessions,theAssembliesoftheMemberStatesofWIPO ("Assemblies")adoptedasetofprinciplestobeappliedinextendinginvitations to intergovernmentalorganizationstoattend,asobservers,themeetingsoftheAssembliesof WIPOconcerned(seedocumentsAB/X/32,paragraph 17,andAB/X/17,Annex II; TRT/A/I/2and 4,paragraph 5;BP/A/I/2and 5,paragraph 5;V/A/I/1,paragraph 27,a nd V/A/I/2,paragraph 7;andFRT/A/I/3andFRT/A/I/9,paragraph 10).Arecapitulationof thoseprinciplesappearsinAnnex IofdocumentAB/XII/5.
- 2. Informulatingthesaidprinciples,theAssembliesestablishedthreecategoriesof intergovernmentalorganizations:CategoryA(UnitedNationsSystemofOrganizations), CategoryB(IndustrialPropertyorCopyright)andCategoryC(OtherIntergovernmental Organizations,WorldwideorRegional).DependingupontheAssemblyconcernedandthe categorytowhichtheintergovernmentalorganizationbelongs,aninvitationisextendedby theDirectorGeneraltothatorganizationtoattend,asanobserver,themeetingsofthat Assemblyinaccordancewiththecriteriasetforthintheprincipleapplicabletot hatBody. Theintergovernmentalorganizationsadmittedtoattend,asobservers,themeetingsofthe AssembliesandwhichhavebeeninvitedtosoattendtheThirty -Seventhseriesofmeetingsof theAssembliesandtheUnionsadministeredbyWIPOarelisted indocumentA/37/INF/1.

- 3. Onceanintergovernmentalorganizationisadmittedtoattend,asanobserver,the meetingsoftheAssemblies,itisalsoinvitedtoattend,asanobserver,meetingsof committees,workinggroups,orotherbodiessubsidi arytotheAssemblies,iftheirsubject matterseemstobeofdirectinteresttothatorganization.
- 4. Decisionsconcerningtheadmissionofintergovernmentalorganizationstoattend, as observers, themeetings of certain Assemblies were last tak enauthe Thirty Sixthseries of meetings of the Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO, from September 24 to October 3, 2001 (seedocument A/36/12, paragraphs 1 to 7, and document A/36/15, paragraphs 237).
- 5. ItisproposedthattheAssembliesa dmitthefollowingintergovernmentalorganization toattend,asobserver,themeetingsoftheAssembliesconcerned:

SouthCentre.

- 6. Abriefdescriptionoftheabove -mentionedorganization –itsobjectives,structureand membership–appearsinAn nex Iofthisdocument.ItisfurtherproposedthattheAssemblies includetheSouthCentreincategory C(WorldwideIntergovernmentalOrganization)andthat thesaidorganizationbesubjecttotheprinciplesapplicableinextendinganinvitationtoother intergovernmentalorganizations,inthecorrespondingcategory,toattend,asobservers,the meetingsoftheAssembliesconcerned.
 - 7. The Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO are invited, each insofar asitis concerned, to take a decision on the proposals appearing in paragraphs 5 and 6, above.

II. ADMISSIONOFINT ERNATIONALNON -GOVERNMENTALORGANIZATION S ASOBSERVERS

- 8. Attheirprevioussessions, the Assemblies adopted a set of principles to be applied in extending invitation stointernational non -governmental organization sto attend, as observers, the meetings of the Assemblies concerned (see documents AB/X/32, paragraph 17, and AB/X/17, Annex V; TRT/A/I/2 and 4, paragraph 5; BP/A/I/2 and 5, paragraph 5; V/A/I/1, paragraphs 25 to 29, and V/A/I/2, paragraph 7; and FRT/A/I/3 and 9, paragraph 10).
- 9. Theinternationalnon -governmentalorganizationsadmittedtoattend,asobservers,the meetingsoftheAssemblies,andwhichhavebeeninvitedtoattendtheThirty -Seventhser ies ofmeetingsoftheAssembliesandtheUnionsadministeredbyWIPO,arelistedintheAnnex todocumentA/37/INF/1.
- 10. Onceaninternationalnon -governmentalorganizationisadmittedtoattend,asan observer,themeetingsoftheAssembliesoftheMem berStatesofWIPO,itisalsoinvitedto attend,asanobserver,meetingsofcommittees,workinggroups,orotherbodiessubsidiaryto theAssemblies,iftheirsubjectmatterseemstobeofdirectinteresttothatorganization.
- 11. SincetheThirty -SixthseriesofmeetingsoftheAssemblies,fromSeptember24to October 3, 2001,whendecisionswerelasttakenconcerningtheadmissionofinternational non-governmentalorganizationstoattend,asobservers,themeetingsofcertainAssembliesof

MemberState sofWIPO(seedocumentsA/36/12,paragraphs8to14,andA/36/15, paragraph 245),theDirectorGeneralhasreceivedrequests,withthenecessaryinformation, fromeachofthefollowingorganizationsforadmissiontoattend,asanobserver,themeetings oftheAssembliesoftheMemberStatesofWIPOconcerned:

- $(i) \quad Entidad de Gesti\'on de Derechos de los Productores Audiovisuales \\ (EGEDA);$
 - (ii) InternationalCooperationforDevelopmentandSolidarity(CIDSE);
 - (iii) InternationalFederationofWinesandSpi rits(FIVS).
- 12. Abriefstatementabouteachoftheorganizationsmentionedinparagraph11,above –itsobjectives,structureandmembership –appearsinAnnexIIofthisdocument.Itis proposedthat,asconcernseachoftheorganizationsmentionedi nparagraph11,above,the AssembliesoftheMemberStatesincludethesaidorganizationsinthecategoryof internationalnon -governmentalorganizationsandthatthesaidorganizationsbesubjecttothe principlesapplicableinextendinganinvitationto otherinternationalnon -governmental organizationstoattendasobserversthemeetingsoftheAssembliesconcerned.
 - 13. The Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO are invited, each insofar as it is concerned, to take a decision on the proposal appearing in paragraph 12, above.

III. ADMISSIONOFNATIONALNON -GOVERNMENTALORGANIZATIONSAS OBSERVERS

14. AttheThirty -SixthseriesofmeetingsoftheAssemblies,fromSeptember24to October 3,2001,theSecretariatinvitedconsiderationofthepossibili tyofadmittingnational non-governmentalorganizationsasobservers(seedocumentA/36/12,paragraphs15to21). Foreaseofreference,therelevantportionsofthesaiddocumentarereproducedbelow:

"Thispractice[ofadmittingonlyinternationalnon-governmentalorganizations] was based on "the provisions of the relevant Conventions and Agreements permitting such Administrative Bodies to determine which international non-governmental organizations shall be admitted to their meetings as observers,... Ru le8(2) of the WIPO General Rules of Procedure incorporated in the special rules of procedure of the said Administrative Bodies, and having regard to the established practice" (see document AB/VII/13, paragraph 12).

"Thepracticeofadmittingonlyinterna tionalnon -governmentalorganizations mayhavebeenbasedonotherconsiderationsaswell.Forexample,asaninternational organization,itoriginallymadesenseforWIPOtodealprimarilywithinternational non-governmentalorganizationsfocusingoniss uesofworldwideconcern,andwhose internalstaffandexternalmembersoriginatefromdifferentcountriesorregions.Itwas alsothoughtthatgrantingobserverstatusonlytointernationalnon -governmental organizationswascost -effectivesincethedocu mentspertainingtoWIPOmeetingswere mailedonlytoalimitednumberofobservers.

"TheMemberStatesmaywishtoreviewthereasonsforadmittingonly internationalnon -governmentalorganizationsasobserverstoWIPOmeetings.National non-governmentalorganizationsplayanincreasinglyactiveroleinthetechnical discussionsinmanyWIPOmeetings.Theyusuallyparticipateasadhocobserversin theStandingCommitteesandareusuallyalsoaccreditedwithobserverstatusat diplomaticconferenceshel dundertheauspicesofWIPO.Theirparticipationinsuch meetingsisalwayssubjecttothecontrolofthepresidingofficer.Rule24oftheWIPO GeneralRulesofProcedurespecifies,inthisrespect,that"Observersmaytakepartin debatesattheinvit ationoftheChairman,"andthatthey"maynotsubmitproposals, amendmentsormotions.

"Theparticipationofnationalnon -governmentalorganizations as observers would also provide an additional means for generating interest in the activities and service esofthe Organization and for disseminating information about those activities and services. Many of the Organization's services (under the Patent Cooperation Treaty, the Madrid System, the Hague Agreement and the WIPO Arbitration and Mediation Center) are, it is recalled, directed to the market sector at the national level.

"Inaddition, as documents pertaining to WIPO meetings are, to a large extent, made available or transmitted electronically, rather than in paper form by mail, cost savings realized by mailing documents only to international non -governmental organizations are not significant.

 $\label{lem:continuous} 'The Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO may wish to review the practice established over the years and consider whether the application of national non-governmental organizations should also be considered for purposes of obtaining permanent observer status in WIPO" (see document A/36/12, paragraphs 15 to 20).$

- 15. Intheensuingdiscussion,theAssembliesoftheMemberStatesofWIPOrequestedthat theSecre tariatprepareadocumentelaboratingontheissueoftheadmissionofnational non-governmentalorganizationsasobserversatthemeetingsoftheAssemblies,and formulatepossibleguidelinesfordecidingonrequestsforobserverstatus.TheAssemblies decided"todiscussfurthertheissueatthe2002meetings,withaviewtowardstakinga decisionontheproposaltoadmitnationalnon -governmentalorganizationsasobserversatthe meetingsoftheAssembliesofMemberStatesofWIPO"(seedocumentA/36/1 5,paragraph 250).
- 16. The Assemblies of Member Statesmight wish to consider the following proposals as principles applicable in extending invitation stonation alnon observers:

 -governmental organizations, as
- (a) Theorganizationshallbeessentiallyco ncernedwithintellectualpropertymatters fallingwithinthecompetenceofWIPOandshall,intheviewoftheDirectorGeneral,beable toofferconstructive,substantivecontributionstothedeliberationsoftheAssembliesof WIPO:
- (b) Theaims and pur poses of the organization shall be inconformity with the spirit, purposes and principles of WIPO and of the United Nations;

- (c) Theorganizationshallhaveanestablishedheadquarters, with an executive officer. It shall have democratically adopted stat utes, a copy of which shall be submitted to WIPO; and
- $(d) \quad The organization shall have authority to speak for its members through its authorized representatives.$
- 17. The Director General has received requests, with the necessary information, from each of the following national non -governmental organizations for admission to attend, as an observer, the meetings of the Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO concerned:
 - (i) AmericanIntellectualPropertyLawAssociation(AIPLA);
 - (ii) AsociaciónNacionald eIntérpretes(ANDI);
 - (iii) AssociaçãoBrasileiradeEmissorasdeRádioeTelevisão(ABERT);
 - (iv) AssociationBouregreg (BOUREGREG).
- 18. Abriefstatementabouteachoftheorganizationsmentionedinparagraph17,above,its objectives,structureandme mbership,appearsinAnnexIIIofthisdocument.Itisproposed that,asconcernseachoftheorganizationsmentionedinparagraph17,above,theAssemblies oftheMemberStatesincludethesaidorganizationsinacategoryofnational non-governmentalorg anizationsandthatthesaidorganizationsbesubjecttotheprinciples, setoutinparagraph16,applicableinextendinganinvitationtonationalnon -governmental organizationstoattendasobserversthemeetingsoftheAssembliesconcerned.
 - 19. The Ass emblies of the Member States of WIPO are invited, each insofar asitis concerned, to take a decision on the proposal appearing in paragraph 18, above.

ANNEXI

PARTICULARSCONCERNINGINTERGOVERNMENTALORGANIZATIONS (onthebasisofinforma tionreceivedfromthesaidorganization)

SouthCentre

Headquarters: Establishedin 1994 in Geneva, Switzerland.

Objectives: Tocontribute to South -wide collaboration in promoting common interests and coordinated participation by developing countri es in international for a. In order to meet its objectives, the Centre, within the limits of its capacity and mandate, a imstores pond to requests for policy advice and for technical and other support from collective entities of the South such as the Group of 77 and the LDCs group of countries in the WTO.

Structure: The South Centre came formally into being as an intergovernmental body of developing countries on July 31,1995, when the Intergovernmental Agreement to Establish the South Centre came into for ce. The Board consists of nine members, plus the Chairperson. The Chairperson and the Board, who jointly oversee and direct the operation of the Centre, approve the Centre's activities and work program, are responsible for overall financial management, a ssistinfund -raising and consider the budget and yearly audited accounts. The Board meets at least once a year.

Membership: The present membership consists of 46 developing countries.

1. EntidaddeGestióndeDerechosdelosProductoresAudiovisuales(EGEDA)

Headquarters:Foundedin1990atMadrid,Spain.

Objectives: Tomanage, representand defendtheinterests of producers of audiovisual andworks recordings, and their successors.

 $Structure: The General Meeting comprises all the members of the Association. \\ EGED A is managed and represented by the Board of Directors.$

 $Membership: Presently\ , 11 associations of producers and 18 audiovisual entities in Europeand North America are members of the Organization.$

2. <u>InternationalCooperationforDevelopmentandSolidarity(CIDSE)</u>

Headquarters:Foundedin1988atBrussels,Belgium.

Objectives: Toenableitsmemberorganizations toworkalongs idepartner organizations in all continents in order to share experiences, build capacities and work together on issues of advocacy/lobbying and campaigning, development programs, development education and peace building.

Structure: The supremeauthority in CIDSE is the Board of Directors which is responsible for decisions affecting CIDSE's principles, aims, structures and statutes.

Membership: CIDSE comprises 15 memberorganisations in Europeand North America.

3. InternationalFederationofWinesandSpirits(FIVS)

Headquarters:Foundedin1951atParis,France.

Objectives: Tofacilitate dialogue and information exchange between members coming from all sectors of the international alcohol beverag eindustry. This is done primarily through participation in meetingsheld twice per year.

Structure: The governing body of FIVS is its General Assembly, which normally meets once per year. The General Assembly is comprised of a representative from each member association or company, who has the right to vote, and all past presidents of the Federation, who do not have the right to vote.

Membership: The members of FIVS represent four continents: Europe, North America, South America, and Australia. The majority of members are European trade associations. Those members from North America include mostly trade associations as well as several producer companies of wines and spirits.

1. AmericanIntellectualPropertyLawAssociation(AIPLA)

Headquarters:Foundedin1897atArlington,UnitedStatesofAmerica.

Objectives: Toprovide innovative, high qual itylegale ducation to the intellectual property (IP) community and to assure timely and effective advocacy aimed a timproving the protection of IP both in the United States and internationally. In further ance of its advocacy mission, AIP LA provides comments to, and testifies, before the USPTO, the Copyright Office and other executive branchagencies as well as the U.S. Congresson regulatory and legislative initiatives affecting the protection of IP.

Structure: The Associationis governed by an Executiv eCommittee comprised of five of ficers, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and twelve Members of the Board of Directors. An Executive Director manages the Head quarters Office comprising four teenfull - time employees, which serves as the Secretariat for the Associat ion and its 13,900 members.

Membership:Presently,thereareapproximately 12,400 members residing in 27 countries and 609 for eignaffiliates residing in 61 countries.

Headquarters:Foundedin1957atMex ico,Mexico.

Objectives:Itsmainactivityconsistsincollecting,andpayingtoitsmembersandto foreignperformersinitsareaofconcern,theroyaltiespayableforperformers'intellectual propertyrightsundertherelevantlegislationoftheMexica nRepublicandinternational treatiessignedandratifiedbyit.

Structure: As far a sits legal structure is concerned, AND I has the following three or gans: General Assembly of Members, Management Board, Supervisory Committee.

Membership:Over1,000M exicanandforeignperformers.

3. AssociaçãoBrasileiradeEmissorasdeRádioeTelevisão (ABERT)

Headquarters:Foundedin1962atBrasilia,Brazil.

Objectives: The objectives of the *Brazilian Association of Broadcasters* are in particular: to coord in a tebroadcasting in defense of democracy, national integration and free enterprise; to uphold freedom of expression, information and publicity; to defend broadcasting entrepreneurs in their prerogatives as providers of services in the public interest; to highlight the principles be stsuited to Brazilian broadcasting, in particular its educational, cultural, civic, informational and recreational expression; to represent the general interests of its members in contracts, agreements, partnerships and underta kings, and in relations with the government.

Structure: The General Assembly is the sovereign governing body with decision-making functions. The Executive Committee carries out the day of the affairs of the association.

Membership: Over1000licensedprivate -sectorradioandtelevisionstationsare membersoftheAssociation.

4. <u>AssociationBouRegreg (BOUREGREG)</u>

Headquarters: Setupin 1986, based in Salé, Morocco.

Objectives: Toprovide for the cultural, social and economic evel opment of the people; to further the role of women ineconomic development; to promote our richnational heritage and make the people aware of it.

Structure: The Association is composed of foundermembers, honorary members and active members. The foundermembers form the membership of the Constituent General Assembly.

Membership:Over1,500. They are for the most part residents of the province of Salé who are engaged in the promotion of their heritage or who have contributed to the development of the cultural, economic, business, so cial and sporting interests of their province.
