- 1. The Program and Budget Committee, at its fifths ession held from September 9 to 11, 2002, discussed the proposal scontained in the Revised Project Budget for the New Construction and Revised Program and Budget for 2002 -2003 (document WO/PBC/5/2) and the Evaluation Report of the External Auditor on the New Construction prepared by the Swiss Federal Audit Office (document WO/PBC/5/3). The views of the Member States represented at the Committee on these proposals, are contained in its report (WO/PBC/5/4) which is annexed to this document.
  - 2. The Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO and the Unions administered by WIPO, each as far a sitis concerned, are invited to takenote of the contents of the Annex.

- 3. DiscussionswerebasedondocumentsWO/PBC/5/2("RevisedProjectBudgetforthe NewConstructionandRevisedProgramandBudgetfor2002 -2003")andWO/PBC/5/3 ("EvaluationReportoftheExternalAuditorontheNewConstruction").
- 4. Thesessionwas openedbyMr.PhilippePetit,DeputyDirectorGeneral,whowelcomed theparticipantsonbehalfoftheDirectorGeneral.
- 5. The Committee unanimously elected Mr. Jennes H.A.C. De Mol (Netherlands) as Chairman and Ms. Natalia Ageenko (Russian Federation) and Mrs. Preeti Saran (India) as Vice-Chair persons of the Committee.
- 6. The Chairman invited any observations on the draft agend a contained indocument WO/PBC/5/1 Prov. The Committee agreed that discussion on item 5 "Evaluation Report of the External Auditor on the New Construction" should precede discussion on item 4 "Revised Project Budget for the New Construction and Revised Program and Budget for 2002 -2003." An item 6 on "other business" was also added. The agenda was adopted.
- 7. The Chairman invited the External Auditor, the architect of the winning project and the Secretariatto introduce the Evaluation Report of the External Auditor on the New Construction (seedocument WO/PBC/5/3) and the Revised Project Budget for he New Construction and Revised Program and Budget for 2002 -2003 (seedocument WO/PBC/5/2).
- 8. TheExternalAuditorsummarizeditsEvaluationReportontheNewConstruction, presentedindocumentWO/PBC/5/3.Henotedthattheevaluationreport wasbasedona versionofthenewconstructionprojectdatedNovember2001.Thereportcontaineda numberofrecommendations,includingtheneedtoredefineanumberoftechnicalaspectsof theprojectinlinewiththemodernnatureofthebuildingandit sefficientoperation.In particular,thereportproposedtofurtherstudytheconceptsrelatingtoheating,ventilation,air conditioningandelectricalsupplyrequirementsinlightofavailabletechnologiesandWIPO's needsandpotentialsynergieswith existingbuildingsandinfrastructure.Itproposedto reformulatetheacoustics' conceptoftheconferencehallprojectandtoplanitinawayasto

minimizeanypotentialadditionalrisksidentifiedintheevaluationprocess. Thereportnoted that WIPO and its Assemblies will have to decide whether to build a conference hall and additional storage spaces, to reallocate surfaces in the administrative building increasing workingplacesperoffice, to adapt technical concepts according to the audit proposa ls,andto setupexternalmanagementmechanismsinordertobetterdefinetheproject'sneedsand requirements and provide a dequate oversight of its implementation. The importance that final tender documents were based on the detailed project to avoid anypotentialcostincreaseswas stressed.TheExternalAuditorconcludedbyquotingparagraph 76ofdocument WO/PBC/5/3: "Ishouldlikefinallytomentionthatthecomments in this report have been formulated on the basis of not only the individual observationsmadebyexperts, but also their overallimpressions, which impressions Ishare, being conscious at the same time of the complexityofsuchaprojectandthedifficultiesinherentinit. The same complexity is to be foundintheformulationofaspe cificationreflectingtheneedsoftheclient, and its interpretation by the architect." The Auditorthen invited all the delegates to be come involved inwhathequalifiedasacomplex,ambitiousandexcitingproject,sothattheworkthatstarted withth earchitectural competition in 1999 for the creation of the working facilities that WIPO needs.couldbecontinued.

- 9. Thearchitectpresentedprojectplansanddesigns, noting that the project work continuedtoprogressallowingforgreatercon fidenceregardingfinancial projections. The architectstressedthatthenewconstructionprojectcouldnotbeconsideredasastand -alone buildingasitformed,togetherwithotherbuildings,awholeinfrastructuredesignedfor sentialelementstotheentireWIPOinfrastructure, suchasa WIPO.Itwouldprovidees conferenceroom, additional storage space, library, restaurant and cafeteria. The administrativebuildingwith560workingplaceswouldconstituteanewelementofthewhole settingprovidings toragerooms, parking facilities and meeting areas. The conference hall wouldprovide650seatsdivisibleintotworoomsof450and200seats. The groundfloor of the administrative building would house important facilities designed for commonuse. The building would be connected to the existing WIPO building through internal connections. It would be connected to the existing wipon to the connection of twouldbecharacterizedbyaflexiblestructureallowinganadditional500to650working places. From an architectural point of view, then ew building could be con sideredasa state-of-the-artadditiontotheexistingWIPOfacilities. Theworkwas carried out in collaborationwithenvironmentalengineerstoimprovetheenergyuseandoptimizethe atmosphereinthebuildingforofficeoccupants.Internalgardensfu nctioningasgreenhouses would assure an access to natural daylight in all office areas. The green houses and winter gardenswouldprovideaclimatebufferandnaturaldaylightfortheinteriorofficesfacingthe courtyards.Differentfloorlevelswouldb econnectedthroughshortconnectionsinaddition toelevatorsforeasieraccess.Officeswouldbefurnishedwithwindowswhichcouldbe openedenablinganaturalairexchange.Roofwindowwithshadowdeviceswouldallowan optimumlevelofnaturaldayli ghtwhilekeepingthedirectsunlightout.
- 10. The Secretariat provided a summary of the Revised Project Budget for the New Construction and Revised Program and Budget for 2002 -2003 presented indocument WO/PBC/5/2. It recalled that a large numb erof consultations had been under taken to identify office needs for WIPO and ways to meet them since 1990 when the new construction project had been first proposed. It also recalled that in September 1998, the General Assembly of WIPO had approved then wonstruction project comprising an office building for 500 work places, a conference room for 600 seats and additional parking facilities. In 2001, Members States requested an objective evaluation of the new construction project, which was carried out an dpresented in a report to the current session of the Program and Budget Committee by the Federal Audit Office of the Swiss Confederation (herein a fter referred to as

"Federal Audit Office"). In this regard, the Secretaria text ended its appreciation and gr atitude to the Federal Audit Office for the numerous consultations and extensive information provided to the Member States and the Secretariat. The Secretariat further expressed its hope thatthecurrentsessionoftheCommitteewouldrecommendafinalpo sitiononthesematters to the Assemblies of WIPO. It recalled that since 1998, when the construction project was approved, WIPO had continued to increase its activities and had undertaken a number of new initiativeswiththeapprovalofMemberStatesaim edatthedemystificationofintellectual property. The proposed investment in the new construction project would constitute a strategiccontributiontowardsthefulfillmentofthislong -termgoalfortheOrganization.The Secretariatrecalledthatthen ewconstructionprojectcomprisedthreecomponents:anew officebuilding, aconferenceroomandadditional parking facilities. The Secretaria tindicated thatfollowingtherecommendationsoftheevaluationreportitwouldworkwiththearchitect andeng ineerstoincreasethenumberofworkingplacesfrom 500 to 560 in order to enhance spaceefficiency. The Secretariatals oproposed to implement the recommendations of the reportabouttheoptimization of technical installations to maximize costs avings. regard, theremainder of the year 2002 will be used to further readjust technical design and specifications(seeparagraph46ofdocumentWO/PBC/5/2). Withregardtotheconference hall,theSecretariatproposedthatahallwith650seatsasreco mmendedintheevaluation reportbeconstructed. The Secretariatwas of the opinion that a strategic consideration of WIPO'sneedswouldoutweightheprofitabilityconcernsregardingtheconferencehall.On theindicationthatnosufficientjustification shadbeenprovidedbyWIPOforadditional parking/storagefacilities(seeparagraph68ofdocumentWO/PBC/5/3),theSecretariat indicated that the premises' plan in table 2ofAnnex IIofdocumentWO/PBC/5/2revealed thatitwouldbedifficulttoprovide thedesiredlevelofparkingspacestostaffmembers, even ifa66percentratiobetweenworkingplacesandparkingspacesasrecommendedbythe Federal Audit Officewas adopted which did not include needs for visitors and delegates. It outlinedthatcer tainstoragespacesforeseenintheprojectcouldbereservedforpossible conversion into additional parking places in the future. The Secretariat further proposed to the conversion of the conconductastudyonadditionalparkingfacilities(seeparagraph16ofdocumentWO/PBC/5 /2).Therecommendationcontained in the evaluation report to reinforce project management by providing Member States with regular status reports was also supported by the Secretariat.

TheSecretariatfurtherelaboratedonthefinancialaspe ctsoftherevisedproposal.The revised project for the new construction presented a total budget envelope of 190.5 Swissfrancs. The total budget envelope included an amount of 157.5 millionSwiss francsfor theadministrative building with 560 offices and 33 millionSwissfrancsfortheconference hallwith650seats. The Secretariatre ferred to the evaluation report by the Federal Audit Officewhichhadconfirmedthatthepreviousestimateof 180 millionSwiss francssubmitted in 2001 provide d"arealistic package" to allow the project "to be completed." There vised budgetreflectedanumberofadjustments, such as increases of 34 millionSwissfrancsfor riskcontingency, furniture, management costs and secondary fees, partly off set by budge reductionsof23.5 millionSwiss francsassociatedwiththedeletionoftheproposedadditional storageandparkingfordelegates, visitors and staff. The evaluation report also agreed with theassessmentbytheSecretariatin2001thatthebudgetof82 .5 millionSwiss francs approvedinSeptember1998" was a serious underestimate." Moreover, the funding of the construction wouldnotrequireanincreaseinfeesorcontributions. Furthermore, therevised project

budgetwasalsoreflectedinarevisionoftheprogramandbudgetforthe2002 -2003biennium. Essentiall y, the biennium budget for the new construction would be reduced by 2.5 millionSwiss francsto49.8 millionSwissfrancs,reflectingdelaysintheproject implementationduetotheintroductionoftheevaluationprocess. To a large extent, this was due to the work of the Federal Audit Office and the architect Behnisch, Behnisch and Partners(BB&P). The project would be an attractive financial investm entandcomplementexisting facilities as well as the operation of the Organization. The administrative building would providemuchneededfacilities, which were currently rented at a cost twice as high as the new facilitywouldallow.WIPO'srentalcost wasclosetoreaching20 millionSwissfrancs annually, asituation that put an excessive burden on the funding of the Organization. Once available, the building would improve WIPO's cost structure substantially. Such cost reductions would be returned to Member States and the users of WIPO's services in the form of programactivities and fee adjustments. The conference hall would provide much needed facilities to accommodate the growing number and size of WIPO intergovernmental meetings.Muchinterest focusedonalternativestotheconferencehall,namelytheuseofoutside facilities, and the question of profitability. The Secretaria trecalled some of the observations contained in the evaluation report, which stated with regard to meeting sat WIPO than tthe "number of participants has tripled in 10 years." With regard to the availability of facilities outsideWIPO, thereport noted "lack of infrastructure which complicates the reservation problem."Theevaluationreportindicated that the conference h allwasnotprofitable.The report then continued that "experience has shown that profitability is seldomachieved with a conferenceroom." Justification for such a facility were found in the "objectives and future ndependencethatitaffords."Thereportcontinued:"I needsandalsointheconvenienceandi wouldrecommendtheplanningofa650 -seatroomthatisdivisibleintotworoomsof450and 200seats."TheSecretariatprovidedfurthercommentsontwoissuespertainingtothe conferencehall,nam elyviablealternativesandprofitability. Asillustratedinthereport, WIPOrequired a conference hall, which accommodated between 400 and 650 participants. In thisrange, the infrastructure in Geneva was limited. United Nations facilities for such meetingswerebookedoutwellinadvance. One facility, namely the main hall at the United Nations, which accommodated over 1,300 participants, was available. However this facility wasnotconsideredappropriateforWIPO's regular meetings. The high vacan cyrateforthis UnitedNationsfacilityseemedtoindicatethatitwasalsonotappropriateforotherUnited Nationsorganizations. With regards to the cost of the conference hall, the evaluation report indicated that the annual cost amounted to 2.25 millionSwiss francs,includingthecostof maintenanceas well as the funding costs. The cost of renting outside facilities, if available, Swiss francsannually. The net cost for WIPO would therefore wasestimatedat750,000 amountto 1.5 million Swiss francs annually, which corresponds to less than one percent of the WIPO budget, a percentage rate expected to decrease even further in the coming years.Asnoted, the annual cost included maintenance and funding costs. The financing costs had been calculated on the basis of an initial investment of 30 millionSwiss francsover40 years at3.25percentinterest. As noted, the conference hall would be funded entirely through resources available to WIPO and without incurring financing costs associated with borrowing. millionSwiss francs, only900,000 Swissfrancsrelated to the Oftheannualcostof2.25 annualmaintenancecosts for the new facility. This amount exceeded the cost of renting outsidefacilitiesbyonly150,000 Swissfrancsannually, equivale ntto 0.05 percentof the annualWIPObudget.Itisnotedthatthecalculationonprofitabilitywhichhadbeenoutlined intheevaluationreporttookaconservativeapproach. It excluded possible income generated

byWIPOthroughrentingoutthenewfaci lities. This approach was considered appropriate. Nevertheless, the report noted that "WIPO should be able to recover part of the annual operating costs by renting its rooms to other organizations." For this purpose, the report continuedbyrecommending "tosetupacommercialdepartmenttomanagethethreeWIPO conferencerooms."TheSecretariatintendedtodothisandexpectedtogenerateincomefrom thenewconferencefacilitybymakingtheroomsavailabletootherorganizations. This would bedone inclosecooperationwiththeUnitedNationsadministrationasthenewconference hall should be considered as part of common facilities available to the United Nations System.Inconclusion,theSecretariatwishedtoemphasizethatworkhadprogressedon thenew construction a waiting budget approval in order to is sue the main tender documents towardsthe end of this year. It indicated that frequent reports on project progress, including the budgetaryevolution, would be provided to Member States who segu idanceandapprovalwere actively sought. In this regard, then extop portunity would be the budget process for the 2004-2005bienniumastheProgramandBudgetCommitteewouldmeetinspring2003and thedocumentationforthenewbiennialbudgetwoulding ludeaprogressreportintheformof anupdated presentation.

TheDelegationoftheUnitedStatesofAmerica,speakingonbehalfofGroupB, expresseditsappreciationtoMr.Grüter,theAuditorGeneraloftheFederalAuditOffice,for hisp romptandpositiveresponsetotherequestoftheGeneralAssemblyofWIPOin2001to conductanevaluation of the new construction project, as well as for the high quality and timelinessoftheanalysis.ItalsoextendeditsappreciationtoMr. **David Reberand** Mr. Denys NeieroftheFederalAuditOfficeforthesystematiccoordinationandattention provided to the concerns of Member States of WIPO. It noted the importance for WIPO of havingthenecessarytoolsandfacilitiestomeetitsobjectivesinthe mosteffectiveand cost-efficientmannerandforMemberStatestobekeptinformedoftheDirectorGeneral's planning and full implications for the Program and Budget. It said that the financing of the projectshouldbethoroughlyvalidatedassoonaspo ssible, either through an independent auditbyathirdpartyorbyeffortsofthosemembersofWIPOwithanexpertiserelevantto workloadprojections and the implementation of electronic filing systems. While the need for additional WIPO - ownedwork places was seen as evident, it advocated the approval of a buildingprojectwhichshouldbefunctional, utilitarian, modernandfully operational, designed to answer the precise needs and functional requirements of the Organization. The architecturalprojectof BB&Pwasseenasthebasisforthisproject,providedappropriate adjustmentsweremade. It considered that the Secretaria tandits technical partners should provideforasignificantfurtherincreaseinthenumberofworkingplacesinthenewbuilding soastobringtheworkingplaceratiosmoreinlinewiththeotherbuildingprojectsusedfor comparison by the External Auditor. Early proposal son the number of parking spacescalculatedwithregardtonormsinGenevaandadjustedaccordingtotheincre asednumberof workingplacesandrequirementsfordiplomaticparkingshouldbeprovided. Itsaidthat varioustechnical assessments made in the evaluation report, including those concerning energyuseandcostsavings, should befully complied with. Mor eover, the Delegation stressedtheimportanceofsoundmanagementandoversightstructuresfortheproject, and endorsedtherecommendationoftheExternalAuditorthatahighlyqualifiedprofessional projectmanager, external to the Organization, be selec tedandgivenappropriateresponsibility and authority. This was seen as essential for continuity in order to contain costs within the appropriate parameters. It also considered it vital to take a nearly, but fully informed decision onthisprojectsoas todeliverthebenefitsassoonaspossible. Itproposed that the Program and Budget Committee recommend that the Assemblies authorize the Committee or its and budget Committee or its angle of the crepresentativestoworkdirectlywiththeSecretariat,thearchitectandtechnicalexperts throughouttheprocessofadjustingconceptsanddesignsandthattheAssembliesdelegateto

the Program and Budget Committee the authority to provide an approval for the beginning of construction.

- The Delegation of Algeria, speaking on behalf of t heAfricanGroup, expressed its appreciation to the Federal Audit Office for the high quality of its evaluation report and to the Secretariatforthetransparentmannerinwhichconsultationsonthenewconstructionproject herecommendationsmadebytheExternalAuditorwould wereconducted.Itnotedthatt providereliable parameters for the project implementation. The Delegation, while noting the conclusion of the evaluation report on the discrepancies between the initial budget estimates andrealneeds andthefactthattheestimateof 180 millionSwiss francswasrealistic, howeverhopedthatthenewconstructionwouldnotnegativelyaffectactivitiesoncooperation fordevelopment. The Delegationals obelieved that it was unrealistic to completely el iminate additional parking facilities for visitors and government delegates. On theis sue of the conferencehall, the Delegation recognized it as an integral part of the building project as reflected in the decisions of the supreme bodies of WIPO. In conclusion,theDelegation supported the revised project budget for the new construction and the revision of Sub-Program18.4(NewConstruction)oftheProgramandBudgetfor2002 -2003.as proposedindocumentWO/PBC/5/2.
- The Delegation of India, speaking on behalf of the Asian Group, conveyed its gratitude to the Federal Audit Office and to the Secretariat for the document at ion provided. It noted from Table 1 on page 2 of documentWO/PBC/5/2thattheSecretariathadincorporatedinitsproposalalltheimportantestimates and suggested modifications made by the External Auditor. It enumerated the external Auditor and the external Auditor anmodifications as follows: the number of work places in the new administrative buildingwill increasefrom 500 to 560; the number of seats in the conference hall will increase to 650 in ordertohavethepossibilityofholdingallWIPOmeetingsontheOrganization'spremises; andthedroppingoftheearlierproposalsforadditional storageandparkingspaces. It further noted the increase in the project budget to 190.5 millionSwiss francs, inline with the External Auditor's estimates. With the new construction, the Delegation noted the expected declineinWIPOreservesasexpend ituresexceedprojectedincomeinthenextfouryears.It noted that due to WIPO's prudent financial management, its current reserves were adequate to ensurethatthenewconstructionwouldnothaveanadverseeffectonitsdevelopment cooperationprogram .Itfurthernotedwithsatisfactionthatattheendofthelastbiennium, WIPO'sreservesof264.4 millionSwiss francswerealmostequaltoitsannualoperating budget.ItconcludedthatthereshouldnotbeaneedtocurtailanyoftheOrganization's substantive programs due to the new construction. It expressed its hope to see an increase in WIPO's cooperation for development programs at the same level of growth as it had been in the recent past. It also expressed its wish to see increased participationofexpertsfromthe AsiaPacificregioninWIPOmeetingsinGenevaandelsewhere. However, it conveyed the Group's difficulty in accepting the suggestion made by the External Auditor that there is no needtoprovideparkingspacesfordelegatesattend ingWIPOmeetings.Itexpresseditsview that private cars will continue to be the norm form ost delegates and urged the Secretariat to reconsideritsdeletingofthatprovisioninthecurrentproposal.Furthermore,theDelegation requested clarification on cantonal rules governing under ground parking spaces. It recognized the advantages of a WIPO -ownedconferencefacility. It was of the opinion that justifications for the conference roomshould not only be based one conomic costing, but ratheronother considerations, such as the inefficiencies and missed opportunities brought

aboutbythelackofsuchafacility. It was of the view that the new construction project will enhance WIPO's effectiveness and efficiency, which could be translated into enhance support to WIPO indeveloping countries. The Delegation concluded by expressing its support to the revised proposal subject to the observations made regarding construction of parking spaces for delegates.

- 15. TheDelegationofChinaexpressed itsappreciationfortheworkoftheSwissFederal AuditOfficeandtheSecretariat.ItexpresseditssupporttoWIPO'seffortstobringup efficiencybyvariousmeans;forexample,theconstructionofanewworkingbuildingandthe conferenceroom.Ho wever,itwasoftheopinionthatthereshouldbeabalancebetweenthe limitedresourcesandtheneedofmeetingservice.Itexpresseditssupporttotheviewsmade earlierbyotherdelegationsontheprovisionofadditionalparkingspacesfordelegates attendingWIPOmeetings.TheDelegationconcludedbyexpressingitssupporttothe proposalsonthenewconstructionbudgetandthebudgetforthe2002 -2003biennium.
- 16. The Delegation of Belarus, speaking on behalf of certain countries of Central Asia, Caucasus and Eastern Europe, expressed it shope that the 10 -year discussion on the new construction would finally be completed.
- 17. TheDelegationoftheRussianFederation,speakingonbehalfofthesameregional group,commendedthe SecretariatandtheExternalAuditorfortheclearandexhaustivework presentedinthedocuments.ItwasoftheopinionthatthereportbytheExternalAuditoris well-founded,convincinganddeservingoftheCommittee'sfullattention.However,itnote theincreaseinthefinancialceilingwhichrequirestheCommitteetoapproachtheissuewith caution.TheDelegationexpresseditshopetofinallyadoptadecisionabouttheconstruction becauseadelaywouldresultincostincreases.Itexpresseditsiewthatwhileitwillbe possibletorecommendtotheMemberStatesofWIPOtoendorsetheprojectbudgetand revisedprogramfor2002 -2003,itmightbenecessarytorevisetheexistingcontrolsystems governingthepresentimplementationofthebudgetandthereserves.
- 18. TheDelegationofMexicoexpresseditsgratitudetotheFederalAuditOffice,the architectandtheSecretariatfortheireffortsinpresentingthedocumentsforthissession.It expresseditssupporttothebudgetof190.5 millionSwiss francsforthenewconstructionof thenewbuilding,includingtheconferencehall,notingthatthiswillnothaveanadverse effectontheOrganization'sdevelopmentcooperationactivities.Itassociateditselfwiththe concernsexpressed byotherdelegationsregardingadditionalparkingspacesandstorage space.Italsoexpresseditsconcernonthedelayofthenewconstructionasthesedelaysalso translateintobudgetincreases.
- 19. TheDelegationofLatvia,speakingonbehalf oftheCentralEuropeanandtheBaltic States,praisedtheFederalAuditOfficeforitsexcellentworkonthedocumentsprovided.It expresseditsregretontheinaccuraciesintheinitialassessmentofconstructioncostsandthe delaysoftheconstructionprocesseswhichcontributedtoadditionalcostsfortheproject.It expresseditshopethatthecomingAssemblieswilladopttheproposalandtheconstruction couldstartimmediately.
- 20. TheDelegationofEgyptcommendedtheSecretariatand theFederalAuditOfficefor theexcellentreportsprovided.ItexpresseditssupporttotheSecretariat'sproposalsasthey are essentially in line with the report of the Federal AuditOffice, and that adopting these proposals should not have an adverse effect on WIPO's cooperation for development activities. It associated itself with the opinion expressed by the Delegation of Mexico

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regardingparkingspacesfordelegates. As regards the conference hall, it expressed its agreement to the views of the International Bureauthatworking and flexibility needs in conference planning should be considered.

- The Delegation of Venezuela commended the Secretaria tand the Federal Audit Office fortheexcellentdocumentation. Itrecognized the need fo rWIPOtoworkinanefficientand effectivemanner, as well as facilitating the work of the delegations. It associated itself with the statements made by the Delegation of the United States of America on behalf of Group В asregardstotheincreaseinth enumberofworkingspaces. Italso associated itself with the viewsexpressedbytheDelegationofIndiawithregardstotheneedtoincreaseparking  $spaces both for WIPO officials and for delegates. It expressed its hope that approving the current proposalwillnothave anadverseeffectonthecooperationfordevelopmentactivitiesoftheOrganization.Finally, itsaiditwasnotinapositiontoendorsethesuggestionoftherepresentativeofGroupB aboutconvertingthisCommitteeintoasupervi sorybody.

Itwasoftheviewthatthenon -availabilitytotheotherprogramsofthe amount to be spent on the new constructions hould be recognized. The Delegation expressed havingdifficultiesunderstandinghowitwouldbepossiblethatsuchuseoffundswouldn ot affecttechnicalcooperationandotheraspectsoftheOrganization's business. It further stated thatasregardstoparking, it was concerned to hear that somany delegates had to park illegallyaroundthebuildingandmentionedthataconferencefacil ityatthe Palais offersufficientparkingspaces and therefore reduce the delegate sparking problem, in sisting thatthetwoissueswerelinkedandthatitwouldalleviatetheproblemtosomeextent. The Delegation further expressed its support of thestatementmadebyGroupBinrelationto projectmanagement, so that the recommendation contained in the External Auditor's report be put in place. It also supported the comments made by the Delegation of Venezuela as to the properties of the properthenumberoftechnicalrevisio nsthatseemedrequiredontheproject.Itconcludedbysaying that the United Kingdom would not be in a position at the present time to recommendapproval of the construction plant othe Assemblie suntil such planis revised by incorporating the comments made in the External Auditor's report. It also stated not being in a position at this stage to approve the proposed budget of 190.5 millionSwissfrancs.
- 23. TheDelegationofHondurassupportedtheSecretariat'sproposalonthenew construction,includingtheconferencehall,provideditdidnotaffectdevelopmentprograms. ItexpresseditsconfidencethatundertheDirectorGeneral,thebudgetforthenew constructionwouldbehandledwisely,effectivelyandinatransparentmanner.Astoth

parkingarea, its upported the views of other delegations as to the importance of having enough parking spaces.

- The Delegation of the United States of America conveyed its appreciation to all who hadbeeninvolvedinpreparingtheupdatedanalysisofthebuildingprojectandallthe associated supporting documents. The Delegations aid it had one main concern related to the methodoffinancingtheproject. It stated that the concern was not the estimated amount but ratherhowthefinancing wouldbesecured. It continued that therewere several aspects to the issue, but wished to focus on what it believed to be its two main aspects: first, whether WIPO assumedfortheforeseeabletermoftheproject(forthenextsevenyears), an annuales timate ofincreasedworkload, particularly for the applications filed under the PCT, ranging from seventoninepercent. Second, concerning WIPO estimates of internal saving stobederived from its investments in Information Technology Projects. In both cases, the Delegation -foundedatthispointoftime. Its aidthat, for the first deemedtheestimatesnottobewell timeinmanyyears, the USPTO had experienced negative filings in the range of minus one percentcompared to the same time last year. I tsaiditwasnotyetabletoevaluateforhow longthattrendwouldcontinueasitdependedoneconomic variables. The Delegation believedthatgrowthonfilingsunderPCTforthenearfuturemightnotexceedsixpercent andmightpossiblygrowbynomo rethanfourpercentannually, assuming the rewould be some slight positive growth between now and the end of the calendar year. TheDelegationofCanadaconveyeditssu pporttotheChairmanandexpressedits appreciationtotheSecretariat,theFederalAuditOfficeandthearchitectfortheirworkin preparingthismeeting.Itsaidthatitremainedconcernedwithregardtotheconferenceroom, statingthattheannualre portsoftheUnitedNationsCommitteeonconferencesregularly reportedsignificantunder -utilizationofUN -ownedconferencefacilitiesinGeneva,and continuedthatastheExternalAuditor'sreporthighlighted,therewasnocleareconomic argumentsofar thathadbeenmadetosupporttheconstructionofanewconferenceroom.It

acknowledgedthattherewerefactorsotherthancoststhatneededtobeconsidered. These factorsincludedthelong -termneedsoftheOrganization, the convenience of having a conference roominclose proximity of existing WIPO facilities and the opinions expressed by several other WIPO members that conference spaceduring the busy period from September to Maywasa tapremium. Finally, it wished to highlight that in its view the rewas no convincing economicar gument to be made in support of the new conference room and, in light of the 118 percent increase over the original budget approved in 1998, it was not persuaded that other factors should compel the Member States to support the construction of a conference room at this time. It also said that it remained willing to take into consideration the views and positions of other Member States.

- TheDelegationofJapanexpresseditssupporttothestatementmadebyGrou pBand wishedtoreiterateitsappreciationtotheFederalAuditOfficeforitsfairanddetailedanalysis on the construction project as well as to the International Bureau for its efforts in preparingthedocumentsforthisCommitteeandprovidingacces stoMemberStates,intheformof informalsessions, to this evaluation process. It also highlighted three additional points: it firstexpresseditsregretsthattheexpensescameouttobemorethantwicethefigureinitially approvedin1998and,ther efore,consideredthatanevaluationofthisprojectshouldbedone ascost -effectivelyaspossibleandexpensesshouldbereducedtothetrulynecessaryones. Second, its aidthat this project had already been postponed for four years and stressed that furtherdelayscouldgeneratefurtherexpenses and should therefore be avoided. It stated its hopethatthisprojectbeapprovedforimplementationasearlyaspossible. Finally, assuming that construction plans be established, it reiterated its wish that MemberStatesbekeptwell informed on the implementation of the project by the International Bureau and that the plan be efficientlyexecutedstagebystageasplanned.
- 27. TheDelegationofEcuadorremindedthatitwasoneoftheMemberState swhich requestedtheAuditreportasproposedwithinthisCommittee.ItthankedtheFederalAudit Officeandthearchitectfortheworktheyhaddone.ItalsothankedtheSecretariatforthe reportspresentedontheissueofthenewconstruction.Itst atedhavingnodifficultyin approvingtheprojectinsofarasthetechnicalandfinancialrecommendationsweretakeninto account.ItexpresseditssupportforanumberofcommentsmadebytheDelegationof Venezuelaandassociateditselfwiththecomment smadebyGroup B,theUnitedKingdom andtheUnitedStatesofAmerica.
- 28. TheDelegationofGermanyexpresseditsgratitudetotheFederalAuditOfficeforits reportaswellastothearchitect.ItsupportedthestatementmadebytheUnitedS tatesof AmericaonbehalfofGroupB.TheDelegationmadetwofurtherremarks:relatingtothe conferenceroom,itnotedthatstrategicdemandssometimescanoutweighprofitability aspects.HavingreadtheAuditor'sreportandhavingstudiedthediffer entoptionsproposed, itsupportedtheconstructionofanewconferencehall,provideditwasadjustedtothe requirements.Relatingtoparkingfacilities,itsupportedtheInternationalBureauonits suggestiontolookfurtherintothematter,particular lytocovertheneedsofdelegateshaving difficultiesinattendingWIPOmeetings.
- 29. TheDelegationoftheUnitedStatesofAmericaexpresseditssupportforWIPO'seffort tosecureappropriateofficefacilitiestoensurethemosteffectivea ndefficientmanagementof theOrganization.Ithoweverquestionedthejustificationofthe650 -seatconferencefacility. ItnotedthattheFederalAuditOfficereportstatedtherewasnoeconomicjustificationfor buildingsuchafacility.Italsonote dwithconcerntheplanforadditionalunderground storagespace, statingitdidnotunderstandthebenefitsofsuchadditionalstorage, particularly

givenits 13 million Swiss francscost. Ittherefore expressed its support for the WIPO building project without the additional storage space and without the conference facility. It added that it believed that the budget allocation in a range between 144 and 158 million Swiss francs was more reasonable, based on WIPO's current needs and resources. It furthe recommended that WIPO rent these roices of a professional private contractor to oversee the management of the building project.

- 30. TheDelegationofFrancesupportedthestatementmadebytheDelegationoftheUnited StatesofAmericaonbeh alfofGroupB.TheDelegationalsoindicateditwasverypleased bytheeffortsundertakenbytheExternalAuditor,thearchitectsandtheSecretariat,keeping MemberStatesinformed.Itfoundthereportstobeveryusefultounderstandtheevolutionof thecostoftheproject.Inordertolimitcosts,ithopedthatfundssetasideforunexpected costswouldnotbeexceeded,thatthenumberofworkspacesbeincreasedtothemaximum andthatasystembeestablishedinordertoallowMemberStatestobec ontinuouslyupdated andinformedabouttheprogressoftheproject.
- 31. The Delegation of Guatemalaassociated itself with the statements made by other delegations, in particular, those made by the United States of America and the United Kingdom, questioning the useful ness of having a conference hall.
- The Chairnoted the appreciation and satisfaction conveyed by several delegation stothe Secretariat, the Federal Audit Office and the architect for their efforts inputting to gethe rthe documents for this meeting, the support most delegations expressed on the proposal by the Secretariat, the desire expressed by a number of delegations not to delay the decision -making process, the need for assurance, expressed by some delegations, th atthebuildingactivities willnothaveanadverseeffectonthecooperationfordevelopmentprogramsofthe Secretariat, and the great importance placed on the proposed increase in the Organization's workingspaces. Itwentontomention theneed, felt byanumber of Delegations, to a bide by the technical requirements and suggestions of the External Auditor. The Chair went onto saythatwhilethereweredelegationssuggestingtomakegreateruseofUNOGfacilities,there wereal sothosewhostressedtheneedforautonomyandindependenceinlightofthefuture  $needs of the Organization. - 33. TheSecretariat,inresponsetothequestionsraisedbytheDelegati onoftheUnited StatesofAmericaonfundingandprojections,referredtoparagraph76ofthedocument WO/PBC/5/2,whichshowedthatbudgetaryrequirementswerefundedfromacombinationof theprojectedannualincomestreamandavailablereserves.Itno tedthataspartofthe previousreform,thespecialreservefundforpremiseshadbeenintegratedwiththereservesof theUnions.Thosereservesformedpartoftheresourcesavailabletofundthebiennialbudget, includingthebuildingandinformationt echnologyprojects.Thiswasdonewhilemaintaining thereservesatthelevelapprovedbyMemberStates,whichitwasapproximately18percent ofthetotalbiennialbudget.Itnotedthatexaminationofthefundingrequirementsforthe

construction projectwas done in conjunction with the funding requirements of the Organizationasawhole. This was seen to avoid the build upofexcessivereserveswhichhad beendoneinthepast. This also implied, however, that no separate project reserves for the constructionprojectwereestablishedandthatnodistinctionwasmadebetweenfunding comingfromannualincomeorreserves. Inordertoexaminethefundingrequirements, the Secretariatnotedthatthecostoftheconstructionamountedto 190.5 millionSwiss francs while the audited reserves at the end of 2001 amounted to 264.4 million Swiss francs. Althoughthereserves were not used entirely to fund the construction, the available resources providedasecureandsubstantialfundingsource. Theinformation onreserveswas supplemented by projections on income and expenditure up to the year 2009. Those projectionsprovidedonescenariotoillustratethemagnitudeofflexibilityavailabletothe Organizationandillustratedthelong -termsavingsassociatedw iththeavailabilityofanew administrativebuildingandtheautomationofthePCTsystem. This was indicated in Table 15ofdocumentWO/PBC/5/2, with the dramatic rise in the surplus based on the improvementoftheOrganization'scoststructure.Itstr essed, however, that the Organization would advocate the generation of surpluses. Rather, this should be seen as an indication only of the magnitude of flexibility for developing new activities or adjusting fees. Decisions on budget,incomeandfeeswoul dbetakeninthecontextofthebiennialbudgetexercise.The projectionsillustratedjustonescenariotoemphasizetherelevanceoftheconstructionproject inthelonger -termcontext. With regard to projections on the level of application sunder PCT, itwasnotedthattheSecretariathadunder -estimated the number of applications and revenue inthepast. The Secretariat was of the view that the new projections constituted a marked improvementascomparedtopreviousefforts, while maintaining as omew hatconservative approach. Inearly 2001, the initial assumption for PCT amounted to 114,000 applications in 2002. Despite the slow down at the end of 2001 and the beginning of 2001, this estimate was a support of the property of themaintainedinthecurrentprojections. Threemonthsp riortotheendof2002,theSecretariat wasinapositiontoreconfirmthatthistargetwouldbemetin 2002.Moreover.the SecretariatstatedthatitsprojectionincludedindicationsfromtheUnitedStatesPatentand TrademarkOfficeforUnitedStateso fnogrowthinUSapplicationsbetween2001and2002. Withregardtofutureyears, projections reflected a conservative approach with a growth rate oftenpercentin2002decliningtosevenpercentin2006. This compared to a growth rate of over20per centduringrecentyears. Moreover, it was noted that lower than anticipated application rates would automatically translate into lower budget ary requirements. Hence, adjustmentsonfilingapplicationswouldhavealimitedimpactontheoverallfinancia scenario. With regards to the budget arvimplications of the information technology IMPACT project, the Secretariat stated that substantials aving swere anticipated once the project became operational. The details on the extent of such savings, however, wouldonlybecome clearoncesomeexperienceintheoperationofthenewsystemwouldbeavailable. With regardstotheprovisionofadditionalparkingfordelegates, the Secretariat clarified that the basicrequirementsandconditionsfortheconstructi onofthebuildingandtheadditional parkingplaceswerebasedonthelocaldistrictplan(PLQ). The Secretaria tpointed out that thecurrentPLQauthorized280undergroundparkingplacesonly. This is there as on why, the Secretariatstated, additional storagespace had been reserved for possible conversion into parkingplaces in the future, subject to authorization by the Geneva authorities. The Secretariatreferredtoparagraph16ofdocumentWO/PBC/5/2proposingfurtherstudyofthe issueandassured the Committee that the Secretaria two uldundertake the study in view of strongsupportbyanumberofdelegationsonthesubject. Withregardstothenumberof workplaces, the Secretaria tintends to increase the number of working places from 500 to 560 as recommended by the Federal Audit Office. The Secretaria tassured the Committee that it a superficient of the Committee owould explore the possibility of maximizing the number of working places. With regards to projectmanagement, the Secretaria treferred toparagraphs 285 and 286 of d ocument

With regards to the reporting structure, the Secretariat stated that it would review theproposalofestablishingacertainbodyormechanismundertheProgramandBudget Committeetooverseetheworkofthenewconstructionproject. TheSecretariatexplainedthe difficulties in reserving, within areas on abletime -frame, suitable meeting rooms in Geneva for WIPO meetings. What was usually available was the large assembly hall in the **Palaisdes** Nationswhich, withitsmorethan 1,300s eats,appearedtobetoobigforWIPOwhilenot havingsmallerroomsavailableforcoordinationmeetings. Its tressed the advantages of buildingtheconferencehallasproposedbytheOrganization.

- 34. TheSecretariatfurtherindicatedthatani ncreaseto560workingplaces,representingan increaseof60 additionalworkplaces,wouldbepossibleaccordingtotheinitialanalysis undertakenbytheengineeringcompaniesandarchitect.Itexpressedreservations,however, onincreasingtheworkplace sbeyond560.Itwasoftheviewthatadditionalstudieswouldbe neededtolookintothatpossibility.TheSecretariatpointedoutthatitwouldbetechnically possibletoincreasetheworkplacesupto650accordingtothearchitect,butthiswould dependontheconfigurationsoftheofficestobeadoptedaccordingtothespecific organizationalunitsoccupyingthebuilding.TheSecretariatfurtherstatedthattechnical requirementsmadebytheAuditorwouldbesubjecttofurtherstudybytheengineerin g partnersandarchitectsfromOctoberuntilDecemberthisyear.TheSecretariatassuredthe Committee,however,thatitintendedtofollowalltechnicalrecommendations,particularly, theenergycost -savingrequirements,ventilation,air -conditioning,et c.
- 35. Thearchitectprovidedadditionalclarificationasfollows:withregardstotheworking places,itaddedthatthebuildinghadbeenplannedforacertainamountofworkingspacesin conformitywiththerequirementsofWIPO.However,therewasflexibilityintheuseofthe building.Suchflexibilityintheworkingplaceswoulddependonthespecificconfigurationto beadoptedofthevariousroomsinresponsetotherequirementsofthebuildingoccupants.It pointedoutthatitsawnop robleminincreasingthenumberofworkplacesfrom500to560, orevento 600.
- 36. TheDelegationoftheUnitedKingdomsaidthattheneedtoincreaseworkplaceswasof primaryimportance. TheDelegationpointedoutthataccordingtoparagraph 259ofpage 58 ofdocumentWO/PBC/5/3, the area and volume perworking place appeared to be to ohigh and should be reviewed. It requested clarification from the Secretaria ton what would be the optimum number of work places that the Organization could hope for within the current design configuration.
- 37. The Secretariats aid that it would review the maximum number of working places that could be considered within current constraints as the possible technical target for the readjust ment of technical specifications. On this point, the architect confirmed that it might be possible to put up to 600 people in the administrative building while maintaining current structures. It noted, however, that the level of comfort would be reduced with the increase in the number of working places. The Secretariat clarified, however, that since certain are as of its operations, such as finance and registration systems, required a certain degree of confidentiality and dealt with sensitive information, different criteria on working space configurations should be applied to the mascompared to other sectors. Therefore, it could be difficult from a practical point of view to reach the indicated maximum capacity of the administrative building. However, efforts would be made to explore the creation of the

maximumpossiblenumberofworkingplacesbaseduponadditionaltechnicalstudies.Onthe issueofspaceefficiency,theSecretariatunderlinedthefactthatthenewbuildingwouldnot onlybeanintelligentofficebui lding,butitwouldalsobeabuildingintegratedwithother WIPOpremises.Commonfacilitiesavailableatthenewbuildingwouldserveother premises,suchastheex -WMObuilding,whichlackedpropermeetingroomsandother requiredfacilities.

- 38. TheDelegationoftheUnitedStatesofAmericaexpresseditsreservationsastothe financialschemeandrequestedconfirmationsconcerningthefactthatPCTfeeswereindeed projectedtoremainunchangedinthenextseven -yearperiod.Concernwasal soraisedonthe underlyingassumptionsforthefinancingoftheproject,includingthemixofcurrentincome versustheuseoffeereserves,asthatbalancecouldmodifyfeeprojectionsduringproject implementation.
- Referringtoparagraph 59ofdocumentWO/PBC/5/2withregardtoPCTfees,the secretariatnotedthatfeesweremaintainedatthe2002levelwhileawaitingdecisionsonthe PCTreformwhichwasanticipatedtoresultinamajorchangeofthefeestructure.It anticipatedthatsuc hdecisionswouldbetakenbytheendof2003andgointoeffectasof January 1, 2004. It further indicated that all projections and assumptions, particularly income estimates, wouldbere -assessed in spring 2003 as part of the budget process for the 2004-2005biennium.Ontheissueofthefundingmixfortheprojectandthepossible over-estimationofprojections,theSecretariatreferredtoTable14indocumentWO/PBC/5/2 which contained in come information and estimates for PCT from 1996 to 2009. Desp itethe slowdownexperiencedduringthefirsthalfofthisyear,agrowthrateof10percentwas confirmedfor 2002. The Secretariatad opted a conservative approach by anticipating the growthratetodeclineinthecomingyears. The Secretariat furthe documentWO/PBC/5/2whichindicatedthatasurpluswouldbeanticipatedasof2006.With the completion of the new construction in 2007, the cost structure in would be reduced due to the completion of the new construction of the new conslowerrentalcostsandahighersurpluswasan ticipatedtogrowsubstantiallyduring 2008 and 2009. Anticipated surpluses could be utilized either for new activities or adjustmentsinfees.
- 40. TheDelegationoftheUnitedStatesofAmericaunderlinedtheimportanceof approachingthepropo sedcostofthenewconstructionproject,theissueofthefundingmix andPCTfeelevelsandanticipatedreservesinanintegratedfashioninordertoenablethe Assembliestofeelconfidentthatprovidedestimatesweresoundandreliable.Itreiterated concernthatsuchcurrentestimateswerenotrealisticandexpresseditswishforanattemptto re-evaluaterelevantassumptionsasbestaspossible.

- 41. The Secretariat stated that the approach chosen in the budget proposal was one among a number of alternatives, aimed at making maximum use of available funding. Alternatively, it would be possible to establish a project fundashad been the case in the past and to cover the total budget ary requirements of the project prior to the approval. This approach had led to reserve levels which we reconsidered excessive.
- 42. The Delegation of the United States reiterated its request for clarifications on the possibility of independently validating the assumptions and projections indicate din the document.
- 43. The Delegation of France requested the Secretariatto clarify on a number of issues. First on the issue of reserves, it noted that WIPO had those at very comfortable levels. It was

oftheviewthattheseshouldcoverthe financing of the building, provided that they were also sufficienttocovertheInformationTechnologyProjects.Secondly,itwishedtohave confirmation of annual rental costs, as this could be a point that even on its own would justify theinvestmentin thenewbuilding. It noted that an annual amount of 20 millionSwiss francs ofofficebuildingrentalcostsrepresented40 millionSwiss francsperbiennialbudget.This translates into the effective repayment of the investment on a period of tenyears. Thirdly, it noted the anticipated slowdown in the growth of PCT activities up to 2009. It did however noteadiscrepancybetweenthegrowthexpectedaccordingtoTable14ofdocument WO/PBC/5/2andtheincomegrowthmentionedinthesamedocumentandso ught clarificationsforthatapparentcontradiction. Fourthly, on the PCT reformand the flow offee income expected from that registration system, it noted that the so -called"ChapterII" preliminaryexaminationwasprobablygoingtoexperienceafairly sharpdeclineinactivity,  $as one of the aims of the PCT reform was to simplify the management of operations. The {\it matter than the properties of the properties o$ delegationestimated the income loss at 18 millionSwiss francsperyearandaskedtohearthe Secretariat's plans for offsetting that loss. Finally, concerning the maximum number of offices and office area, as that figures eemed to range between 600 and 700 working places, thedelegationwouldliketoknowthemodulesizeperworkingplaceusedintheplanningfor officespace.

- The Secretariat, in response to the questions of the Delegation of France, referred to 44. part IVofdocumentWO/PBC/5/2, whichindicated information and estimates on income. Thedatawaspresentedonanannualbasistoprovideabetterillustrationofthep astand futuretrends. In addition, the data included details on the number of registrations, average fee and total income by Unions. The Secretari at then referred to Table 2 indocumentWO/PBC/5/2whereincomefiguresweresummarizedbybiennia.Onthe issueofreserves, theSecretariatreferredtoTable15indocumentWO/PBC/5/2,whichindicatedareservelevel of 264.4 million Swiss francs at the end of 2001. It was noted that the previous reform of the reservearrangementaimedatdrawingdownther eservestoareasonablelevel. Asindicated inTable 15, this was being achieved with the implementation of a number of major projects, includingIMPACT, WIPO NET, ex - WMOrenovation and the new construction. A temporary declineinanticipatedreservesbel owrecommendedtargetsduring2004and2005wouldbe reversed with additional surpluses becoming available towards 2007 and beyond. The Secretariatclarifiedthatthere -evaluationofChapterIIincomewouldbepartofthePCT reformprocess, withits fina ncial consequences being part of the feereview. With regards to theestimatesunderotherincome, the Secretaria treferred to Table 13 on page 24 of document WO/PBC/5/2andelaboratedontheseveralelementslisted. It pointed out that the numberofworkplaceunitswould varydependingonthecategoriesofthestaffmembersoccupyingtheoffice. The Secretariat estimatedthat 560 workplaces could be achieved depending on the future of ficelayout. A number of workplaces beyond this one, however, wuld require further study.
- 45. Following the conclusion of the deliberations and consultations among members of the Committee, the Chair readaproposed draft decision paragraph and invited the members of the Committee to make comments regard in the draft text that has just been read.

- 46. The Delegation of Mexico expressed satisfaction with the draft decision text. It reiterated its support for the construction of the conference hall noting that the need was apparent and resources were available. It noted that officials attending WIPO meetings were sometimes forced to sit on folding chairs or to remain outside the present conference hall because of the lack of space in the room.
- 47. The Delegation of Algeria, speaking on behalf of the African Group, expressed satisfaction with the draft recommendation to the Assemblies. It noted the Secretariat's assurances that the studies on the additional parking spaces would not affect the deadline of the construction project and require uested information as to when the sest udies would be undertaken.
- 48. The Secretaria tassured themembers of the Committee that the study on additional parking spaces would be under taken as soon as the Assemblie sapproved the proposed construction project. This will be done between October and December 2002, before the finalization of the project 's technical design.
- 49. The Chairnoted the consensus on the proposed text for decision.
- 50. Withregardtoagendaitem4(Revi sedProjectBudgetfortheNewConstructionand RevisedProgramandBudgetfor2002 -2003),welcomingtheevaluationreportoftheExternal AuditorswhichprovidesasolidbasistofulfilthemandategivenbytheAssembliesattheir 36<sup>th</sup>sessioninSeptembe r2001(seedocumentA/36/15),aswellasausefulfoundationfor takingatimelydecisionattheir37 the session,theProgramandBudgetCommitteedecidedto recommendtotheAssemblyofMemberStates:

### (i) toapprove:

- (a) theconstruction of an administrative building as proposed in document WO/PBC/5/2, modified to maximize the number of working places, as well as to optimize the technical designinac cordance with recommendations to achieve costs saving sand efficiency gains;
- (b) theappointment, inacc ordance with WIPO procurement procedures, of an external consultancy firm to participate in project management;
- (c) thefurtherstudybythe InternationalBureauwithaviewto providingforadditionalparkingspaces andnecessaryconsultationswith Genevaauthorities;
- (d) theentrusting of the Program and Budget Committee with overseeing the construction project, in particular with

regardtothefinalizationofthetechnical design, receiving regular reports from the International Bureau, and the establishment of a consultation process, within the framework of the Program and Budget Committee, between interested delegations and the Secretariatin order to validate financial projections and underlying assumptions;

- (ii) totakenoteoftheInternational Bureau'sassurancesthattheimplementation oftheconstructionprojectwillnotaffectthe resourcesavailableforprogramsinthe frameworkofCooperationforDevelopment (PartIIIoftheProgramandBudget)orother priorityactivitiesoftheOrganization .
- (iii) totakeadecisionontheproposal (documentWO/PBC/5/2)toconstructa conferenceroom,onwhichtheProgramand BudgetCommitteewasnearconsensusin favor,takingintoaccounttheneedto coordinatewithUNOGinordertomaximize theutiliza tionofconferencefacilities.
- 51. The Chairthen opened the discussion on item 6 (other business) of the Agenda.
- 52. The Delegation of Egyptraised the issue of the availability of documents in Arabicat certainWIPOmeetings.Itnote dthat,accordingtoitsunderstanding,documentsinArabic we recurrently provided at three types of WIPO meetings: the Assemblies, DiplomaticConferences and the Program and Budget Committee. Given the growing importance of intellectual property issues , the Delegation requested the Secretariatto provided ocumentation in A rabicato ther WIPO meetings of a more technical nature in particular at meetings of the analysis of the properties of the propertieIntergovernmentalCommitteeonIntellectualPropertyandGeneticResources,Traditional KnowledgeandFolklore.IthighlightedtheimportanceoftheCommittee'swork,in particular, for developing countries. In this regard, it underlined that the availability of documentsinArabicwasessentialforaneffectiveparticipationbyArabicspeakingco untries. such as Egypt, in its work, especially given that the competent authorities following theseissues, as well as the holders of traditional knowledge themselves, were Arabic speaking. The Delegationrecalledthatithadputforwardthisrequestat allthemeetingsofthe IntergovernmentalCommitteeandthatitreceivedsupportfrommanydelegations.It indicated that at the last meeting of the Intergovernmental Committee, in June, the Secretariat hadpointedouttotheneedofbringingthisrequest totheattentionoftheProgramandBudget Committeeinordertoworktowardsitsimplementation.
- 53. TheSecretariatnotedtheproposalmadebytheDelegationofEgypt.Itassuredthe Delegationthatitwouldstudyitscostimplicationsfurthe raswellasitspossibleimpacton WIPO'scurrentpracticeregardingworkinglanguages.

- 54. The Delegation of Omanassociated itself with the statements made by the Delegation of Egyptregarding Arabictranslation. It also said that people in Omanin volved in the field of Traditional Knowledge and Folklore are generally Arabicspeakers, who do not speak any other language. It requested the Committee to make available resources that could be used for this purpose.
- 55. TheDelegationo fDenmark, speaking on behalf of the European Union and its Member States, raised the issue of financing the indigenous people's and local communities' participation to relevant meetings at WIPO. It referred the Committee to the draft report of the Junes ession of the Intergovernment al Committee on Intellectual Property and Genetic Resources, Traditional Knowledge and Folklore (document WIPO/GRTKF/IC/3/17 Prov.) and quoted the last sentence of paragraph 30 of the document: "... With regard to the financing of participation (of indigenous people and local communities that is), the Chair noted the explanations provided by the Secretariat that the Program and Budget Committee would look further into the issue and the present Committee (GRTKF) would therefore leathematter pending... "The Delegation sought the Secretariat's views on the possibility of implementing the recommendation.

56. The Delegation of Mexico expressed its support to the statements by the Delegation of Denmark and suggested that such consultations hould not be limited to the region al coordinators only but rather it should be opened to the Program and Budget Committee and to any interested member of the Organization.

- 57. The Delegation of Venezuela expressed its support for the proposal made by the Delegation of Mexico on broader consultations. Its tressed the need for promptaction, recalling the intentions made in the July meeting that a solution befound before the next Intergovernmental Committee meeting beheld.
- 58. The Secretariat stated that it would further study the cost implications of the proposal itself and the implication to other WIPO meetings. To this effect more specific information such as the number of Non -governmental Organizations (NGOs) to be invited would be needed.
