- 1. The WIPO Permanent Committee on Cooperation for Development Related to Intellectual Property ("the Committee") held its third session in Geneva at WIPO head quarters from October 28 to 29 and subsequently at the International Labour Organization head quarters from October 30 to November 1, 2002.
- 2. - 9. DiscussionswerebasedondocumentPCIPD/3/3.TheSecretariatnotedthattheguiding philosophyofthecooperationfordevelopmentactivitieswastoworkinpartnership, includingdevelopinganddevelo pedcountries,UnitedNationsorganizations,other intergovernmentalorganizationsandnon -governmentalorganizations.Itstressedthe importanceoftheexistingfunds -in-trustwhichhadcontributedbothintermsofqualityand quantityofcooperationfor developmentactivitiesandhighlightedtheachievementsofthe RegionalBureausandotherDivisionsoftheSector,obtainedthroughoutthereportingperiod.
- TheDelegationofBarbados, speaking on behalf of GRULAC, thanked WIPO, particularlytheCooperationforDevelopmentstaff,forthedocumentationprepared and expressed their full support and cooperation. Its tressed that the Cooperation for DevelopmentprogramwasacriticalelementofWIPO'sworkprogram, and that additional financial andhumanresourcesmustbemadeavailabletotheprogramtoensuretimelyand effectiveimplementationofthevarioustechnicalcooperationactivities. The Delegations aid thatitwouldliketoseethisincreasereflectedinthe2004 -2005budget.Itref erredtothe priorityareasforworkasfollows:traditionalknowledge,folkloreandgeneticresources, institutionbuilding, small and mediumenter prises (SMEs), human resource training, new informationtechnologies,e -commerceandintellectualproperty asatoolfordevelopment. Furthermore, it drew the attention, in particular, to the activities identified by Ministers and Heads of Intellectual Property Offices of Latin America and the Caribbean at their respectivemeetingsearlierthisyear. It expre ssed concernabout the cancellation of the WorldwidetoplaceonrecordtheimportanceofWIPO's assistance in financing the participation of

capital-basedexpert satWIPOmeetingsandstressedtheneedforWIPOtodistributefunding toensurethatbeneficiarycountriesderivethemaximumbenefit. Itrequested greater cooperationinthearea of promoting respect for intellectual property, especially by organizing workshopsorseminarsforlawenforcementofficials. Itreferred to the institution of Nationally/RegionallyFocusedActionPlans(NFAPs/RFAPs)andrequestedtohavebroader consultation within Member States in order to increase the benefits the refrom. Member States in order to increase the benefits the refromment of the results of the resuanyofthe issuesonWIPO'sagendawereofacrosscuttingnature, and therefore it was important that the Ministries befully involved in discussions on the identification of needs and priorities. A broadandresponsivevisionwasneededinordertoreali zeWIPO'smandateinhelping developing countries to participate in and benefit from the intellectual property system. This visionmustnotbelimitedtotechnical/infrastructuralissuesbut,rather,acknowledgeand incorporatetheresultsofimportantdev elopments in the field of intellectual property, while retainingatitscoreacriticalanalysisoftherelationshipbetweenintellectualpropertyand development. The Delegation referred to the Doha Ministerial Declaration on the TRIPS AgreementandPubl icHealthandtheReportoftheUnitedKingdomCommissionon Intellectual Property Rights, which contained a number of ideas that WIPO could consider pursuingwithitsMemberStates.

The Delegation of India, speaking on behalf of the Asian Gr oup,reiteratedtheGroup's appreciation for the dynamic leadership of the Director General. It said that the Group was $pleased with the cooperation activities that WIPO hadeng age dinfor the Asia and the Pacific \ref{prop:state}. \\$ regionandespeciallythankedtheDirecto roftheAsiaandPacificBureaufororganizing severalhigh -profileactivities, designed to strengthen the capacity of developing countries in theregiontofullyutilizetheintellectualpropertysystemforeconomic, socialand cultural development.It expresseditssatisfactionattheworkcarriedoutbyWIPO, statingthatinthe biennium2000 -2001,theCooperationforDevelopmentSectorhadassisteddeveloping countries to develop and maintain in tellectual property in frastructures. In that context the NFAPsprovidedpolicytoolsforenhancingtechnicalcooperation, particularly in modernizing intellectualpropertysystemssoastorespondtochallengessuchastheprotectionof traditionalknowledgeandfolkloreandthepreservationofbiodiversity.I tnotedtheefforts madebyWIPOtorespondtotheincreasingneedfortechnicalassistanceinmodernizingthe intellectualpropertysystemsofdevelopingcountries, including Least Developed Countries (LDCs). It highlighted the beneficial impact of the a utomationprojectinvolvingintegrated solutionsimplementedtoenhanceefficiencyandpromoteuseoftheindustrialproperty system.ItcommendedtheWIPOWorldwideAcademyforitsteaching,trainingandresearch servicesinintellectualpropertyandfor extendingitsprogramtoacademicinstitutionsand intellectual property of fices. It noted that equally encouraging have been the efforts of the CopyrightCollectiveManagementDivisioninassistingMembercountriesinsettingup appropriate infrastructu restocollectively meet the challenges faced by the copyright industry. The WIPO Digital Agenda had shown concrete results. The Delegation expressed confidence that WIPO would be successful as it was venturing into new areas. Moreover, it consideredthatthespecialprogramofWIPOrelatingtotheempowermentofSMEsrevealeda remarkable potential for development and wealth creation. Asiahad been in the forefront in recognizing that maintaining the creative instinctsofpeoplebyestablishingafavorableintellectualproperty(IP)environmentwas crucialforeconomicdevelopment.Furthermore,itsaidthatnotwithstandingthe

well-acknowledgedeffortsthatWIPOhadmade, furtherassistance in the region was needed to establish modern IP infrastructures and build lasting institutions. It finally urged the International Bureautoprovide enhanced allocation of resources for the Asian region under WIPO's Cooperation for Development Budget, particularly inhuman resourced evelopment, modernization, infrastructure development and in enhancing the capacity of countries to effectively enforce IP protection.

12. The Delegation of Algeria, speaking on behalf of the African Group, praised the quality of the work done in the field of cooperation for development, and expressed its gratitude to WIPO forits assistance to developing countries, which should continue so that they could introduceIPsystemssuitedtotheirneedsintermsofeconomic,technologicalandscientific development.Itmentionedtheeffortsmadenotablybytheregionalbureausi $technical assistance in a reassuch as the Worldwide Academy, computerization and the {\tt technical assistance} in a reasonable to the {\tt technical assistance} in {\tt tech$ modernization of the collective management of copyright. It considered that any intellectual propertysystemhadtobedesignedindueconsiderationoftheg eneralinterestofsocietyin termsofitsfundamentalrighttofood,health,educationandemployment.Anypatent protectionsystemhadtostrikeabalancebetweenprivateandpublicinterests, and hadto operateasaninducementsystemforresearchins cienceandtechnology.TheDelegation emphasized the importance to African countries of the Doha Declaration on the TRIPS Agreement and Public Health, as an instrument establishing the priority of public policy concerns, and of the flexibility introduced tothatendsothatintellectualpropertyrightsmight becomeaninstrumentworkingfordevelopment. In that connection it also mentioned the need to a lighthe TRIPS Agreement with the Convention on Biological Diversity and the need to be a simple of the property oftoachieveadequatepr otectionfortraditionalknowledge,geneticresourcesandfolklore. WIPO, asaUN specialized agency, should play a leading role in the intellectual property sphere. Development -related issues should be one of its priorities. It expressed the wish that WIPOusethereportsdrawnupinvariousintergovernmentalandnon -governmentalforums thathadconcernedthemselveswiththequestionofintellectualpropertyanddevelopmentas referencematerial with which to devise new programs for developing countries .Inorderto safeguarditspioneeringrole, WIPOshouldinvolveitselfineffortstopromoteLDC developmentandtocontinuetoworkoncoordinationbetweenWIPOandintergovernmental organizationsconcernedwithdevelopmentissues, notably the WTO, wit haviewtoproviding developing countries with appropriate technical assistance. The Delegation expressed the wishtoseeareaffirmationoftheprinciplesaccordingtowhichdevelopment -relatedissues shouldbetakenintoaccountbyWIPOinrelationto everyinstrumentdealingwiththe protection and enforcement of intellectual property rights, with the flexibility necessary for developing countries never the less being ensured in accordance with the Doha Declaration.Tothatend, development -related fields should be incorporated in the activities of the AdvisoryCommitteeonEnforcement.ItwastheresponsibilityofWIPOtomonitorthe difficulties experienced by developing countries, including LDCs, in the implementation and effectualuseofpresentint ellectualpropertysystems, including those that had to do with the protection of traditional knowledge and expressions of folklore. It concluded by recommending, in the name of the African Group, the creation of a multidisciplinary group of expertstodr awupareportonindustrialpropertyanddevelopment,inordertoguideWIPOin itstechnical assistance activities, and expressing the wish that the necessary financing be approved to encourage WIPO to intensify its cooperation with regional and subreginal organizationsconcerned within tellectual property rights. Finally, it recommended yearly sessionsfortheCommitteesothatamid -termreviewofWIPO'sactivitiescouldbe conducted.

- TheDelegationofSwedencommendedWIPOforthevarie ty, scope and coverage of the activities which had been specified indocument PCIPD/3/3. Itemphasized the importance of paragraph21whichreferstoprofessionalism,dedicationofthestaffofWIPO,thestaffofthe RegionalBureaux,thestaffoftheAca demyandofcoursethestaffofthenationalofficesin developing countries. The Delegation appreciated and wished to encourage the cooperation between WIPO and WTO, since it was important that the intellectual property system and its analysis of the property system and the property system ainterests and prope rimplementation were taken into account in the context of trade, which wasgovernedbytheWTO.TheDelegationconsideredtheNFAPsasaveryimportanttool and of value in incorporating the new issues of genetic resources, biodiversity, traditional knowledgeandfolklore; secondly, the Delegation welcomed the particular attention given to LDCsinthiscontext; and thirdly, it agreed with the necessity to include the private sector in theseplans. The Delegation welcomed the attention given to the judi ciary, and commended thepreparation of the book let on fundamental principles of copyright presented through comparative caselaw. Such material was needed in other fields of IPlawtoo. Its upported thecollectivemanagementactivitieswithregardtoco pyrightandfoundtheeffortsofregional cooperationinthiscontextgratifying. Furthermore, the Delegations aid that demystification effortsbyWIPOmustbeencouraged.Itstressedtheimportanceofelectroniccommerceas animportanttoolinnational andinternationaltrade.WIPO'scontinuedattentiontothisissue wasmostappropriate. The Delegationad vocated the continuing of activities related to SME's and concluded by expressing its appreciation for the Collection of Laws for Electronic Access(CLEA), which had proved to be a valuable tool.
- The Delegation of Benin, speaking on behalf of the Group of Least Developed Countries(LDCs) was pleased with the importance that the meeting had attached to LDCs, andthankedtheDirectorGener alandhiswholeteamforhavingdoneso.Itpointedoutthat the LDC category represented 49 States and 11 percent of the world's population. It described them any problems and constraints of various kinds that LDCs had to contend with, among the mextr emepoverty, their insignificant presence in world trade, the foreign debt with which already fragile economies were burdened, the weakness of human capital and the absence of a sound industrial fabricand technology base. It pointed out that those proble ms werecompounded by others connected with geographical location and/orthein ternal or externalshockscausedbynaturaldisastersorconflict. The Delegation drewattention to the undertakingsmadebytheinternationalcommunityinfavorofLDCs, anda objectives and deadlines set for the ending of LDC marginalization. It noted that, with that in mind, WIPO had short listed five means of action who serelevance has been amply proved, namelytheWIPO NETproject,theAcademy'shumanresourcesd evelopmentprogram, the collectivemanagementofcopyrightandrelatedrights, the protection of genetic resources, traditionalknowledgeandfolkloreandtheprogramforSMEs. Itstressed the importance of strengtheningtheLDCUnitwithaviewtoincrea singtheservicesrenderedtocountriesthat neededitsomuch. Itaddedthat such support hadtoin volvenotonly an increase in the budgetoftheUnitwithinWIPO,butalsotheprovisionbytheindustrializedcountries,which hadundertakentoreduceLD Cmarginalization,ofmultilateralfunds -in-trustearmarkedfor intellectual property cooperation with LDCs. It went onto say that the present new age of the knowledgeeconomymadetheefficientuseofknowledgethemostimportantfactorof international competitiveness, wealthcreation and social welfare improvement. Moreover, theprogressofLDCscurrentlydependedonthedevelopmentoftechnology, which was why itwasnecessaryforthemtoencouragetheiractivepopulationtocreate,acquire,dissemin ate anduseknowledgemoreefficientlyforthebenefitofeconomicandsocialdevelopment. The Delegationnoted that national intellectual property entities, regarded as the pillars of knowledge-basedeconomies, could enable national research and innovati onoperatorstoadapt todemandbyprovidingthemwithinnovativeideas. With the aid of the incentive sprovided

bysuchentities, the countries in question could invest more in research and development and benefit accordingly. Consequently the Delegatio nwished to see WIPO assistance to LDCs directed also towards support for the establishment of well -structured national intellectual property bodies capable of a dministering and enforcing intellectual property rights in those countries. It ended by welco ming the joint WIPO and WTO initiative on the one hand, and the joint WIPO -WTO workshop on the implementation of the TRIPS Agreement held in Dar es Sala a min April 2002 on the other. On behalf of the LDCs, it expressed its support for the action initiated by WIPO, and requested it to continue on the same lines for the sake of a better future for LDCs.

- 15. The Delegation of Switzerland commended WIPO for the quality of working documents and the overview presentation made by Mr. Castelo, and stated thatdecision -makers, economicoperatorsandthegeneralpublicshouldunderstandbetterwhatcouldbederived from IP as a precious to ol fore conomic de velopment. For illustration, the DelegationmentionedtheworkoftheInternationalBureauinthefie ldofgeneticresources,traditional knowledgeandfolklorethathadhelpedtohighlightthepositiveroleofIPindeveloping countries as well as in LDCs. The Delegationalsoexpressedtheimportanceofspecificareassuchasenforcementanduseof informationtechnology(IT)innationalIPoffices.Concerningthecooperationprogram,the DelegationsaidthatitsGov ernmentfeltencouragedtoparticipateinWIPOactivities, such as training,PCTsearchingoranewworkshoponinnovationsupportserviceslaunchedin2001 incooperationwiththeDirectorateofDevelopmentandCooperation(DDC),inadditionto bilateral activities which were more focused. It cited a cooperation program with the GovernmentofVietNam,launchedinJune2001forthreeyears,todevelopanIPsystemin various areas encompassing compliance with the TRIPS Agreement, including four seminars intheareasofTRIPS,copyright,industrialdesignandplantvarieties.Otheractivities includedstudyvisitsofVietnameseexpertstoEurope,developingtheITnetwork,translation ofinternationaltreaties into the local language, English -languagecour ses, establishinga modernlibraryandtrainingofjudges. These activities, once concluded positively, mightlead tootherusefulactivities.
- The Delegation of Egyptals osupported the statement conveyed by the Delegation of the Delegation ofAlgeriaonbeha lfoftheAfricanGroup.TheDelegationunderlinedtheimportancewhichit attachedtothisCommittee,namelyinmakingthedevelopmentdimensionplayacentralrole intheprotectionofIPwhiletakingintoconsiderationthespecialneedsofeachcountry .The Delegation referred to the report of the Commission on Intellectual Property RightsestablishedbytheUnitedKingdomSecretaryofStateforInternationalDevelopment,dealing with the integration of IP in national development policies. The Delegat ionwelcomedthe holdingofaForumonStrategicIssuesfortheFuture(seedocument PCIPD3/2Prov.).The PCIPD documents contained important information reflecting the importance of IP in serving a support of the property of theeconomic, social and cultural objectives. Egypthadbene fitedfromWIPO'sactivitiesinthe field of the use of IT, development of collective management and awareness programs in the varioussectors, undertaken by the Cooperation for Development Bureaufor Arab Countries, andlookedforwardforfurtherintensif iedcooperationafterthepromulgationofLawNo. 82 inJune 2002, onthe protection of IP, which was considered a historical turning point within theframeworkofEgypt'seffortstofullycomplywiththerequirementsoftheTRIPS Agreement. This Committe eshould not only confirm the activities of WIPO, but also stress, as a priority, the various flexibility as pects which were available to help developing countriestocomplywithinternationalcommitments.DocumentPCIPD/3/3didnotrefertotheDoha Ministerial Declaration, which in its parts related to the issue of public healthwas relevant for

thelegislativeadviceprovidedbytheWIPOtoitsMemberStates.InpreparingtheProgram andBudgetof2004 -2005,resourcesshouldbeincreasedforthecooper ationwiththose developingcountrieswhichwouldbepassingthestageofcontinuousmodernizationand developmentofIPwithalong -termperspectiveintheareasoftrainingofhumanresources, upgradingnationalinstitutionsandintensificationofSME's, traditionalknowledgeand geneticresources,inorderforcountriestoavailthemselvesofthemechanismsthathavebeen madeavailablebyWIPO.Cooperationwithnon -governmentalorganizationsandcivil societyshouldalsobeintensified.TheDelegationalsounderlinedtheneedofproviding translationofWIPOtechnicalmeetingsintheArabiclanguage.Finally,theDelegation expressedappreciationfortheInternationalBureau'sachievements.

- TheDelegationoftheDemocraticPeople'sRepub licofKoreasupportedthestatement madebytheDelegationofIndiaonbehalfoftheAsianGroup.Theprogressand achieve ments made during the period under review in the cooperation for development sectorwerecommendable. These achievements had contri butedtostrengtheningthecapacityof developing countries, LDC sinparticular, to fully utilize the intellectual property system for theireconomic, social and cultural development. In addition to WIPO meetings on a variety ofissuesrelatedtointellec tualproperty,organizedatinternational,regionalandnational level, the NFAPs had served as an effective strategic and policy to olforen hancing technical cooperation, and the NFAP implementation activities had practically contributed to meeting thesp ecificchallengesinmodernizingtheintellectualpropertysysteminbothdevelopingand LDCs. The Delegation expressed appreciation of other activities, such as WIPONET, the WIPOWorldwideAcademy, collective management of copyright and related rights, intellectualpropertyissuesrelatedtogeneticresources, traditionalknowledgeandfolklore and SMEs. Its tressed the important role of innovation promotion and of patent informationservicesprovidedbyWIPO.Inconclusion,theDelegationlookedforwar dtoWIPOfurther expandingits assistance to developing countries in the field of intellectual property, and asked the International Bureautoconsider increasing allocation for the participation of Asian countriesinmeetingsheldinGeneva.
- 18. The Delegation of Italy congratulated WIPO on its ambitious Cooperation for Developmentprogram, successfully implemented thanks to the support of multilateral and bilateraldonorsandthevisionofitsDirectorGeneral.Duringthereportingperiod,the GovernmentofItalyhadcloselycooperatedwithWIPOinawiderangeofactivities, particularlyinthearea of SMEs, with the adoption of the Milan Action Planin February 2001, and intraining, with high -levelactivitiesimplemented,togetherwiththeW WorldwideAcademy,inTurininthepasttwoyears.Theseprojectshadbeendulyreported inthedocuments. The Government of Italyattached great importance to the intellectual propertydomain, bearing in mindthat intellectual property was a keyele mentineconomic development, especially for LDCs. For the future, in addition to continuing towork with WIPOintheareas referred to, the Government of Italy would be open to exploring the possibility of cooperation in other sectors, with particular at tentiontotheneedsofdeveloping countries.
- 19. The Delegation of Malaysia supported the statement made by the Delegation of India on behalf of the Asian Group. In its view, the International Bureau had achieved the objective of improving national capacities, promoting international cooperation for development, modernizing and utilizing the IP system for economic, social, cultural and technological advancement of developing countries. The Delegation expressed satisfaction with the implementation of the Cooperation for Development program at the national and regional levels and commended Mr. Sabharwal for providing continuous support to the country. It

stressedthattheIPissueshouldnotbeconfinedtoprotection,butshouldalsobeusedasa toolforeconomic, social and cultural development. The Delegation was encouraged by the numberofinterregional, regional and national meetings or ganized, the holding of several high-profileactivities in the region, and by the utilization of WIPO's reg ularbudget.butalso the Japan Funds - in-Trust, UND Pandthe World Bankwhich added richness and diversity. MalaysiahasbenefitedfromtheJapanFITfortrainingofMalaysianofficialsinTokyo.The DelegationinformedtheCommitteethatMalaysiahadac tivelypromoted the Internettreaties. Inordertoensurethecontinued effectiveness and useful ness of IP systems, the objectives of IP-relatedactivitiesmustbesubjecttoconstant reviewandupdatingsoastoremainfullyconsiste ntwitheconomicandsocialgoalsofthe international community. The Delegation observed that the Permanent Committee should not beafraid of being innovative and creative in assessing the future of its cooperation for developmentactivities, and in maki ngsurethat IP -related technical assistance cooperation programswouldbefullyintegratedintonationaldevelopmentplansofMemberStates.A one-size-fits-allapproachtocooperationwouldnotbehelpful. The Delegation proposed that theInternational BureauseekguidancefromMemberStates,includingthroughaholisticand synergetic process, which would involve other organizations. In this regard, the Delegation acknowledgedWIPO'sstrategyofworkinginpartnershipwithothersinanumberofsector s. Inthisrespect, it noted that remarkable developments had taken place in the international arena, since the last meeting of this Committee. Among these, the Doha Ministerial Conference of the WTO. The importance of the Doha Declaration on the TRIPSAgreement and Public Health cannot be overstated. TheDelegationofMadagascarthankedWIPOandtheDirectorGeneralfortheir untiringeffortstomeetthechallengesfacingtheOrganization.Itwaspleasedwiththe progressmade in the enhancement of the ability of developing countries, and especially LDCs,tomakeuseofintellectualpropertyasafactorofeconomic,socialandcultural development. It welcomed the activities carried out under the action program for the benefit of LDC sandthejoint WIPO - WTO initiative. - 22. TheDelegationoftheRepublicof KoreathankedWIPO,foritsexcellentplanningand implementationofprograms. TheDelegationstatedthattheRepublicofKoreawasoneof themostsuccessfulbeneficiariesofWIPO'sactivities. ThankstoWIPO,theRepublicof Koreahadreachedanadvanc edlevelinallaspectsofintellectualproperty. TheDelegation alsomentionedimportantachievementsreachedbyWIPOandtheGovernmentofthe RepublicofKorea,namelyabilateralagreementtojointlyimplementcertaincooperationfor developmentactiv itiesforthebenefitofothercountries, ajointstudyoftheeffectofIPin high-techindustriesandajointtrainingprogram.
- 23. The Delegation of Tunisiathanked Mr. Casteloand the Cooperation for Development BureauforArabCountriesfor theaidandsupportgiventoitscountry. Itendorsed the statement made by Algeria on behalf of the African Group. It had noted with interest theDirectorGeneral'sstrategydesignedtostrengthentheroleofnationalofficeswithaviewto developing and modernizing intellectual property systems and using them more efficiently. TheDelegationmentionedacertainnumberofoperationsconductedinitscountrywith WIPO'ssupport,namelythetrainingandsensitizingofanumberofpersonsinauthorityin Tunisia with respect to intellectual property law, the modernization and computerization of industrial property and the organization of technical seminars on the PCT following Tunisia'saccession to that Treaty. In that connection, the Delegation declareditselfimpressedbythe energy,competenceandflexibilitythattheBureauhadshowninrespondingtotheneeds expressed. It pointed out that the very useful assistance of WIPO was at present essential to prepareotherstakeholdersforthenewglobalec onomicchanges.Itadded,moreover,that other operators deserved to be trained and informed more in such areas as small and mediumsizedindustrialandcraftenterprises. The Delegation requested the assistance of the International Bureauinachievingt hoseobjectives and implementing the global cooperation projectwithTunisia.
- 24. The Delegation of Zambia associated itself with the statement made by the Delegation of Algeria on behalf of the African Group, and by the Delegation of Beninon be half of LDCs, and commended the International Bureau for its assistance to Africa, and in particular LDCs,

aswellasforitsinitiativesimplementedintheregion. Itacknowledgedtheachievementsin theareasoflegislation, strengtheningofinstitutions, administrationof IP and human resources development as the pillar of success. The Delegation recommended that more resources be made available for the Africa Bureau in order to enable it to carry out its out reach and demystification programs, training , modernization of IP offices and provision of assistance to research and development in stitutions. This way, SMEs, inventors, researchers, traditional knowledgeholders, artists and other creators would be encouraged to use IP as a tool for wealth creation. The Delegation concluded that strengthening the LDC Unit might be one way to positively translate Member States' statements about their difficults it uation into concrete action.

- The Delegation of Spainpointed out that the Spanish Patent andTrademarkOfficewas engagedinanintensivetaskofinternationalcooperationinthefieldofintellectualproperty. Among the activities programmed for the current year it mentioned the Latin Americanmeetingtopublicizepatentissues, organizedi ointlywithINPIBrazil,andtheseminar organizedwiththatsamecountry, WIPOandthe European Patent Office (EPO) on industrial propertyinformation and the PCT for the benefit of Latin American countries. The seminar wouldmakeitpossibleforsearch filesofSpanish -languagepatentdocumentstobecompiled. The Delegation also mentioned the collaboration that the Spanish Patent and TrademarkOfficehadstartedthatyearwithIbero -Americanoffices, taking the form of seminars and regionalworkshopst opublicizethenewNiceClassificationinSpanishandthetrainingof patentexaminers, the latter carried outjointly with IMPIMexico. Bilateral collaborative arrangementswereinplacewithChina,Mexico,Panama,Portugal,theRussianFederation, and Uruguay, and activities were being carried on in Spainitself. The Delegation spoke, moreover, of initiatives relating to the enforcement of intellectual property rights, saying that its country hadjoined WIPO and the EPO in sponsoring training and awarenessactivitiesfor Ibero-Americanjudgesandprosecutors. Inconclusion, itrepeated its country's interestin contributing to a strengthening of international cooperation in the intellectual property field.
- The Delegation of Morocco suppor ted the proposal made by the African Group, and expressed the wish that the Group's Coordinators hould submit it separately to their Committee for assessment. It mentioned the cooperative action conducted in the course of recentyears, which had had a con siderablybeneficial effect, both in its own country and in otherbeneficiary countries. That action consisted, on the one hand, in the computerization of the Moroccan Industrial and Commercial Property Office, which had significantly improved theperform anceofeconomicoperators, and on the other hand the cooperation between the Worldwide A cade my and the Law Faculty of Casablanca, which had resulted in the account of the control of thintroduction of the graduated iplomain in tellectual property studies (DESS). The Delegation $also\ informed the Committee that the development of intellectual property structures had been$ madepossiblethankstoWIPO'ssupport,andinturnhadcontributedtotheconductofa number of initiatives that fitted into the framework of South-Southcooperation . Among those initiatives, itmentioned the participation of officials of Araband African countries in training sessions, and also study tours. The Delegation finally invited WIPO to consider the possibilityofintroducingatrainingsystemfortrainers atregionalandsub -regionallevelfor allareasofintellectualproperty, and said that its country would be willing to host an initiative ofthatkind.
- 27. The Delegation of Uruguay subscribed to what had been said by the Representative of GRULAC, and recognized the important part played by the Cooperation for Development program in the demonstrable improvement of all aspects of intellectual property in the countries of the region. It acknowledged the valuable support that WIPO had given its

countryintheupgradingofitscopyrightlegislation, which could be expanded to include the preparation of training and general information material on the principles of the new copyright and related rights legislation that was going to be implemented sho rtly. It likewise pointed to the benefits derived from the seminars and for umsorganized by its Government in concert with WIPO, and the study on the relevance of cultural industries to the Gross Geographical Product of MERCOSUR countries. It concluded it ham ention of the need to increase the resources set as ide for the Cooperation for Development program, in order that the ever more complex difficulties represented by intellectual property might be contended with, and acknowledged the importance of the Permanent Committee for the discussion of such problems.

- The Delegation of Jamaicathanked Mr. Casteloforhis presentation and Mr. Roca CampañáandhisteamintheCooperationforDevelopmentBureauforLatinAmericaandthe Caribbeanfort heircontinuedsupportofJamaica'scooperationactivities.Itrecalledthatat thelastsessionoftheCommittee,theJamaicanIntellectualPropertyOffice(JIPO)hadjust beenestablishedonemonthprior.Sincethen,JIPOhadbenefitedtremendouslyfro WIPO'stechnicalassistancetobuilditscapacity, and to respond Jamaica's intellectual propertyneeds. The Delegation emphasized that further assistance, particularly in the area of automationandtraining, was critical as the Office consolidates effo rtstoensurethatit deliversqualityservicetoJamaica'sintellectualpropertystakeholders.TheDelegation informed the Committee that national seminars were required to further sensitize IP officialsintheareaofprotectionandpreservationofbiol ogicaldiversity,traditionalknowledgeand expressionsoffolkloreaswellasforSMEs. The Delegation stated that on March 12,2002, JamaicahaddepositedtheinstrumentsofaccessiontotheWCTandtheWPPT.The Delegationsaidthatanationalseminar wasneededtoimplementactiononthesetreaties, as wellasaworkshopforinventorsandoneonthebenefitsofthePCT,towhichJamaicawould beacceding in the near future. The Delegation indicated that World Intellectual Property Day andJamaica'sn ationalintellectualpropertyweekwerepartofJamaica'seffortstoincrease awarenessandunderstandingofintellectualpropertyrights(IPRs)andtheirimportanceto nationbuildingandsocio -economicdevelopment.Ontheseoccasions,outreachprograms were executed with tertiary institutions, the Jamaica Federation of Musicians and law enforcementofficers. The Delegation thanked WIPO for the assistance provided in favor of collectivemanagementintheCaribbean.Finally,theDelegationexpresseditgratitudeto WIPOforsupportingtheWIPOMinisterial -LevelMeetingonIPforCaribbeancountries. The WIPO Ministerial Meeting on IP for Caribbean Countries provided Caribbean Ministers with the opportunity to reflect on the IP needs of the sub-region, and to devise strategies for addressingthem. Atthelastmeetingheldin Suriname, on June 3 and 4,2002, Ministers recognized the need for developing a strategy to assist Caribbean countries in promoting respectforIPRs, and the use of the IPsystem by Caribbeancountries. The Delegation informed the Committee that at the Fourth Ministerial-LevelMeeting,Ministersadopteda resolution requesting WIPO to commit the requisiteres our cesto assist Caribbean countrieswith the planning and implementation of public awareness and enforcement campaigns in individual countries. The Delegation expressed the hope that this and other resolutions adoptedbyMinisterswouldbeimplemented.
- 29. TheDelegationofCostaRicaendorsedthestatementmadebythe Representative of GRULAC, and pointed to the importance that its country attached to the development of intellectual property, as it was through its protection that human creativity, science and technology were stimulated and the world of literature and the artsenriched. It was especially supportive of WIPO's priorities regarding such things as the demystification of intellectual property, the modernization of infrastructures, the digital program, the broadening of

programsconcerningtraditionalknowled ge,geneticresourcesandfolklore,electronic commerceandassistancetoSMEs.Itemphasizeditscountry'sdesiretocontinuetoreinforce itscooperationwithWIPOintraining,thedevelopmentofsoftwareandelectroniccommerce andtheacquisitionoft echnicaldocuments.ItthankedtheDirectorGeneralandthe CooperationforDevelopmentBureauforLatinAmericaandtheCaribbeanforthe cooperationandassistancereceivedintheorganizationofseminarsandvisitstoitscountryby expertsandofficia lsfromtheSecretariat.

- The Delegation of Cuba expressed its thanks to the International Bureau for the analysis of the property ofcooperationworkdoneinitscountry, mentioning especially the holding of World Intellectual PropertyDay,thecreationoftheInternati onalIndustrialPropertyAulaforthetrainingof trainers and also the support for the holding of national seminars, the industrial property mastershipprogramandcomputerizationactivities. It highlighted the importance of the Regional Meeting of Heads of Offices of Latin American Countries as a forum for debate and the exchange of experience, which in addition provided the opportunity of devising strategies forfuturecooperation. It considered it necessary to increase the funds set as ide for the trainingofhumanresourcesthroughtheWIPOWorldwideAcademy,andpromotingthemore activeparticipationofcountriesoftheregionintheWIPO NETproject.Itsuggested strengtheningandreshapingpatentinformationservicesandextendingstate -of-the-art searchesbysupplyingcopiesofscientificandtechnicalnewsarticlesonsuchsubjectsas traditionalknowledgeandnatural products. It also referred to the necessity of increasing cooperationonprogramsthathadtodowithinnovationinSMEsandbuild ingupactivities associated with the Intergovernmental Committee on Intellectual Property and GeneticResources, Traditional Knowledge and Folklore. It ended by endorsing the statement made and the folklore of the control of tbytheRepresentativeofGRULAC.
- $The Delegationo\ fIndia stated that the Government of India was committed to IP$ protection as a tool for growth and development and informed the Committee that a modernIPRlegislativesystemhadbeenputinplace. TheDelegationpointedoutthatthenewIPlaws onpaten ts, designs, trademarks, geographical indications and layout -designsofintegrated circuitscomplied with the TRIPS Agreement and were among the most stringent in the world. This initiative, combined with the legislative measures taken,underscoredtheGovernment'scommitmenttoestablishaworld -classlegaland administrative IP framework. The Delegational so statedthatthecommitmentofthe Government of India to strengthen the IP framework had benefited greatly from the account of the property of $cooperation received from WIPO. expressed the wish to see the seme chanisms further strengthened. It considered WI PO's initiative on IP protection in relation to the preservation of biological diversity, traditional knowledgeandfolkloreasagreatstepforward, as well as the initiative to harness both informationtechnologyandelectroniccommerceinrelationtoIP ,asIndiahadflourishing software, multimedia, music, filmand publishing industries. It was important for developing countriestorecognizetheeconomicopportunitythatthesecopyright -basedindustries represent. The International Bureau could help d evelopingcountriestoestablishthe infrastructure to provide protection for the IPRs of these industries to enable them to succeed.TheDelegationexpressedthewishtoseetheInternationalBureaudevelopappropriate solutionstotheproblemsfacedin differentareasofIP,takingintoaccounttheinterestofall stakeholders.WIPOmightalsoconsiderorganizingfurtherawarenessprogramsforcertain categories of professionals, civils ervants, policy makers, enforcement officials, patent attorneys, ac ademicians, teachers and students. The Delegation recognized the impact of the cooperation for development programs of WIPO on strengthening the IP framework in the cooperation of the cdeveloping countries and concluded by stressing that these programs had produced substantial benefits. It stated that it for esaw no difficulties for the International Bureautoen hance the account of the property of tfinancial outlay for the development program, whenembarking on the budget exercise early nextyear.

- 33. TheDelegationofColombiasaidthatitscountryattachedgreatimportanceto intellectualpropertyasaninstrumentofeconomic, socialandculturaldevelopment, which waswhytechnicalassistancewas imperativeforthemodernizationandadaptationofnational systems. Itmentioned the need to promote and encourage innovation in SMEs, especially with regard to the training and strengthening of human resources for the implementation and enforcement of intellectual property rights. It ended by thanking WIPO for the training programs and the computerization and modernization projects that had benefited its country.
- 34. The Delegation of China expressed its appreciation for WIPO's Development Cooperation Program and its commitment to strengthen intellectual property in China. The Delegation observed that intellectual property matters had assumed critical importance in a globalized economy, and China would need continuing cooperation from WIPO to meet the challenge of rapidly upgrading its intellectual property system. During the past 20 years, China hadrevised its intellectual property legislation in order to comply with international standards. The Delegation attached much importance to the S ino-African Forum which had be enheld in China, as it helped to create a better awareness of intellectual property rights. It advocated the continued strengthening of the Academy. It also stressed the importance of encouraging regional and sub-regional cooperation on intellectual property issues.

- 35. TheDelegationofNicaraguareferredtothesignificantachievementsthatitscountry hadmadeintermsofthemodernizationofitsintellectualpropertythankstothesupport receivedfromWIPOandtheGovernmentofSweden.Inparticularitmentionedtheresults achievedinthecollectivemanagementofcopyright,andalsotheneedforsuchcooperation activitiestocontinueintheregion.Iturgedtheapprovaloftheregionalprojectoncollective managementatthenextMeetingofHeadsofOfficesofLatinAmericanandCaribbean CountrieswhichwasshortlytobeheldinChile,andaskedtheSecretariatforassistancein identifyingnewprojectsthatwouldbenefittheprotectionofitscountry'sint ellectualassets.
- 36. TheDelegationofCongothankedWIPOforthebreadth,qualityandscopeofits cooperationactivities,andexpressedpleasurewithWIPO'sgrowingcommitmentonissuesof majorimportancesuchasgeneticresources,traditiona lknowledgeandfolkloreaswellas informationtechnology.ItexpressedthewishthatthepresentsituationinCongowould neverthelessallowcooperationactivitiesinthecountrytobebuiltup,andthankedtheAfrica Bureauforthetrainingandawarene ssactivitiesthathadtakenplacerecently.Itendedby supportingtheproposalmadebytheDelegationofAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroupfor theformationofagroupofexpertsresponsibleforreflectingonthefuturedirectionof cooperationfor development.
- 37. The Delegationals oconfirmed the importance it attached to the protection of folkloreandtraditionalknowledgeandhighlysupportedWIPO'scooperationactivitiesinthis area. - TheDelegationofSenegalthankedWIPOfortheactivitiesundertakeninfavorof 38. Senegalinfieldssuchasgeneticresources, traditional knowledge and folklore and, speaking initscountry'scapacityasPresidentoftheAdministrativeCouncilofO **API**, expressed satisfactionwiththecollaborationbetweenthetwoOrganizations.Itemphasizedthe importanceofcooperationfordevelopmentininternationalrelationsandthatofintellectual propertyasafundamentaldevelopmenttool,andurgedWIPOto payparticularattentionto developing countries. The Delegation expressed the wish that cooperation activities reston $conceptual bases, that WIPO engage in a partner ship policy with organizations of the United {\tt Normal partner} and {\tt Normal partner}$ Nationssystem, notably WHO as an obvious partner, as indicated by the Doha Declaration, and that the Permanent Committee on Cooperation for Development hold annuals essions. It are the properties of the proended by supporting the proposal made by the Delegation of Algeria on behalf of the AfricanGroupforthecreationofa policyreviewgrouptoguideWIPO'sfutureactivitiesinthefield ofcooperation.

- The Delegation of Sudan endorsed the intervention of the Delegation of Algeria on behalfoftheAfricanGroup.Itreferredtothemainactivitiescarriedout intellectualpropertyrelatedmatters, supported by the Government and WIPO. One of the $main a chieve ments during this last period was the establishment of two Sections within the {\tt main} and {$ CommercialGeneralRegister, one of them dedicated exclusively totheregistrationof industrial property rights. In addition, an ewintellectual property library was recently established, butmore reading material was needed. The Delegation informed that all laws on intellectualpropertymattershadbeenamendedan dsenttoWIPOtobecommented.It recognized and appreciated WIPO's assistance to Sudan, in particular in the field of training activities, which had permitted the training of more than 100 legal advisers in the last two uipment. These activities had been provided mainly through years, and by supplying office eq the Academy and the Arab Bureau of WIPO. The Delegation requested the InternationalBureautoassistinestablishingatraininginstituteforintellectualpropertyrights.
- 40. TheDeleg ationofAustraliabelievedthatWIPO'stechnicalcooperationprogramwas oneofthemostsignificantandcriticalelementsinitsoverallresponsibilitytopromotethe useofintellectualpropertysystemsworldwide,fortheeffectiveprotectionofintelle ctual propertyrightsandtheconsequenteconomicbenefitstosociety. Australiawouldcontinueto supportWIPO'stechnicalcooperationactivities. It commended the extentand range of cooperation for development under taken by the International Bureauan dnoted the desirability of using the occasion of the Committee meeting stoengage in more interaction with Member States' delegates to promote better targeting of individual needs, more strategic planning of future programs and more effective measurement of the outcomes of this work. It welcomed the newformat and a genda of this session as a positive move to address these aspects of the Committee's work.
- $41. \label{thm:constraint} In the Delegation of Mexicosaid that cooperation for development was an important element in the strengthening and efficient administration of national intellectual property systems. It expressed its support for what had been said by the Representative of GRULAC to the effect that greater human and financial resources should be set as ide for the Cooperation for Development Program. It expressed its appreciation of the work conducted by WIPO in the cooperation for development sector, and also the close collaborative relations enjoyed by its Government with the Latin America and Caribbean Bureau.$
- 42. TheDelegationofQatarexpresseditsthankstotheDirectorGeneralandtotheArab BureaufortheircontinuedeffortsinassistingQatarinmodernizingitsintellectualproperty system.Itreiterateditsinterestinthecontinuedassista nceoftheArabBureauandrequested thatmoreawareness -buildingprogramsinpromotingunderstandingofintellectualproperty beimplemented,suchasthetworegionalmeetingswhichhadbeenheldinApril2002,hosted byQatar.TheDelegationexpressedt heviewthattheCooperationforDevelopmentProgram shouldembarkonmoreactivitiesandbenefitfromtheallocationofmorefunds.
- 43. TheDelegationofVenezuelapointedtothesubstantialamountofworkthatthe InternationalBureauhaddone sincethepreviousmeetingoftheCommittee,andsaidthatits GovernmentwaspleasedwithandgratefulfortheassistancereceivedfromWIPO.It recognizedthatthegreatnumberofactivitiescarriedonduringtheperiodinquestionhad beenpossibletha nkstothededicationandprofessionalismofthestaffoftheInternational Bureau.IturgedtheSecretariattocontinuewiththoseactivities,emphasizingthatgreater budgetaryresourceswouldbenecessaryforthepurpose.Itexpressedthedesirethat WIPO, aspartofitslegislativeassistancetodevelopingcountries,mightalertthemtothenecessity,

when they adopted newlegal provisions, of making the most of the flexibility allowed by international agreements. It suggested that WIPO should contin uewithitsassistanceinthe establishmentandmaintenanceofappropriateinfrastructuresintheintellectualpropertyfield, anactivity from which its country had benefited. It recognized the importance of the studies carriedonbyWIPOontherelation betweenintellectualpropertyandtheconservationof biological diversity, on the protection of traditional knowledge and expressions of folkloreand one lectronic commerce adding that work on them should continue. It emphasized the importancethatits GovernmentattachedtothecollaborationnecessarybetweenWIPOand WTO, and urged stronger relations with UNCTAD. It also recognized the relevance of the workconductedbytheWorldwideAcademy.Itsaidthatmuchremainedtobedone,and acknowledgedt heneedtosupportsmallandmedium -sizedenterprisesasthedrivingforceof innovationactivities. Itaddedthat, initsopinion, WIPOcooperationactivities should incorporatetheworkprogramcontainedintheDohaMinisterialDeclarationontheTRIPS Agreement and Public Health. It pointed out that the Declaration had recognized issues of particularinteresttodevelopingcountriesinasmuchasthevhadtodowiththelatitude afforded by the Agreement for the pursuit of active policies of productive d evelopment.It alsomentioned the need for efforts to be made in all related fields, including the corporate, industrialandresearchfields, in all of which there was a call for more cooperation. It ended itsstatementwitharequesttotheSecretariat thatfuturereportsgiveanaccountof cooperationactivities conducted in each region, in such a way that the annual achievements of the Programmight bemore readily assessed.

- The Delegation of Argentina thanked the International Bureau for 44. theeffortsthatithad been carrying on in the various fields of cooperation for development, especially through the LatinAmericaandCaribbeanBureau,andendorsedthestatementmadebytheRepresentative ofGRULAC, especially with regard to the need t oheightenawarenessoftheimportanceof intellectualproperty. Its tressed the usefulness of the WIPO training courses addressed not onlytotheownersofrightsbutalsotousers, magistrates, agents of these curity forces and customspersonnel.Itur gedthecontinuationofthoseactivities,andthankedWIPOforthe support that it had given to the University of Buenos Aires in the holding of postgraduatecoursesoncopyrightandrelatedrights, at the same time asking for that support to continue in thefuture. It highlighted the need for cooperation to be tail or ed to the particular characteristics of each country and region and to its needs and level of development. It particularlyappreciated the activities of the International Bureau concernings m alland medium-sizedenterprises, asubjectarea in which it asked for its country to be more actively considered for the various programs, and those concerning technology transfer, which it regardedasamajorcontributiontodevelopingcountries.
- TheDelegationofElSalvadorsaidthatitsubscribedtothestatementmadebythe 45. Representative of GRULAC, especially with regard to the need to channel more resources towards WIPO cooperation activities. It recognized the importance of the Proposition ofgram, which hadhelpedstrengthenitscountry's intellectual property potential, and emphasized the recognitionthathadbeengivenatthepreviousMeetingofHeadsofIndustrialProperty Offices of Central American Countries to the various cooperation activitiesconductedbythe International Bureauforthebenefit of countries of the region. The Delegation reported on specificactivitiescarriedoninitscountryundertheauspicesofWIPO, and thanked the International Bureau for the assistance that hadbeengiventoElSalvador,especiallyinthe modernizationandstrengtheningofitsnationallegalframework,inthedevelopmentand strengtheningofcomputerizedpatentandtrademarksystemsandinthetrainingofcollective copyrightandrelatedrights managementsocieties, to name only those. It ended by pointing

to the importance that its country attached to the Committee as a forum for decisions on and the planning and channeling of cooperation activities for the benefit of developing countries.

- 46. TheDelegationofAlgeriadeclareditselfpleasedwiththeactivitiescarriedonbyWIPO inthefieldofcooperation, and in particular with the assistance received in the adaptation of Algeria's intellectual property system, both in legal terms and with respect to the enforcement of rights. It said that its country's cooperation needs formed part of the WTO accession negotiations currently going on, and it made aspecial mention of the assistance received from WIPO to bring its intellectual property legislation into line with the TRIPS Agreement. The Delegational so announced Algeria's intention to ratify the WCT and WPPT, and spoke of the need to focus cooperation programs on the fight against piracy and counterfeiting. It said that Algeria would be willing to sign a cooperation agreement with WIPO.
- 47. TheDelegationoftheUnitedStatesofAmericacommendedWIPOforitsongoing effortstoprovidetrainingandtechnicalassistanceintheareaofintellectualproperty.It welcomed WIPO'sfocusonenforcementofintellectualpropertyrights,asevidencedbythe workoftheInternationalBureauinconjunctionwiththeAdvisoryCommitteeon Enforcement.TheDelegationsaidthatoneofthecorefunctionsofWIPOwastoencourage trainingactivities.Overthepastyear,officialsfromtheUnitedStatesofAmericahadalso participatedinthetrainingofofficialsfrommorethan75 countriesthrough120 seminars, workshopsandtrainingprograms,whichhadtakenplacebothinhostcountri esandinthe UnitedStatesofAmerica,someinconjunctionwiththeInternationalBureau.
- 48. TheDelegationofNigeriaendorsedthestatementoftheDelegationofAlgeriaon behalfoftheAfricanGroup.ItexpresseditsgratitudetoWIPOandt hankedtheDeputy DirectorGeneralandtheDirectoroftheAfricaBureaufortheirpersonalcommitmentto strengtheningintellectualpropertysystemsintheAfricanregion.TheDelegationalso mentionedthesupportitreceivedfromWIPOespeciallywithr@ardtotrainingthestaffof theNigerianCopyrightCommission,whichhadledtobuildinggreatercapacityinthe Organization.Itemphasizedtheneedtostrengthenthecapacityofcollectiveadministration andtoreintroducetheHologramSchemetofight piracy.TheDelegationalsoobservedthat NigeriaattachedspecialimportancetothelinkageoftheIntellectualPropertyOfficestothe WIPONET.
- 49. The Delegation of Lesothocommended WIPO for its ongoing efforts and initiatives in the area of development cooperation. It pointed out that it faced in frastructure constraints regarding its intellectual property system and would like to appeal for WIPO's support on this issue, in addition to assistance in the field of WIPO NET, the TRIPS Agreement, collective management, and other global intellectual property issues, such as -commerce, traditional knowledge, genetic resources, etc.
- 50. TheDelegationofMalawiendorsedthestatementmadebytheDelegationofAlgeriaon behalfoftheAfri canGroup.ItalsothankedWIPOforthesupportandassistancegivento MalawiandtotheCopyrightSocietyofMalawi(COSOMA)whichhadreceived,duringits tenyearsofexistence,fullcooperationindifferentforms.Itexpressedthewishthatthis assistancecouldcontinueasCOSOMAintendedtoimproveitsservicestocreatorsinthe countryandtoincreasecooperationwithothercollectivemanagementorganizations.The DelegationcalleduponWIPOtoincludeinitsannualprogramaregionalintensive training courseoncopyrightandcollectivemanagementcurrentlyorganizedbyCOSOMAonan ad hocbasis,andtostrengthenitsassistancetocollectivemanagementorganizationsin

Africa. The Delegation warmly welcomed the extension of ARIPO's mandate to include copyright and related rights and appealed for WIPO's assistance in that respect.

- The Delegation of Peruthanked WIPO for the support that its country had received for the strengthening of its intellectual property. It mentioned that itsGovernmentwasworking atvarious levels on the development, exploitation and enforcement of intellectual property rights. Atonelevelitwas developing at eaching program for primary school staff which wouldenabletheminturntoimparttheknowled geandobservanceofintellectualproperty rightstotheirpupils. It was also at a very early stage of organizing workshops with SMEs which highlighted the advantages of using andrespecting intellectual property rights, and in that connection the country was very interested in WIPO cooperation to bring such events to thenoticeofSMEs. Another level, which required greater emphasis, was that of support for inventorsandresearchers; the Delegationsaid that the National Inventors' Contest was organizedeveryyearinPeru, whichreliedonWIPO's patronageforthepurpose. It mentionedthatanationalseminaronIndustrialPropertyandTechnologicalInformation would also beheld that year for the benefit of a cademic and institutional researchers which wouldlikewiseberelyingonWIPOandEPOassistance.Finallytherewasthelevelof policing:itscountryhadchannelleditseffortsintothefightagainstpiracyandcounterfeiting, bothseriousproblemsinPeru.Itaddedthatseminarshadbeenheldo nthesubjectforpolice forces and also magistrates and prosecutors. The Delegation welcomed the initiative taken by WIPO, the SPTO and the EPO in organizing a seminar formagistrates and prosecutors which wasduetobeheldshortly,andemphasizedthen eedforduecontinuitytobeimpartedtosuch events. It considered it important to have WIPO support for the holding of seminars on enforcementandbordermeasures. Itended by giving its support to the statement made by the Representative of GRULAC whi chemphasized the need to allocate more human and financial resourcesforcooperationactivities.
- 52. The Delegation of Trinidad and Tobago commended WIPO on the innovative formation of the property of the propadopted for the meeting of the Committee with the introduction ofthefocusedafternoon sessions. Italsocommended the Bureau for its ongoing activities and initiatives in the area of technical cooperation, and expressed its deep appreciation for the activities implemented in TrinidadandTobago.Itstressedtheneed toreinforceandintensifynotonlyNorth/South cooperationbutalsoSouth/Southcooperationinthefieldofintellectualproperty. The Delegation endors ed the statement made by the Delegation of Barbados on behalf of the account of the property of the properGroupofLatinAmericanandCarib beancountries. The Delegation expressed deep appreciationforWIPO's assistance in collective management and urged WIPO to continue to assist in the developmentand expansion of the Caribbean Copyright Link (CCL) and to helpest ablish collectingsocietiesinallcountriesoftheregionwheretherewa snoneyet.ItacknowledgedWIPO's assistanceindevelopingatrademarkdatabaseforCaribbeanCountries, successfully implemented in Trinida dand Tobago and Barbados, and encourage dits extension to other and the contract of tCaribbeanislands. The Delegational solooked fo rwardtorapidimplementationofthe automationprojectindevelopingapatentdatabaseforitscountry, and by extension, for the Caribbean. The regional meeting of patent experts needed to deal with this matter should be

convenedsoon. In this regard, the Delegation recalled the offermade by the Government of Trinidad and Tobagotohost the regional meeting. The Delegation, in addition, requested hosting a Regional Trademark Training Course for the Caribbean once every two years.

- 53. TheDe legationofChilethankedWIPOforthesignificantsupportthatithadreceived fortheconductofvariousintellectualpropertyactivities.Itfullyendorsedthestatement madebytheRepresentativeofGRULAC,andagreedwithotherdelegationsthatWIPOs agendashouldgivedueconsiderationtotheDohaMinisterialDeclarationontheTRIPS AgreementandPublicHealth.ItsupportedtheproposalbytheDelegationofIndiaforthe extensionofWIPOcooperationactivitiestootherareassuchasuniversities, researchcenters andpoliticalcircles,andinsistedthatproblemsdetectedbyindustrialpropertyofficesshould besettledinasystematicway.
- 54. The Delegation of Mozambique endorsed the statement of the Delegation of Algeria on behalf of the African Group. It expressed its gratitude to WIPO and congratulated the International Bureau on the intensity of the activities conducted since the setting up of the Committee. In view of the adoption of new laws, the Delegation requested more special ized training especially for judges, police of ficers and customs authorities. It informed of this considerable interest of publicand private institutions in Mozambique for issues of intellectual property, the lack of qualified teachers for implementing raining programs and the lack of appropriate teaching programs. Consequently, it requested that the Academy should develop training programs in Portuguese.
- 55. The Delegation of Nepalreferred toongoing WIPO assistance to Nepal, essentially in the field of copyright law and institutions. While a new Copyright Act was already in place, Nepalneeded further assistance in staff training and establishment of collective management, as well as through WIPO NET participation and intellectual property of fice automation. Nepal was preparing its accession to the WCT and the WPPT.
- 56. TheDelegationofBoliviareportedontheeffortsthatitscountrywasmakingto modernizeitsintellectualpropertylegislationsothatitconformedtointernation al undertakings.ItpointedtotheimportanceoftheWIPOCooperationforDevelopment Program,andsuggestedthatactivitiesconnectedwithtraditionalknowledge,thetrainingof humanresourcesandassistanceshouldbeexpanded.Itagreedthattherewas aneedto increasetheresourcessetasideforthevariouscooperationactivitiesthatcouldbeidentified, andpointedtothebenefitsoffinancingtheparticipationofcapital -basedexpertsinWIPO meetings.
- 57. The Delegation of Ecuadorrepe atedits Government's appreciation of the cooperation work done by WIPO and emphasized its importance to the intellectual property development of countries. With that in mindit who le he artedly endorsed the statement made by the Representative of GRULAC.
- 58. TheRepresentativeoftheAfricanUnionsupportedthestatementmadebythe DelegationofAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroup,and,inparticular,theproposalfor establishingamulti -disciplinarygroupofexperts.Theprimarytaskofth isCommitteeand theworkinggrouptobeestablishedshouldbetocreateaframeworkwhereintellectual propertywouldbedirectlyandfullyrelevantandappliedtoimprovingthewelfareofall people.Theframeworkshouldclearlyandstronglydirectthe developmentofintellectual property,towardsimmediatelyimprovinghumanwelfare.Humaningenuitywouldthenhave thepracticalroleofdevisingthemeansforbestdevelopingintellectualpropertyinthat

context. That protection of intellectual propert yrights should not primarily be designed to maximize profits for the holders of intellectual property rights, and only in this manner indirectly benefits ociety. It should rather be the other way round: Protection of intellectual property rights should primarily and directly be aimed at improving the human condition and promoting human welfare. Therefore, the framework for protection and promotion of innovation must unequivocally be designed to puthum an welfare first and foremost. It should not be forged tenth at humaning enuity was not created by the enactment of laws on IPRs. Humaning enuity had an autonomy that far surpassed any such laws, and would always be applied to finding solutions to our problems. IPR regimes should recognize this with a fresh perspective taking into account the challenges that face particularly developing countries. The African Unionur ged WIPO to continue its good work, in proactively being engaged with ARIPO and OAPI. Cooperation between the seorganizations was one of sev ways in which developing country concerns could be addressed.

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- The Representative of ARIPOthanked WIPO, in particular the Director General and the AfricaBureau, fortheactivities undertaken with ARIPO and its Member States which had strengthenedtheircapacitytoutilizetheintellectualpropertysystemfortheireconomic, socialandculturaldevelopment. Hestressed the importance of information technologies and oftheWIPO NETprojectandexpressedhissatisfactionwithregardtothe assistancereceived by ARIPO and three of its Member States in this field. He expressed the wish that a full a simple of the control of the contimplementation of the projectinal IMember States of ARIPO takeplace. The representative also stressed the importance of NFAPs and RFAPs as ameansfordevelopingcountriesto modernizetheirintellectualpropertysystemsintegratingnewglobalchallengessuchasthe protection of traditional knowledge, genetic resources, and folklore and the preservation of biodiversity.HepraisedtheWIPO/WTO Joint Initiative for LDCs and the establishment of aspecialunittoassistthesecountries. He concluded his statement by expressing the wish that the existing cooperation befurther strengthened, particularly inview of the implementation of ARIPO'sne wmandateinthefieldofcopyrightandrelatedrights.
- 60. TheRepresentativeofOAPIthankedWIPO,andespeciallytheAfricaBureau,forthe diversityandeffectivenessoftheactivitiesconductedbythem. TheRepresentativeendorsed thestate mentsmadebytheDelegationofAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroup,andwas pleasedwiththeeffectivecooperationthathadestablisheditselfbetweenWIPOandOAPI, whileatthesametimewishingthatitmightbeincreasedintheareasoftraining,th e disseminationoftechnicalandscientificinformationandabovealltheexploitationof inventions. Itsaidthat, followingaMinisterialConferencethathadbeenheldinLibreville, OAPIexpectedtobecomeinvolvedintheprotectionandexploitationof traditionalmedicines, whichentailedharmonizationofthemarketingapprovalproceduresforsuchmedicines. Asit regardedtheexploitationoftraditionalmedicinestobeconsistentwiththelogicoftheDoha Declaration, itexpressedthedesiretorece iveWIPOsupportinthatconnection.
- 61. TheRepresentativeoftheLeagueofArabStatesexpressedhisgratitudetoWIPOand thankedtheDeputyDirectorGeneralandtheDirectoroftheArabBureaufortheirpersonal commitmenttostrengtheningin tellectualpropertysystemsintheArabregion.Healso acknowledgedthesupportreceivedfromWIPOunderthememorandumofunderstanding betweentheLeagueofArabStatesandWIPO.Tocomplementitsefforts,theLeagueofArabStateswouldseekWIPO'sc ooperationincertainspecificareas,including:human resourcesdevelopmentthroughtheestablishmentofnationaltraininganddevelopmentofa legislativeframeworkconcerningtraditionalknowledgeandfolklore.

- 62. TheRepresentativeofICSID informedtheCommitteethatICSIDrepresentsindustrial designersinthebroadestsense, who are increasinglySMEs from developing countries. It emphasized that as the economies of the secountries developed and grew, so did in digenous design capability, a ndIPR sgained also in importance commercially, so cially and culturally. The Representative congratulated the International Bureau for the impressive number of meeting sheld and contacts made which must have stimulated calls for ever -increasing financial assistance. It suggested that with limited resources, definition of priorities and focus was essential. Referring to the report of the British Commission on Intellectual Property Rights which contained many of the arguments used against the system, the Re presentative suggested to produce figures about the actual benefits to developing countries, to demy stify and simplify the issue for the public, including creators, and to encourage the use of patent and other registered databases to solve problems as they arise, in order to avoid was te of talent and inspiration.
- InrespondingtospecificissuesraisedbysomeDelegationstheSecretariatinformedthe CommitteethatthecourseoftheWorldwideAcademyinSpanishhadnotbeencancelled,but onlydeferred. Then ext course could be expected to take place as early as February 2003. The Doha Ministerial Conference Declaration on the TRIPS Agreement and Public Health Research and Public Health Research Researhadconfirmedtheflexibility, which the TRIPS Agreement provided for IPlegislation of developing countries. That flexibility had already been built in WIPO's legislative advice activities long before the Doha Conference. Furthermore, the Declarational lowed LDCs to the conference of the Conferedeferimplementation of certain provisions of the TRIPS Agreement unt il2016.WIPO's legislativeadvicepracticehadbeenupdatedaccordingly,tomakethesenewoptionsapparent for LDCs. WIPO's Internets itemade the corresponding legislative advice tools accessible foreverybody. The Secretaria tnoted that the Doha Dec larationrecognizedthatWTO Memberswithinsufficientornomanufacturingcapacitiesinthepharmaceuticalsectorcould face difficulties in making effective use of compulsory licensing under the TRIPS Agreement.thecompetentorgansofWTOtofindasolution. Therefore, the Declaration had requested ThelegislativeadvicepracticeofWIPOcouldnotanticipatethedecisionstobetakenwithin the WTO. Regarding the suggestion to closer cooperation with WHO, the Secretariat stated thatinvarious regiona lmeetings or ganized by WIPO on Doha -relatedsubjects, WHOhad participated and would be further invited.
 - 64. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocument PCIPD/3/3. It also noted the proposal by the Delegation of Algeria, speaking on behalf of the African Group, for the creation of a group of experts on intellectual property and development, and also the fact that the matter would be considered in consultations among regional groups.

65. DiscussionwasonthebasisofdocumentPCIPD/3/6. The Secretaria tout lined the progress made by the Academysin ceits creation and made particular reference to the growth inactivities from January 2001 to Ju ne 2002. The keypoints made in the presentation were: the growth in the number of participants in the programs of the Academy, numbering over 7,544 in that period; the range of activities designed to meet the needs of a broadtarget audience and their creasing number of strategic partnerships between the Academy and key institutions designed to enhance the effectiveness and broaden the reach of the Academy.

- The Delegation of Venezuela, while commending the Academy for its work, noted that moreinformationwasrequiredwithregardtotheproposedcoursestobeofferedviadistance learning on Traditional Knowledge, Folklore and Genetic Resources. The Delegations aid the control of the contherehadbeenadropinthenumberofparticipantsforthedistancelearn inthereporting period as compared to the previous one. It added that the distance learning programwasthemostsuccessful, and expressed the wish that other areas and programs might continuetobepromotedinthesameway. The De legationsuggestedthattheAcademy shouldshareitsexperienceofdistancelearningprograms with other countries, and thanked it fortheinformationalreadysharedwithVenezuela.Itexpressedthewishthattheadvanced coursesindistancelearningwou ldbelaunchedsoon. Itinquired about the number of $participants in distance learning from Venezuela as well as of those who had benefited from {\tt Venezuela} as well as of those who had benefited from {\tt Venezuela} as well as of those {\tt Venezuela} as {\tt Venez$ thefellowshipprogram, adding that such information should be received more regularly by GenevaMissions.It supported the launch, and urged the implementation assoon as possible, ofamastercourseinintellectualpropertyviadistancelearningaswellasofcourseson intellectualpropertyandtechnologytransfer,intellectualpropertyandpublicpolicy(heal th andeducation). The Delegationals ostressed the need for greater collaboration between the Academyandotherinstitutionsaswellastheimportanceofconductingtrainingprograms withintheregionsratherthaninGeneva.Finally,itexpressedtheho pethattheAcademy wouldholdcloseconsultationswiththemissionsinGenevaonaregularbasisandprovide informationregardingitsactivities.
- 67. TheDelegationofSwedensupportedprogramsdirectedatjudges, and the importance of using a sestudies for this purpose. It also attributed importance to the support given to the International Association for the Advancement of Teaching and Research in Intellectual Property (ATRIP) as well as to a propose dnew course onlicensing and technology transfer which augured well with regard to contract ual practices of Traditional Knowledge. The Delegation supported the proposed course on copyright for Librarians, and it expressed the view that joint collaboration rather than competing with other instit utions was the way forward for the Academy.
- 68. The Delegation of Maltasupported the introduction of a master program via distance learning, which in its view was particularly important for small countries, especially considering that, due to the esize of the student population, there was not sufficient demand for universities to introduce a separate master program on intellectual property. It also wondered why a certificate was offered at the conclusion of each module of the UNISA course rather than a diploma at the end.
- The Delegation of Egypt commended the Academy for its achievements in the field of the Academy for its achievement of tcapacitybuildingandtrainingofhumanresources. This success was reflected in the significantincreaseinthenumberofbenefic iariesofitsprograms. The Delegation supported thelaunchingofanewdistancelearningcourseinthefieldoftraditionalknowledgeand transferoftechnology. Ithopedthatthe Arabic language version of the distance learning coursewouldbelaunched soonasthiswouldcertainlywidenthescopeofbeneficiariesofthe Academy's activities specially in Egyptandother Arabcountries. The Delegation pointed to theneedthatthecoursesoftheAcademyreflectthepluralityofviewsregardingintellectua propertymatters, specially at a time when intellectual property protection had an impact on otherfieldssuchastheprotectionofpublichealthandtheenvironment. The Delegation was reservedregardingtheintroductionofafeestructureintheAcade my'sactivitiesasWIPO hadaninternational public service vocation, which should be preserved. Seeking external fundingbytheAcademyshouldbewithinthelimitssetbytheUNsystemandthenecessity ofpreservingitsindependenceandintegrity. The Delegationhighlightedtheneedfor

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increasedattentiontoteachingandresearchinIPmattersintheactivitiesoftheAcademy. However,thisshouldnotaffecttheexistingcooperationbetweentheAcademyandacademic institutions.TheDelegationcalled foraneffectiveincreaseintheresourcesallocatedtothe AcademyintheProgramandBudgetforthenextbiennium.

- 70. TheDelegationofChinastressedthefactthattheAcademyshouldincludemore participantsfromintellectualpropertyoffic esandstafffromenterprisesinitstraining programs. Itemphasizedtheneedtohaveacomprehensivecurriculumaswellasteaching materialsatbasicandadvancedlevels. The program of the Academyshould include those for highlevel of ficials such as judges and government of ficials, middle level staff such as managers of IP of fices, librarians, and elementary courses such as the summer courses for government of ficials, students, etc.
- 71. TheDelegationofMexicohighlightedtheimportanceof educationforthe demystificationofintellectualpropertyandsaidthattheAcademycouldplayafundamental partinthattask.Itstressedtheneedtobuilduptheprogramoftrainingoftrainers,adding thattheproposalsconcerningfeesandaccredita tionasaformaleducationalinstitutionshould belookedatcarefully;itcouldnotpronounceonthemforthemomentasitwasthefirsttime thattheyhadbeenputforward.Itendedbymentioningtheadvisabilityofholdinganannual meetingtodiscuss matterssuchastheproposalssubmittedbytheSecretariat.
- 72. TheDelegationoftheRepublicofKoreaproposedthatinordertoreachouttoawider audience,theAcademyshouldcreatedistancelearningcourseswhichcouldbeoffered without tutorassistance.ItalsoproposedthattheSummerSchoolbemadeavailabletoself sponsoredstudentssothatmorepersonscouldderivebenefitsfromthatprogram.Inaddition, theDelegationfurtherproposedtointroduceatuitionfeesystemonconditi onthatWIPO wouldreturnthefeeiftheparticipantsuccessfullycompletethecourse.Itwouldserveasa goodstimulusandmotivationtothem.
- 73. The Delegation of Zambia commended the policy development program of the Academy, which had been reparticularly useful in Africa. It asserted that the Academy should be provided more funds as it had demonstrated its success.
- 74. The Delegation of Sudan commended the Academyand the detailed report and expressed satisfaction with the cooperation between the Academyand Sudan. It considered that it would be useful for the Academy to provide more detail in terms of the qualifications obtained by its students.
- 75. The Delegation of Canadain quired whether the Academyhad conducted an impact assessment following each program and expressed satisfaction at the increase in the level of participants now selected for the program jointly organized with the Canadian Intellectual Property Office.
- 76. The Delegation of the Russian Fed eration expressed its satisfaction for the conclusion of the Framework Agreement of Cooperation between WIPO and ROSPATENT. The Agreement had already been bearing fruit with the recent holding of an Academyses sion on the teaching of intellectual property in Moscow. It also expressed its appreciation for the offering of the DL101 course in Russian.
- 77. The Delegation of India expressed its satisfaction at the recent signing of the Framework Agreement between WIPO and the Ministry of Human Resource Development,

Government of India. Through this Agreement, a joint diploma course had been envisaged to be offered with the India Gandhi National Open University, which offered great potential for the participants both in India and other countries of the sub-region. It expresseds at is faction about the fact that some 30% of the participants in the DL course in English were from India.

- 78. TheDelegationofEthiopiahighlyvaluedthevarioustrainingprogramsoftheAcademy inwhichnationa lsofEthiopiahadparticipatedandrequestedmoreinformationtobeprovided regardingtheSummerSchoolapplicationproceduresandtheLong -termFellowshipProgram.
- 79. TheDelegationofThailandsuggestedthatthecoursesofferedbytheAcadem yshould meetlocaluniversityrequirementsandcoursesshouldfocusonsubjectsliketraditional knowledgeande -commerce.AsregardsthefeesstructuretheDelegationaddedthat participantsfromdevelopingcountries,countrieswitheconomiesintransit ion,aswellasthe LDCs,shouldbeexemptedfromanyfeesthatWIPOmightestablish.
- 80. The Delegation of Uruguay suggested maintaining a proper balance between the number of courses offered by the Academy in industrial property and copyright by increasing the range of available options for participation in the latter branch of intellectual property. It highlighted the need formore information to be supplied to Member States on the programs of fered by the Academy. It considered that an increase in fellowships was an essential means of supporting research and the training of professionals and trainers. It ended by emphasizing the importance of the distance learning program and recommending that it continue in greater depth.
- 81. The Delegation of Moroccoinquired about the background of person sparticipating in the Distance Learning Program of the Academyand requested for a break down of the participants per region. It mentioned the proposal made under the previous agendaitem concerning the trainer training system, and asked the Academy what role it could play in the design and implementation of that system with the support of WIPO.
- 82. TheDelegationofColombiaexpressedsatisfactionattheprogressreportprovidedby theAcademyandemphasizedthattrainingwasoneofthemaininstrumentsforlending greaterstrengthtointellectualproperty. Itsharedtheviewthattrainingshouldfocuson strengtheningthehumanresourcesofnationalpatentoffices, addingthatones houldnot disregardtheimportance, fortheirleveraging effect, of the cooperation agreements that could be signed with universities and other institutions in the academic sector; it asked formore information on the terms of such bilateral cooperation. It ended by whole heartedly supporting the free -of-charge character of the cooperation afforded by WIPO.
- 83. The Delegation of Nigerian oted the importance of Academysessions as functional tools for the creation of networks especially among professors of intellectual property in Africa. In this connection, it recalled the Academysession held in Abujain 1999 and expressed the need to plan a similar program in Nigeria.
- 84. TheDelegationofCubaexpresseditsappreciationforthecour sesofferedbythe AcademyandespeciallytheDistanceLearningProgram.Itexpressedconcernatthedecrease inthenumberofparticipantsintheAcademyprogramsandsoughtahighleveloffundingfor thesame.Itsuggestedanincreaseinthenumberofparticipantsinthefacetofacetraining programs,astheseprogramscannotbereplacedbydistancelearning.Itsuggestedfurtherthat therewasaneedtomaintainclosecollaborativetiesbetweentheAcademyandWIPO's regionalcooperationbureaux,wh ichwouldmakeforabetterselectionofnationalcandidates

for International Bureaufellowships. It recommended that any substantive change that one might wish to make to the work of the Academyshould be promptly submitted to all Member States for consultation. It ended by recommending that the representatives of developing countries should not pay fees for their participation in Academy courses.

- 85. The Delegation of Kenya expressed its appreciation for the programs conducted by the Academyand made aspecific reference to the recently concluded program for university professors held in Eldoret. It also looked forward to concluding a partner ship agreement with the Academy.
- 86. The Delegation of Perucommended the WIPOW orldwide Academy for the work done in the course of its four and a half years of existence. It was grateful for the opportunity that its country had had of benefiting from the Academy's programs; they had made it possible to strengthen in tellectual property in Peruthrough the training of human resources. It mentioned its interest in the conduct of programs at the regional level, and its willingness, with that in mind, to take part in the organization of Spanish language programs for Latin America. It added that, while WIPO's Copyright Collective Management Division had held seminars and meeting son the subject in Latin America, more emphasis needed to be placed, in its opinion, on the conduct of training courses for collective managements ocieties, which had an important part to play in the protection of authors' and composers' rights, and supported the holding of a training program for trainers, as proposed by the Delegation of Algeria.
- 87. The Representative of OAP Ireferred to the Agreement concluded with the Academyin 1999 and expressed its satisfaction at outtheway it had been implemented. He supported the activities relating to the training of judges and expressed the wish to initiate more activities in cooperation with the Academy.
- 88. TheRepresentativeofARIPOstatedthatARIPOhadaFrameworkAgreementof CooperationwiththeAcademyandaddedthat,withintheframeworkofthatagreement,ithad beeninvolvedwiththedistancelearningcourseoftheAcademyfromitsinception. He expressedhisappreciationforthecooperationhisorganizationhadreceivedfromthe Academyandlookedforwardtocontinuingcooperation,especiallyinviewoftheproposed establishmentoftheregionaltrainingcenterfollowingitsestablishment.
- Inresponsetosomeoftheissuesraised, the Secretaria treiterated that advanced courses indistancelearningaswellastheotherlanguageversionsoftheDL 101wouldbelaunched soon. Itobserved that a number of universities were incor poratingtheDL 101intotheir curriculum and awarding the appropriate credit to the students who took the course. With regardtothedropintheSpanishparticipationintheDL 101.itnotedthatthecoursewas offeredfreeofchargeandtherewerenore strictionsonthenumberofparticipants.It $therefore encourage dde legations to assist the Acade myind is seminating information on the {\it the acade myinds} and {$ courseintheirrespectiveregions. It confirmed that the UNISA program would offer a diplomafollowing conclusion of the required modules. - 92. The Delegationexpressed its great satisfaction with the development of the CaribbeanCopyrightLink(CCL) project. Its aid that it was important to deal not only with traditional collective management ofmusicbuttoalsoconsiderotherfieldssuchasliteraryandworksofarts, performingartists ftraditionalknowledgeandfolklore. The Delegation aswellasfutureregimesinthefieldo was of the view that close cooperation with the private sector, like the Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (CISAC), was significant; therefore it hoped that WIPO would cooperate with on-governmental organizations. It added that there was an eed to ensurecompatibility within ternational technical standards, such as workidentification. Collectivemanagementsystemswouldneedtotakeintoaccounttheinterestsofallinterested stakeholdersandtoavoidconflictswithpresentandfuturecompetitionlaw.
- TheDelegationofTogoemphasizedtheimportanceoftheassistancethatitscountry had received from WIPO, that had contributed to the establishment of the Togolese Copular and the contributed to the establishment of the Togolese Copular and the Copular ayright Office(BUTODRA), which for four years had been taking care of the proper distribution of authors'royalties. It was thanks to that assist ance that collective managerment had been computerized. Itreferred to the computer hardware that had been in stalledandtothe logistical support provided by a technician to ensure the proper functioning of the computerized collective management system. The Delegation noted the effectiveness of the systeminstalled, which for the last four years had allowed cop yrightroyaltiestobe distributed without recourse to an outside company, as was the case for other countries. It highlightedtherelevanceoftheassistanceofWIPOtotheleastdevelopedcountriesin general, and Togoin particular, as a means of settling the collective management of copyright on a sound basis. It thanked the International Bureau for having produced the documents supplied to delegations.
- 94. TheDelegationofCubathankedtheSecretariatforthedocumentationpresentedon activitiesundertakeninthefieldofcollectivemanagement,andexpresseditsappreciationof theworkdonebyWIPO'sCollectiveManagementDivisionandtheLatinAmericaBureau.It saidthatitscountryhadbeenabeneficiaryinthatimportantarea,having organized,together withWIPO,twonationalseminarsandoneregionalseminaronthevisualarts,whichwasto takeplacefromNovember19to22.Itmaintainedthatacopyrightsystematthenational levelcouldnotdeveloptoitsfullestextentwithout strictmanagementofrights,anditwasfor thatreasonthecountryhadbeenworkingactivelyonthataspect.Itthereforeattachedthe utmostimportancetothecreationoftheDivisionandalsotothelinesofcooperationthat werebeingdevelopedincon nectionwithcollectivemanagement.TheDelegationsaidthat thereweretwomanagementbodiesinCubaatpresent,oneformusicanddrama,whichinthe nearfuturewouldincludeaudiovisualworks,andtheother,recentlycreated,forthevisual arts.
- 95. The Delegation of Jamaica concurred with the idea that collective management was at the centre stage for commercial development of the cultural industries indeveloping countries

intermsofenhancedexportperformanceandopportunitiesforemplo yment.Itnotedthat supportfortheregionalsystemhadstrengthened. The Delegation expressed gratitude to WIPOandtheGeneralSocietyofAuthorsinSpain(SGAE)forthetechnicalassistance grantedtotheCaribbeanCopyrightLinktoensureitseffect ivefunctioning. Its aid that the CaribbeanCopyrightLink(CCL)hadbeenacceptedasanassociatememberofthe $International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (CISAC). It expressed the need for WIPOtotakethenecessarystepstointegrateJAMCOPY,theJamaicanSocietythathadbeen setuptomanagereprographicrights, and JAPAS that managed the rights of performers, as wellasJAMRAS,w hichrepresentedrecordproducers,intotheregionalsystemandCCL.It welcomed the initiative salready under taken by WIPO in that regard with JAPAS. The Delegationfeltthatthesystemshouldbeextendedtoothercategoriesofrightsincluding reprographicandphotographicworks. Additionally, it considered that greater training was requiredforstaffusingthecollectivemanagementsoftware(SGS).

- 96. TheDelegationofNigeriastressedthatcollectivemanagementwascriticaltothe effectiveprotectionofcopyrightandrelatedrights.ItsuggestedWIPOtoundertakeafact findingmissioninconjunctionwithCISACtostreamlinetheoperationsofexistingcollective managementorganizationsinitscountry.Itsaidthatanorganizationtomana gereprographic rightshadrecentlybeenestablishedinNigeria.Itaddedthattheestablishmentofasocietyfor therightsofthefilmindustrywasalsounderconsideration.
- 97. TheDelegationofNicaraguacongratulatedtheSecretariatonthe documentsubmitted onsuchanimportantsubject, which drew on the main activities conducted in connection with collectivemanagement.ItsaidthatitscountryhaditsLaw312fullyinforceonthe protectionofcopyrightandrelatedrights, which made pr operprovision for the composition of collective managements ocieties. The present situation was that the main national authors and performers had created the first collective managements ociety, called OCARINA, for musicrights, butitwas open to allot hergenres.Itpointedoutthatthecreationof managementsocieties was for its Governmentarich source of job creation. The Delegation askedtheSecretariattosetinmotiontheregionalprojectforCentralAmericaconcerning managementsocieties, and askedforittobeapproved at the next Meeting of Heads of Offices of Latin American and Caribbean Countries, which would shortly betaking place in Chile. Itencouraged the Secretariatto arrange for its implementation to start assoon as possible. The Delegationals ospoke of the progress made towards its country's accession to theWCT,WPPTandPCT.
- 98. TheDelegationofUruguaycommendedtheCollectiveManagementDivisionforits activities, and thanked it for its efforts. It said tha Uruguaywas avalid testimony to the concerns of the Division and its efficiency and dedication in handling the subject of collective management, because, as was clearly apparent in the document, Uruguay had contributed with the organization of, and had be enhost to, an umber of meetings at which the problems and concerns of collective management had been analyzed. It said that its country had a clear perception of the importance of collective management, not only from the point of view of the ory but also because it had tested its practical advantages: Uruguay had copy right and related rights management societies that had been active form or ethan 60 years, and the General Association of Authors of Uruguay, with its Argentine counterpart, had for years been holding training courses for the official sof societies. The Delegation point edout that

- The Delegation of Chinathanked WIPO for its assistance in helping its country in establishingthefirstcollectivemanagementformusicalworksandreportedthatthesociety hadbeeninplacefor 10 years and infull operation. I tsaidthatrecentdevelopments, such as multimedianetworksinstitutionsandnewmediaanditsrespectiveauthors, hadtobetaken intoaccountinthisfieldofcollectivemanagement. The Delegationshared the views of the Delegation of Swedenthatworks other than music, such as literary works and films, should alsobegivenattentionandthestakeholdersalsoneededcollectivemechanismstobeableto worktogether. Tokeepupthepaceinthelegalandtechnicaldevelopments, the Delegation expressedt hewishthatWIPOundertakeastudyonnewITinordertosetupsocietiesin developing countries. It proposed that alliances could be setup in order to overcome the potentialproblemifeverycategoryofrightholdersestablishesitsownsociety.Itsa idthat thematicstudieswereneededalsoonthenewdigitalissuesinrelationtocollective management. The Delegation pointed out that the cooperation relations between developed and developing countries needed to be reinforced. It added that rights o beaddressedandanadequateinfrastructurewastobesetup. Itreiterated the readiness of its countrytoworkinthisarea. The Delegation suggested that WIPO further strengthen its cooperationwithIFPI,IFRRO,CISACandotherin terestednon -governmentalorganizations.
- 100. TheDelegationoftheRussianFederationinformedonthelegislativedevelopmentsin itscountry.InOctober 2002,thecopyrightissueshadbeenexaminedatthegovernmental levelinordertobringth elawinlinewiththeinternationaltreatiesandtobeinapositionto accedetotheWTO,theRomeConvention(1961)andtheWCTandWPPT.TheDelegation expresseditssupportforcollectivemanagementinthiscontextandadvisedthatthePatent Office wouldhaveresponsibilityforcoordinatingdevelopmentsincludingtheimplementation ofasingleregistrythathadrecentlybeenapproved.
- 101. The Delegation of Malaysia considered it necessary to maintain work on collective management on the age indofthe Cooperation for Development Sector. It said that exchange of experiences hould be encouraged and more regional cooperation and seminars to be under taken, such as the event held in India in December 2001. The Delegation referred to the ASEAN study on possible regional cooperation in collective management produced by WIPO and offered to hold a meeting in its country to discuss that preliminary draft study. Malaysia would wish that a work shop beheld as a followup.
- 102. TheDelegationo fMalawiconsideredthatcollectivemanagementwasstillinitsinfancy inAfrica, and that training incollective management was an essential element in development. Currently the collective management organization of Malawi (COSOMA) had been providing training on an ad hoc basis. It mentioned the organization of atwo -week training course on copyright and collective management as the type of training that was required in the circumstances and expressed the wish that the course be programmed to take place annually. The Delegation reported that some Africansocieties experienced problems of sharing copyright documentation required for their collective management operations. It suggested the establishment of an etwork to overcome the problems and facilita te electronic transmission of information between African collective management organizations. It supported WIPO activities in this area.
- 103. The Delegation of Algeria pointed to the rich content of the document submitted by the International Bu reau, which encouraged support for the strengthening of collective copy right

andrelatedrightsmanagementactivities indeveloping countries. Although Algeria had since 1973, they ear of the creation of the ONDA, accumulated a wealth of collective manage ment experience, it was essential to consolidate those foundations and pass through a qualitative stagewhichwouldinvolveupgradingmanagementtoolsinlinewiththeevolutionof informationtechnologyandchangesininternationalstandards. The Delega tionmentioned certainobjectivesforcollectivemanagement,namelythemodernizationofcomputertools, thenecessityoftakingdueaccountofthecollectivemanagementofrelatedrights hadexistedinitscountrysince1998 -andtheneedtoprov ideforproperstafftraining. The Delegationreferredtothesub -regionalworkshoponthecollectivemanagementofcopyright andrelatedrightsthathadbeenheldinRabatinJune2001, attheendofwhichaplanof actionhadbeenadoptedinfavorofEg ypt, Lebanon, Morocco, Tunisia and its own country. Itrequestedafollow -uptothatplanofactionthathighlightedtheregionaldimension.It wishedtoseecooperationactivitiesfordevelopingcountriescontinueinsuchawayasto affordbetterprote ctiontocopyrightandrelatedrights, developcollective management and createanenvironmentconducivetointellectualcreation. The Delegation was pleased to note the cooperation agreement concluded between WIPO and CISAC.

- 104. The Delegation of Egyptsaid that it fully supported the policy of WIPO in the field of collective management of copyright and related rights in favor of developing countries which it considered as a tool for economic, so cial and cultural development of countries. It regional workshop in Moroccoin June 2001 and was looking forward to its implementation. The Delegation emphasized the importance of increasing cooperation, exchange of views and experience between countries of the region in the field of collective management.
- 105. TheDelegationofSaintLuciacongratulatedWIPOontheexcellentworkithaddoneto dateinthefieldofcollectivemanagementofcopyrightandrelatedrights. Thankstothe collaborationbetweentheregionandWIPO,Saint Luciahadmovedinrelativelyshortperiod oftimefromacountrywherenosystemformanagingsuchrightswasinplacetoonewherea strongcollectivemanagementenvironmentwasnowestablished. Itconsidered the Ca ribbean Copyright Link (CCL) to be an innovative and successful solution for the Caribbean region as $awhole and added that WIPO should accelerate and deepen its support for the CCL. The {\it accelerate} and {\it$ Delegationfeltitwasnecessarytoconsolidatethefirstphaseoft heRegionallyFocused ActionPlan(RFAP)fortheCaribbeanregionandtomoveintothesecondphasewhich shouldincludeassistingnewsocietiesintheregion, for instance in Suriname and Antigua and Barbuda, where local initiatives were already in motion .Itnotedthatseveralcountries in the regionincludingDominica,Saint KittsandNevisandSaint VincentandtheGrenadines,had no infrastructure and proposed that WIPO and the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States(OECS)consideracollaborativei nitiativeundertheOECS -WIPOAgreementtoestablish collectivemanagementsocietiesinOECScountries.Finally,theDelegationnotedthatitwas essential to a development project to programe du cational seminars directed specifically at the seminar solution of the semusersofcopyri ghtedworksandthepublicasameanstoraisecopyrightawarenessbutalsoto facilitatetheactivitiesofnewcollectivemanagementorganizations.
- 106. The Delegation of Namibia expressed its full support for the WIPO program for establishment of collective management or ganizations indeveloping countries. It referred to the collecting society of its country which had come into existence nine years ago and which was in complete operation. It said that the national collective management or ganiza tion provided not only royal ties but also moral support to authors and composers, who were encouraged to create more works. The Delegation was of the view that activities related to

collectivemanagementshouldbeextendedbeyondthefieldofmusicalwor kstoother categoriesofworks,suchasliteraryworks,filmsandphotographs.

- 107. TheDelegationofThailandcongratulatedWIPOforitsworkandthankedallMember StatesforelectingThailandasVice -ChairofthisPermanentCommitteeMeeting. It underlinedtheimportantroletobeplayedbyWIPOinestablishingcollectivemanagement organizations.Itmentionedproblemsofconvincingmusicuserstopayroyalties.Itsaidthat suchproblemdidnotconfinetoitscountry.Itwasoftheviewth attherightsownersand usersshouldbemoreinformedoftheirrightsandobligations,andexperiencefromother countrieslikeAustraliaorfromEuropecouldbenefitdevelopingcountries.Itsuggestedthat astudycouldbeundertakenontheexperienceo fcountriesincontrollingthepotential monopolyofauthorsofmusic.TheDelegationfurthersupportedWIPO'sassistanceto organizeaworkshopinoneoftheASEANcountriesonaregionalframeworkoncollective management,asafollow -uptotheDraftPr eliminaryStudyontheFeasibilityofthe EstablishmentofanASEANCollectiveManagementSystem.
- 108. TheDelegationofIndiajoinedtheDelegationofMalaysiainpraisingtheRegional SymposiumonCollectiveManagementofCopyrightandRelatedR ightsforAsiaandthe PacificCountriesheldinMumbaiinDecember 2001.Itrecalledthatitscountryhad flourishingsoftware,multimedia,music,filmandpublishingindustries,andthatitwas importantfordevelopingcountriestorecognizetheeconomi copportunitiesthatthese copyrightbasedindustriesrepresent.TheDelegationstatedalsothat,totakeadvantageofa country'spotentialinthesefields,thoseindustriesmustbegivenadequateprotection.It expressedthewishthatWIPOhelpdevelop ingcountriestoestablishtheinfrastructureto provideprotectionfortheintellectualpropertyrightsofthoseindustries.Itsaidthatcollective managementactivitiesshouldbekeptontheagendaoftheCooperationforDevelopment.
- 109. The Representative from the European Patent Office (EPO) referred to the conclusions of a report of an ASEAN meeting on copyright, related rights and collective management. One of the conclusions drawn in that report was that national laws were required to balance the monopoly rights of collective management or ganizations. It quoted the example of the German legislation.
 - 110. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocument PCIPD/3/5.

- 111. TheitemwasdiscussedonthebasisofdocumentPCIPD/3/9.
- 112. TheDelegationofCostaRicasaidthatitscountryattachedg reatimportancetothe entryintoforceofthetwotreaties,andhaddepositeditsinstrumentsofratificationinthe courseofthecurrentyear. Thetreatieshadmadeprovisionsavailablethatwouldnotonly protecttheinterestsofcreatorsbutalsoma keitpossibleforworkstobecreated, distributed andmonitoredinthedigitalenvironmentwithgreaterconfidence. Itaddedthattheir implementationwouldgeneratenewbenefitsforStatesbyestablishinganadequatelegal frameworkthatwouldguaranteforeigninvestmentandcontributetothepromotionof electroniccommerce. Itencouraged countries that hadnotyetratified the treaties to doso,

and the International Bureautocontinue its work of advice and assistance with a view to bringing about their implementation.

- 113. TheDelegationofSwedencongratulatedWIPOforthecomprehensiveanddiversified activities undertakent opromote the WCT and WPPT. It under lined the importance of these treaties for the protection of local creativity and folklore. The Delegation expressed its appreciation for the efforts of the International Bureautoevaluate the economic importance of intellectual property and, in particular, copyright in the national economy. It unders cored the efficiency of such studies in convincing reluctant policy makers to have a positive attitude towards in tellectual property. Referring to paragraph 29 of document PCIPD/3/9, the Delegation pointed out that the implementation of the set reaties would not require any revolution, but the most important is sue swere to ensure proper implementation of technical protection measures and rights management information. Sufficient policy options were available that would bring balance in the benefits.
- 114. TheDelegationofth eUnitedStatesofAmericaexpressedsatisfactionaboutthe enteringintoforceoftheWCTandWPPTthisyear,andappreciatedtheeffortsofWIPOto promotetheirimplementation.Itaddedthatitwasgratifyingtoseetheuniversalacceptance ofthesetr eaties,sincemorethanhalfofthememberswerefromdevelopingcountries,40% fromcountriesintransitionandonly5% fromdevelopedcountries.Inthisregard,the Delegationnotedtheleadershiptakenbydevelopingcountriesinembracingthedigitala ge, hence,showingtheirrecognitionthatthewayforwardineconomicdevelopmentbeganwith creatingaconduciveenvironment.TheDelegationfurtherpointedoutthatthecriticalphase withregardtothesetwotreatieswastheimplementationandenforcem entoftheestablished standardssothattheInternetanddigitalenvironmentwouldbeprotectedagainstpiracy. Finally,theDelegationstatedthatitlookedforwardtoworkingwithcurrentandnew membersofthetreatiestoensureaseamlessandpiracy -freeweb.
- 115. The Delegation of Sudan commended the many positive aspects and advantages which canbedrawnfromtheWCTandtheWPPT.However,someissuesremainedoutstanding andtheyweretobedealtwithasamatterofpriorityinthepursui tofinternationalprotection ofcreativeworks and performances. The Delegation expressed that access to digital networks wasaprerequisiteforawellfunctioningsystemfortheprotectionofintellectualpropertyina digitalenvironment, butaccessto digital networks was not affordable to many developing countries, particularly in Africa. Thus it stood as a stumbling block on the way of these countries to make real progress towards establishing institutions of creators, performances and producerscap ableofmeetingthechallengesofthedigitalenvironmenttotheextentthatthey can explore advantages of the treaties to derive benefits. Building digital networks required expertiseandknow -how, connectivity and basic -infrastructure requirements which were not withineasyreachofmanycountries. The Delegation believed that the protection provided under the WCT and the WPPT was equally important to be extended to traditional knowledgeandexpressionsoffolkloresincetheydepictedanembodimentof creativityand inventiveness. The Delegation emphasized that the work of the Intergovernmental Committeeon Traditional Knowledge, Genetic Resources, and Folklores hould be supported and guided the support of the s $towards delivering concrete outcomes. It added that while {\it th}WCT and WPPT provided$ protectiontocertainworksoffolkloreandarts, itremained the concern that obligations under those treaties would not have the desired effects by many developing countries, that local creatorsandtraditionalknowledgeholdersg enerateincomeandbenefitsfromtheirworksin ordertoimprovetheirsocialliving conditions. The Delegation remained sceptical asto whetherinvestmentsinaconsiderablenumberofdevelopingcountrieswouldleadtojob creationforthelocalpopulati oninsubstantialproportions, because more often investors were

keen on guaranteeing the abundance of modern in frastructure, advance technology and expertise to run their investments, and hence the preferable option would be to import them from a broad.

- 116. TheDelegationoftheRepublicofKoreaacknowledgedtheimportantrolewhichthe WCTandWPPTcanplayinthedigitalera.Itobservedthatthefactthatthemembershipof thesetreatiessofarwaslargelycomposedofdevelopingcountriesan dcountriesintransition sentbothapositiveandnegativesignal.TheDelegationrequestedWIPOtoencourage developedcountriestojointhesetreaties.
- 117. TheDelegationofAlgeriahighlightedtheadvantagesofaccessiontototheWCTand WPPTasameansofmeetingthechallengesrepresentedbythespreadofdigitaltechnology, preservingtheinterestsofcreatorsinordertoprotectthemagainstunauthorizeduseoftheir worksandpromotingcreativity.ItannouncedAlgeria'sfirmintention toadaptitslegal systemtothenewtechnologicalenvironmentandtointernationalstandardsinordertobeina positiontoaccedetotheWCTandWPPT.ItencouragedWIPOtopursueitscooperative workfortheimplementationofthetreaties,notonlyi ntermsoftheupgradingoflegislation butalsotocreateanenvironmentconducivetotheobservanceoftherightsenshrinedinthem.
- 118. The Delegation of Senegal commended WIPO for the activities carried on inconnection with the implementation of the WCT and WPPT. It announced Senegal's ratification of the treaties and its intention to ask WIPO for technical assistance in adapting its legislation to their provisions. The Delegation wondered at the small number of ratifications on the part of industrialized countries. It in sisted by way of conclusion on the need for WIPO to focus its action on publicizing the treaties and bringing them to the notice of the interested parties, namely creators, who quite of tenhad only a very limited knowledge of the rights written into international instruments for their benefit.
- 119. The Secretariat, responding to issues raised, said that the International Bureau, and in particularitsCopyrightSector,wouldcontinuetopromotethetreaties,andorga onimplementationissues, also targeting developed countries to the extent required. The fact that, for instance, countries in Western Europehadnot become parties to the treaties so far, wasapparentlyduetotheneedtogofirstthrough aregionalcopyrightharmonizationprocess withinthe European Union and to subsequently adopt national implementing legislation. He agreed with the Delegation of Senegal in that, in addition to establishing implementing legislation,morehadtobedonet osensitizethegeneralpublic, as well as professional circles concerned in WIPO Member States, and raise awareness about the benefit of a modern and the state of the states ocopyrightprotectionsystem.WIPO'sCooperationforDevelopmentProgramextendedto these areas, as well. - 121. DiscussionswerebasedondocumentPCIPD/3/4.
- 122. TheDelegationofSpainexpresseditsinterestintheautomationproject,recognizi ngit asameansofimprovingworkintheIP offices.Itmadereferencetothepositiveimpactof theSeminarheldinBrazilonIndustrialProperty,thePCTandelectroniccommunication. TheDelegationreiteratedSpain'sinterestinautomationprojectsa satoolforexchangeof informationonpatentsandlodgingofpatentapplicationselectronically,aswellasalinkfor theLACregionwiththePatentOfficeoftheUnitedStatesofAmericaandtherestofthe world.
- 123. TheDelegationofCubae xpressedappreciationforthetechnicalsupportprovidedby WIPOtotheLACregion,urgingthenationalofficestoplayamoreproactiverole.Itthanked theOrganizationforthedeploymentoftheWIPO NETsystem,andsuggestedthatthe equipmentforitsu seshouldbeintegratedinnationaloffices'existingtechnological infrastructures,whichwouldmakeitpossibleforthepatentandtrademarksoftwaretobe installed.Itwelcomedandsupportedtheelectronicpublicationsproject,whichwouldgive Ibero-Americancountriesthebenefitoffull -textpublicationofpatentdocumentsinSpanish, andalsotheworkdoneonthatprojectbyWIPOandtheSpanishPatentandTrademark Office.
- 124. TheDelegationofSaintLuciaexpresseditscommitmenttoth eautomationof IP offices,asitimprovedtheproductivityoftheoffices.Itexpressedsatisfactionwiththe RegionalTrademarkInformationSystemfortheCaribbean,whichhadalreadybeendeployed intheIP officesofBarbados,TrinidadandTobagoand Jamaica,pointingoutthatthesame systemwouldbeinstalledinSaint Luciawithinthenextcoupleofmonths.TheDelegation, however,expressedconcernregardingtheWIPO NETkitwhichcouldnotbeusedforother activitiesintheoffice,thusplacinga strainonsmallIPoffices.IturgedtheInternational Bureautoinitiatediscussionswithsuppliersofthekitsothatthisproblemcouldberesolved.
- 125. The Delegation of Ethiopia thanked WIPO for all the technical assistance and capacity building support provided to Ethiopia over the years and expressed particular appreciation for the inclusion of Ethiopia in the six pilot countries for the IPO ffice Automation Projectin Africa.
- 126. The Delegation of Nicaragua pointed at the import antinvestment Nicaragua had made inhuman resources for automation of its IP office. In this regard it paid tribute to Sweden and Spain for their assistance in favour of this project. The Delegation expressed support for the WIPO NET project.
- 127. TheDelegationofColombiathankedWIPOforitsworkintheLACregionwhich resultedinColombiabeingoneofthesevencountrieswhereWIPOsentautomationmissions. ItstressedtheimportanceofstrengtheningtheIPofficesandurgedforthesigning ofmore cooperationagreementswithotherdevelopedcountrieswishingtoassistdeveloping countries.

- 128. TheDelegationofKenyarecognized,andexpressedsatisfactionwith,thelongstanding cooperationbetweenWIPOandKenyaandmadeparticul arreferencetotheautomation assistancedatingbacksince1995.InthisregardtheDelegationexpresseditsthankstoWIPO forKenyabeingselectedasoneofthesixpilotcountriesfortheIPOfficeAutomationProject inAfrica.TheDelegationalsono tedwithappreciationtheassistancereceivedfromWIPO throughtheNFAPsandtheWIPO NETprojectandreiterateditscommitmentforfuture cooperation.
- 129. The Delegation of Nigeria acknowledged with appreciation the assistance given by WIPO to the Nigerian Patents, Designs and Trademarks Office as well as the deployment of the WIPO NET kits. It requested that this assistance be extended to the Nigerian Copyright Commission and the two approved collectings ocieties based in Nigeria.
- 130. TheDelegationofJamaicaexpressedsatisfactionwiththeassistancegivenbyWIPO andreferredtothemeetingheldinBarbadosin2001whichhadresultedinthedevelopment anddeploymentofthetrademarkssystemfortheCaribbean.ItthankedWIPOfor undertakingthethreeautomationmissionstotheJamaicanIPofficeandtheassistance providedthroughtheNFAP.TheDelegationemphasizedthatautomationandtraining remainedpriorityareasforJamaica,andspecificactivitieswouldbepursuedthroughth NFAP.

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- 131. The Delegation of Egyptunder lined the importance of the automation project as it contributed to the effectiveness of the IP offices. It thanked the International Bureau for its technical support in this regard which had resulted in the successful completion of the automation of the Egyptian Patent Office. The Delegation emphasized the need for an exchange of information in this area.
- 132. The Delegation of Peruthanked WIPO for the automation of IPO ffices and expressed its appreciation regarding the next WIPO NETS eminar to be held in Peru. It expressed Peru's interestin, and support for, the electronic publication of industrial property information.
- 133. TheDelegationofMozambiquepointedatthesignificantimp actwhichautomationcan haveonthemodernizationofIPofficesindevelopingcountriesandparticularlyin Mozambique, adding that Mozambique had invested much interms of infrastructure and the structure of the stadministrativearrangementsfortheWIPO NETproject.Inthesa meregardtheGovernmentof Mozambiquewascommittedtoconductinganationalsurveyofitsindustrieswiththeaimof possibleadaptationtonewtechnologies. Inthatway, the information technology that would beprovidedby WIPONETproject, would be ac rucialcontribution. The challenge facing WIPOandtheIPofficeswasthetransformationofthepaper -basedofficeswithinadequate infrastructureandtechnicaltoolsintomodernfullyautomatedoffices. The Delegation stressedtheneedforhumanresource trainingbeingoneofthekeycomponentsforthe Program.
- 134. TheDelegationofSweden,referringtoparagraph22ofdocumentPCIPD/3/4, expressedsati sfactionthattheautomationactivitiescoveredbothindustrialpropertyoffices andthecollectivemanagementsystems.Pointingoutthatalthoughtherewasnoregistration perseinthecollectingsocieties,theyhadtohandleenormousamountsofinforma tionon rights,worksanduserswhichwouldbefacilitatedthroughautomation.TheDelegation consideredofficeautomationasanimportantelementfortheIPofficesalsointhelightof Article62oftheTRIPSAgreementwhichstipulatedthatintheacqui sitionofIPrightsthere

hadtobeprocedures which permit the granting or registration of the right within a reasonable period of times oas to avoid unwarranted curtailment of the period of protection.

- 135. TheRepresentativeofOAPIexpressed hisgratitudetoMr. CasteloandtheDirector GeneraloftheFrenchInstituteofIndustrialPropertyfortheirsupportandadviceinthe implementationoftheautomationofOAPIfromthereceptiontothepublicationofitsofficial IndustrialPropertyGaze tte.HeindicatedtheparticularinterestofOAPIintheautomationof itsMemberStates'officesforacloserworkingrelation.HeurgedWIPOtotakethese concernsintoconsiderationastheautomationofthenationalofficesandalinkagetothe OAPIs ystemswouldbringclosercooperationandintegrationinintellectualpropertyissuesin theregion.
- 136. The Representative of ARIPO reiterated the importance which ARIPO attached to the automationofintellectualpropertyoffices, particularly t hatofitsSecretariatinHarareandits MemberStates, and thanked WIPO for the successful implementation of the WIPO projectinitsSecretariat.ARIPOwaslookingforwardtothesuccessfulimplementationofthe automationprojectsinKenya,Lesotho, ZimbabweandNamibia.TheRepresentativeurged WIPOtoacceleratethedevelopmentofthesoftwarefordeploymentintheautomation projectsinitsMemberStatessothattheycouldtakeadvantageoftheITsystemsandsothat anonlinelinkbetweentheARI PO database and those of Member States would beestablished. This was particularly desirable as ARIPO's own POLITEs of tware (developed and the property of the property ofbyEPO)wasbeingtestedandwouldbeoperationalbyJanuary 2003. The Representative referredtothefiveyearinforma tiontechnologyplan(ARIVISION)adoptedlastyearin NovemberbyitsAdministrativeCouncilwhich,buildingonWIPO NETandPOLITE, sought toensurethatARIPOwouldbereadyforelectronicfilingbytheyear2006. That yearwas chosenspecificallybecaus e,firstly,by2006themajorityofARIPO'sMemberStateswould havetocomplywiththeTRIPSAgreementand,secondly,underthePatentLawTreaty (PLT), some IP of fices might cease to accept applications in paper form by June 2, 2005.
- 137. TheSe cretariatwelcomedtheconstructiveandencouragingremarksandcomments of theDelegationsonthisitemandreiteratedWIPO's commitment with respect to implementation of the Intellectual Property Office Automation Project. It informed the Committee that the deployment of the automation project in Africa was beginning with Kenya, one of the pilot countries, in November 2002.
 - 138. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocument PCIPD/3/4.

- 140. TheDelegationofIndiahighlightedthefactthatsinceIndia'saccessionin December 1998,Indiahadwitnessedthehig hestgrowthratesintermsofuseofthePCT system.Moreandmoresectorsofthepopulation:researchers,inventors,companiesand universities,hadbeenusingthePCTsystemforseekingpatentprotectionabroad.Thus figuresinthefilingofinternati onalapplicationshaddoubledeveryyear.TheDelegationalso stressedthattodate,Indiahademergedasthethirdlargestuserinthedevelopingworld,the fourthlargestamongdevelopingcountriesandcountriesintransitionandthe22 ndlargest worldwide.Furthermore,theIndianCouncilofScientificResearchrankedsecondamongthe

principalusersofthePCTinthedevelopingworld. The Delegation expressed its gratitude to WIPO and in particular to Mr. Castelo and his colleagues for the organizatio no fseminars and workshops in India which had been very beneficial for all stakeholders in the system. The Delegation made recommendations for the maintaining and strengthening of cooperation to supplement efforts of the Indian Government. It further commended the organization of specialized training programs geared to civil servants, policy makers, academicians, enforcement of ficials, patent attorneys, teachers and students.

- 141. The Delegation of the Russian Federation underlined the impor tancethatthe Government of the Russian Federation attached to the WIPOT reaties including the PCT. The Delegation state dthatafeereductionwouldallowthose countries to devote finances to their own national systems. The Delegational so recommendedthatanelectroniclibrarybecreatedinordertoacceleratetheimplementationof thePCT.Theaccesstothatlibrarysh ouldbefacilitatedfortheirpatentandtrademarkoffices aswellasforstakeholdersinthesystem. Thequestion of financing would need to be addressedsincethedocumentscontainedintheelectroniclibrarywouldneedtobetranslated intoChineseand Russian.TheDelegationfurtherrecommendedtoestablishcooperation linkstoenhancetheefficiencyofpatentofficesintheprocessingofapplications. Italso called on the International Bureau for assistance through experts in the area of evaluationand transfer of technology. The Delegation thanked the International Bureau for its cooperationand assistance specially in the field of the PCT.
- 142. The Delegation of Moroccothanked WIPO for the cooperation extended to Moroccoin theareaof the PCT. The Delegation stated that the Government of Moroccowas negotiating withexportersandreiteratedthatitwouldreinforcecooperationwiththeInternationalBureau inordertopromoteawarenesssoastoenhancethesuccessofthePCT.TheDele describeditscountry'spositiveexperiencewiththeMadridSystem.Thesystemhadworked well,inparticular,asreflectedintheincreaseduseandprotectionofforeigntrademarksin Morocco. Unfortunately, the same could not be said in the reve rsedirectionwithrespectto nationaltrademarks. The Delegation therefore commended the International Bureaufor referringtotheunderutilizationoftheMadridSystembynationalenterprisesinmany developing countries. The Delegation indicated that itsGovernmentwasalreadystartingto workwithnationalenterprises, especially exporters, in building awareness about the Madrid Systemandthatitwishedtostrengthensuchactivities, incooperation with WIPO, so as to correct the imbalanced escribed and ensure that national enterprises would also be able to take betteradvantageofthebenefitsofferedbythesystem.
- 143. TheDelegationofCubaunderlinedtheexcellentworkdonebytheDeveloping Countries(PCT)Divisionespeciallywithrespe cttoitstrainingcourseonPCT -EASYgiven tothestaffoftheOfficeandusersofthesystem. TheDelegationalsoexpressedthankstothe DivisionforitsgeneralassistanceintheimplementationoftheTreatyandstressedthepoint thatDevelopingC ountryMemberStatesneededtoparticipatemoreactivelyinthePCT SAFEproject, which would allow for the filing of international applications on line. The Delegationals othanked the Developing Countries (Madridand The Hague Systems) Division for the assistance and cooperation they had provided to its country. The Delegation expressed its appreciation for the continued support of fered concerning the implementation and administration of the Madrid System. The Delegation, in particular, congratulated WIPO for

having organized earlier this year the Workshop on the Implementation and Administration of the Madrid System for developing countries and countries in transition party to the system.

- 144. The Delegation of the United States of America was spleased to announce the passage of legislation to ratify the Madrid Protocol and looked forward to participating in the Madrid Systemonce the needed procedures were put into place within the next year.
- 145. TheDelegationofSudanmentionedth atalthoughSudanwasconsideredaleast developedcountry(LDC), ithadstarted the implementation of the PCT in the early 1990's and received numerous requests through the receiving office. The Delegation further stated that certain applicants and inventors have made enquiries with respect to the secrecy and confidentiality of the PCT system. The Delegation expressed the hope to receive the necessary assistance in improving the service. The Delegation emphasized the fact that despite the 75% reduction of certain PCT fees, the amount was still abunden someone for applicants from Sudan. The Delegation requested a further review of the feesy stem.
- 146. The Delegation of Egypt stated that Egypt was proceeding to the accession of the PCT and exp ressedits gratitude to the International Bureau for the cooperation efforts facilitating accession. The Delegation made special reference to the national colloquium held in Egyptin 2001 which had been avery successful event. The Delegation reiterated thateffectiveuseof thesystemwouldbereflectedintheabilityofdevelopingcountriestotakeonquestions related to traditional knowledge. The Delegational soma dereference to the proposal to includetraditionalknowledgeinthepriorartsystemofthePCT. Itstatedthatthisproposal $was very useful and could help extend use of the system by developing countries. TheMadridandTheHaguesystemswereunderutilizedbynationalenterprisesindeveloping countries, and WIPO needed to further increase its cooperation activities to assist exporters andmanufacturersi nEgyptsothattheycouldmakebetteruseofthosesystems,especiallyas far a strade mark and design protection abroad was concerned. The Delegation hoped that an instance of the property of the pincreaseduseofthesystemsmightalsoleadtoaddressingissuesrelatedtotraditional knowledge.
- 147. The Delegation of Nicaraguas aid that accession to the PCT was intended with a view to promoting national and innovative development. The Delegation expressed the hope that the instrument of accession could so on be transmitted to WIPO and that WIPO would assist in the implementation of the treaty.
- 148. The Delegation of Kenya emphasized the fact that the Government of Kenya recognized intellectualpropertyrightsasanimportanttoolfortradeandasacornerstoneformode rn economic policy. The Delegation added that Kenyahad put the necessary machinery in placefortheeffectivemanagementofintellectualpropertyrightsinthecountry. Itunderlined the factthatKenyaispartytomanyintellectualpropertytreaties,i ncludingthePCTandthe MadridSystem, and that most aspects of industrial property, copyright and plant varieties couldbeprotectedinKenya. The Delegationad vocated the need for WIPO to ensure that the intellectualpropertysystemreflecttheneedso fdeveloping countries, in particular as regards theimpactonthesocio -economicdevelopmentofthesecountriesandtoavoidconflictwith publichealth. The Delegation added that new intellectual property legislation had been adoptedtoaccommodatechan gesonthelocal,regionalandinternationalscenes,thus improving and strengthening the protection, enforcement and management of intellectual propertyrights in its country and ensuring conformity with international obligations. The

Delegationalsohig hlightedtheimportanceofthetechnicalinformationdisclosedinpatents documentsandinformedthat KIPIhasaPatentandDocumentationCentrewhichhousesover 12milliondocumentsonpatentsfromallpartsoftheworld. The Delegation informed that one of the functions of KIPI was to provide patent information to the public from this database. Kenyahad continued to pursue international cooperation in the intellectual property field by becoming party to several global protection systems, as well as the WTO, and was currently making efforts to accede to other such multilateral arrangements.

- 149. TheDelegationoftheRepublicofKoreastatedthatduringthelastfiveyearstherehad beenaremarkableincreaseinPCTapplicationsfiledinth ecountry.Intheyear2001, nationalsandresidentsoftheRepublicofKoreahadfiledthehighestnumberofinternational applications(2.318)filedindevelopingcountries, placingthecountryintheeightpositionin theworldintermsofthenumbero fPCTapplications.TheDelegationfurtherexpressedits gratitudetoWIPOfortheeffortsandcooperationinbuildingawarenessontheadvantagesof thePCT.TheDelegationpointedoutthatthePCTfeesneverthelessremainedbeyondthe reachofmostsma llandmediumsizedenterprises(SME)andindividualinventors.The DelegationrequestedthatconsiderationbegiventothereductionofPCTfeesforSMEsand individualinventors.TheDelegationannouncedthatitscountrywasintheprocessof acceding totheMadridProtocolintheverynearfuture.
- 150. TheRepresentativeofARIPOreferredtothelinkbetweenARIPOandtheHarare ProtocolandtheevolutionoftheaccessiontothePCTbyARIPOMemberStates(from3 to 10),preandposttheforma llinkbetweenARIPOandtheHarareProtocol.Hestatedthat helookedforwardtothedaythatallARIPOMemberStateswouldbepartytothePCT.The RepresentativeexpressedthankstoWIPOfortheassistancerenderedtoMemberStatesand ARIPOitselfin theareaofPCT.HereiteratedthefactthatdespitethenumerousPCT seminars,thenumberofPCTapplicationsemanatingfromtheregionstillremainedsmall. TheRepresentativerequestedthattheDevelopingCountries(PCT)Divisionconsiderthe organizationofmoreseminarsinthenexttwoyears.

153. TheDelegationsofVenezuela,EgyptandBrazil,joinedtogethertoexpresstheir appreciationoftheworkdonebytheChairandbytheSecretariat,agreedthatinfutureaw shouldbefoundofrecordinginthereporttheconclusionsdrawnbytheChaironeachagenda item.Theyalsomentionedthatimportantissueshadbeenraisedatthepresentmeeting, amongthemtheneedtoincreasetheresourcesavailablefordevelopment cooperation activitiesandtogiveaspecificboosttocertainprograms,thespecializationoftheAcademy andtheincorporationintheCommittee'sactivitiesofthepointsraisedintheDohaMinisterial DeclarationontheTRIPSAgreementandPublicHealt h,butthatnoneofthemhadgoneon recordasconclusionsoftheChair.

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- 154. The Delegation of Barbados, on behalf of GRULAC, expressed the desire that the Secretaria two uldin corporate and implement the various recommendations made during the meeting of this Committee, in particular the need to increase all kind of resources for the cooperation for development activities. The Delegation concluded by noting that this fact should be keptin mind during the next meeting of the Program and Budget Committee.
- 155. TheDelegationofIndia, speaking on behalf of the Asian group, highlighted the useful discussions that had taken place both in the plenary and in the Forum on Strategic Issues for the Future. This meeting had given the opportunit yto discuss different activities in the cooperation for development sector and the related work done by other divisions of WIPO on development. The Delegation expressed its wish that the recommendations made during the meeting bein corporated in the policies of the cooperation programs to strengthen them.
- 156. The Delegation of China highlighted as an important progress the format of the meeting. The Delegation further expressed its interest that in the future more issues should be included in the Forum to be discussed by delegations.
- 157. Mr.RobertoCastelo,inhisclosingremarks,thankedtheCommitteeonbehalfofthe DirectorGeneral,forthewaythediscussionstookplace.Hehighlightedthefactthat,onthis occasion,adifferen tformatforthesessionhadbeenadoptedandwelcomedbydelegations. Healsoreferredtothefactthatimportantconclusionshadbeenraisedfromtheforumthat shouldguidetheactivitiesofthesector.Hethankedalldelegationsfortheirconstructiv frankparticipationaswellastheChairforhercapacityandtheworkdoneinconductingthe meeting.
