- 1. The WIPOPermanent Committee on Cooperation for Development Related to Intellectual Property ("the Committee") held its third session in Geneva at WIPO head quarters from October 28 to 29 and subsequently at the International Labour Organization head quarters from October 30 to November 1, 2002.

- 9. DiscussionswerebasedondocumentPCIPD/3/3.TheSecretariatnotedthattheguiding philosophyofthecooperationfordevelopmentactivitieswastoworkinpartnership, includingdevel opinganddevelopedcountries,UnitedNationsorganizations,other intergovernmentalorganizationsandnon -governmentalorganizations.Itstressedthe importanceoftheexistingfunds -in-trustwhichhadcontributedbothintermsofqualityand quantityof cooperationfordevelopmentactivitiesandhighlightedtheachievementsofthe RegionalBureausandotherDivisionsoftheSector,obtainedthroughoutthereportingperiod.
- The Delegation of Barbados, speaking on behalf of GRULAC, thanked WI PO. particularlytheCooperationforDevelopmentstaff,forthedocumentationprepared and expressed their full support and cooperation. Its tressed that the Cooperation for the cooperation of theDevelopmentprogramwasacriticalelementofWIPO'sworkprogram, and that addit ional financialandhumanresourcesmustbemadeavailabletotheprogramtoensuretimelyand effectiveimplementationofthevarioustechnicalcooperationactivities. The Delegations aid thatitwouldliketoseethisincreasereflectedinthe2004 -2005budget.Itreferredtothe priorityareasforworkasfollows:traditionalknowledge,folkloreandgeneticresources, institutionbuilding, small and mediumenter prises (SMEs), human resource training, new informationtechnologies,e -commerceandintell ectualpropertyasatoolfordevelopment. Furthermore, it drew the attention, in particular, to the activities identified by Ministers and Heads of Intellectual Property Offices of Latin America and the Caribbean at their respectivemeetingsearlierthis year. It expressed concernabout the cancellation of the Worldwide Academy's Intellectual Property Course in Spanish and requested its reinstatement. It wished toplaceonrecordtheimportanceofWIPO's assistance in financing the participation of capital-basedexpertsatWIPOmeetingsandstressedtheneedforWIPOtodistributefunding toensurethatbeneficiarycountriesderivethemaximumbenefit. Itrequested greater cooperation in the area of promoting respect for intellectual property, especiall ybyorganizing workshopsorseminarsforlawenforcementofficials. Itreferred to the institution of Nationally/RegionallyFocusedActionPlans(NFAPs/RFAPs)andrequestedtohavebroader consultation within Member States in order to increase the benefittstherefrom.Manyofthe issuesonWIPO's agendawere of a crosscutting nature, and therefore it was important that the Ministries befully involved in discussions on the identification of needs and priorities. A broadandresponsivevisionwasneededi nordertorealizeWIPO'smandateinhelping developing countries to participate in and benefit from the intellectual property system. This visionmustnotbelimitedtotechnical/infrastructuralissuesbut,rather,acknowledgeand incorporatetheresults of important developments in the field of intellectual property, while retainingatitscoreacriticalanalysisoftherelationshipbetweenintellectualpropertyand development. The Delegation referred to the Doha Ministerial Declaration on the TRIPS AgreementandPublicHealthandtheReportoftheUnitedKingdomCommissionon IntellectualPropertyRights, which contained a number of ideas that WIPO could consider pursuingwithitsMemberStates.
- 11. TheDelegationofIndia,speakingonbehalf oftheAsianGroup,reiteratedtheGroup's appreciationforthedynamicleadershipoftheDirectorGeneral.ItsaidthattheGroupwas pleasedwiththecooperationactivitiesthatWIPOhadengagedinfortheAsiaandthePacific regionandespeciallythankedtheDirectoroftheAsiaandPacificBureaufororganizing severalhigh -profileactivities,designedtostrengthenthecapacityofdevelopingcountriesin theregiontofullyutilizetheintellectualpropertysystemforeconomic,socialandcultural development.ItexpresseditssatisfactionattheworkcarriedoutbyWIPO,statingthatinthe biennium2000 -2001,theCooperationforDevelopmentSectorhadassisteddeveloping

countries to develop and maintain intellectual property infrastructures. In thatcontextthe NFAPsprovidedpolicytoolsforenhancingtechnicalcooperation, particularly in modernizing intellectualpropertysystemssoastorespondtochallengessuchastheprotectionof traditionalknowledgeandfolkloreandthepreservationof biodiversity. It noted the efforts madebyWIPOtorespondtotheincreasingneedfortechnicalassistanceinmodernizingthe intellectual property systems of developing countries, including Least Developed Countries(LDCs). Ithighlighted the beneficial impactoftheautomationprojectinvolvingintegrated solutionsimplementedtoenhanceefficiencyandpromoteuseoftheindustrialproperty system.ItcommendedtheWIPOWorldwideAcademyforitsteaching,trainingandresearch servicesinintellectual propertyandforextendingitsprogramtoacademicinstitutionsand intellectual property of fices. It noted that equally encouraging have been the efforts of the CopyrightCollectiveManagementDivisioninassistingMembercountriesinsettingup appropriate infrastructures to collectively meet the challenges faced by the copyright industry. The WIPO Digital Agenda had shown concrete results. The Delegation expressed confidence that WIPOwould besuccessful as it was venturing into new areas. Moreover, thatthespecialprogramofWIPOrelatingtotheempowermentofSMEsrevealeda remarkablepotentialfordevelopmentandwealthcreation. The Delegation emphasized that the conduct of the seactivities both within WIPO's regular budget as wel lasviatheextra budgetaryprovisionsuchastheJapanFunds -in-Trust, and through WIPO's cooperation with the Government of Australia, the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development(UNCTAD), the World Trade Organization (WTO), the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the World Bankhad been in strumental in a chieving programobjectives. Asiahad been in the forefront in recognizing that maintaining the creative instinctsofpeoplebyestablishingafavorableintellectualproperty(IP) environmentwas crucialforeconomicdevelopment.Furthermore,itsaidthatnotwithstandingthe well-acknowledgedeffortsthatWIPOhadmade, further assistance in the region was needed toestablishmodernIPinfrastructuresandbuildlastinginstitutions .Itfinallyurgedthe InternationalBureautoprovideenhancedallocationofresourcesfortheAsianregionunder WIPO's Cooperation for Development Budget, particularly inhuman resourced evelopment, modernization, infrastructure development and in en ha ncingthecapacityofcountriesto effectivelyenforceIPprotection.

The Delegation of Algeria, speaking on behalf of the African Group, praised the quality of the work done in the field of cooperation for development, and expressed its gr atitudeto WIPOforitsassistancetodevelopingcountries, which should continue so that they could introduceIPsystemssuitedtotheirneedsintermsofeconomic,technologicalandscientific development. It mentioned the efforts made notably by there gionalbureausinmattersof technicalassistanceinareassuchastheWorldwideAcademy,computerizationandthe modernization of the collective management of copyright. It considered that any intellectual propertysystemhadtobedesignedindueconsidrationofthegeneralinterestofsocietyin termsofitsfundamentalrighttofood,health,educationandemployment.Anypatent protectionsystemhadtostrikeabalancebetweenprivateandpublicinterests, and hadto orresearchinscienceandtechnology. The Delegation operateasaninducementsystemf emphasized the importance to African countries of the Doha Declaration on the TRIPSAgreement and Public Health, as an instrument establishing the priority of public policy concerns, and of the flexibi lityintroduced to that ends othat intellectual property rights might becomeaninstrumentworkingfordevelopment.Inthatconnectionitalsomentionedthe need to a lighthe TRIPS Agreement with the Convention on Biological Diversity and the need to be a convention of the Ctoach ieveadequateprotectionfortraditionalknowledge, geneticresources and folklore. WIPO, asaUN specialized agency, should play a leading role in the intellectual property sphere. Development -related issues should be one of its priorities. It expresse dthewishthat

WIPOusethereportsdrawnupinvariousintergovernmentalandnon -governmentalforums thathadconcernedthemselveswiththequestionofintellectualpropertyanddevelopmentas referencematerialwithwhichtodevisenewprogramsfordeve lopingcountries.Inorderto safeguarditspioneeringrole, WIPOshouldinvolveitselfineffortstopromoteLDC developmentandtocontinuetoworkoncoordinationbetweenWIPOandintergovernmental organizationsconcerned with development issues, not a blytheWTO, with a view to providing developing countries with appropriate technical assistance. The Delegation expressed the wishtoseeareaffirmationoftheprinciplesaccordingtowhichdevelopment -relatedissues shouldbetakenintoaccountbyWIPO inrelationtoeveryinstrumentdealingwiththe protectionandenforcementofintellectualpropertyrights, with the flexibility necessary for developing countries nevertheless being ensured in accordance with the Doha Declaration. Tothatend, developm ent-related fields should be incorporated in the activities of the AdvisoryCommitteeonEnforcement.ItwastheresponsibilityofWIPOtomonitorthe difficulties experienced by developing countries, including LDCs, in the implementation and effectualus eofpresentintellectualpropertysystems, including those that had to do with the protection of traditional knowledge and expressions of folklore. It concluded by recommending, in the name of the African Group, the creation of a multidisciplinary group expertstodrawupareportonindustrialpropertyanddevelopment,inordertoguideWIPOin itstechnical assistance activities, and expressing the wish that the necessary financing be approvedtoencourageWIPOtointensifyitscooperationwithregio nalandsubregional organizationsconcerned within tellectual property rights. Finally, it recommended yearly sessionsfortheCommitteesothatamid -termreviewofWIPO'sactivitiescouldbe conducted.

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- The Delegation of Sweden commended WI PO for the variety, scope and coverage of the activities which had been specified indocument PCIPD/3/3. Itemphasized the importance of paragraph21whichreferstoprofessionalism,dedicationofthestaffofWIPO,thestaffofthe RegionalBureaux,the staffoftheAcademyandofcoursethestaffofthenationalofficesin developing countries. The Delegation appreciated and wished to encourage the cooperation between WIPO and WTO, since it was important that the intellectual property system and its interests and proper implementation were taken into account in the context of trade, which was governed by the WTO. The Delegation considered the NFAPs as a very important tooland of value in incorporating the new issues of genetic resources, biodiversity, knowledgeandfolklore; secondly, the Delegation welcomed the particular attention given to LDCsinthiscontext; and thirdly, it agreed with the necessity to include the private sector in theseplans. The Delegation welcomed the attention iventothejudiciary, and commended thepreparation of the book let on fundamental principles of copyright presented through comparative caselaw. Such material was needed in other fields of IPlawtoo. It supported the collective management activities w ith regard to copyright and found the efforts of regional cooperationinthiscontextgratifying.Furthermore,theDelegationsaidthatdemystification effortsbyWIPOmustbeencouraged.Itstressedtheimportanceofelectroniccommerceas animportant toolinnationalandinternationaltrade.WIPO'scontinuedattentiontothisissue wasmostappropriate. The Delegationad vocated the continuing of activities related to SME's and concluded by expressing its appreciation for the Collection of Laws for ElectronicAccess (CLEA), which had proved to be a valuable tool.
- 14. TheDelegationofBenin,speakingonbehalfoftheGroupofLeastDeveloped Countries(LDCs)waspleasedwiththeimportancethatthemeetinghadattachedtoLDCs, andthankedth eDirectorGeneralandhiswholeteamforhavingdoneso.Itpointedoutthat theLDCcategoryrepresented49Statesand11percentoftheworld'spopulation.It describedthemanyproblemsandconstraintsofvariouskindsthatLDCshadtocontendwith,

among them extreme poverty, their insignificant presence in world trade, the foreign debt with which already fragile economies were burdened, the weakness of human capital and the absenceofasoundindustrialfabricandtechnologybase. It pointed out t hatthoseproblems werecompounded by others connected with geographical location and/orthein ternal or externalshockscausedbynaturaldisastersorconflict. The Delegation drewattention to the undertakingsmadebytheinternationalcommunityinfavo rofLDCs, and also the many objectives and deadlines set for the ending of LDC marginalization. It noted that, with that in mind, WIPOhadshortlisted five means of action who serelevance has been amply proved, namelytheWIPO NETproject, the Academy'sh uman resources development program, the collectivemanagementofcopyrightandrelatedrights, the protection of genetic resources, traditionalknowledgeandfolkloreandtheprogramforSMEs. Itstressed the importance of strengtheningtheLDCUnitwith aviewtoincreasingtheservicesrenderedtocountriesthat neededitsomuch.Itaddedthatsuchsupporthadtoinvolvenotonlyanincreaseinthe budgetoftheUnitwithinWIPO,butalsotheprovisionbytheindustrializedcountries,which hadunderta kentoreduceLDCmarginalization,ofmultilateralfunds -in-trustearmarkedfor intellectual property cooperation with LDCs. It went onto say that the present new age of the knowledgeeconomymadetheefficientuseofknowledgethemostimportantfactor international competitiveness, wealthcreation and social welfare improvement. Moreover, theprogressofLDCscurrentlydependedonthedevelopmentoftechnology, which was why itwasnecessaryforthemtoencouragetheiractivepopulationtocreate,a cquire, disseminate anduseknowledgemoreefficientlyforthebenefitofeconomicandsocialdevelopment. The Delegationnoted that national intellectual property entities, regarded as the pillars of knowledge-basedeconomies, couldenable national resea rchandinnovation operators to adapt todemandbyprovidingthemwithinnovativeideas. With the aid of the incentive sprovided bysuchentities, the countries in question could invest more in research and development and benefitaccordingly.Consequent lytheDelegationwishedtoseeWIPOassistancetoLDCs directed also towards support for the establishment of well -structured national intellectual propertybodiescapableofadministeringandenforcingintellectualpropertyrightsinthose countries.I tendedbywelcomingthejointWIPOandWTOinitiativeontheonehand, and thejointWIPO -WTOworkshopontheimplementationoftheTRIPSAgreementheldin Dar es SalaaminApril2002ontheother.OnbehalfoftheLDCs,itexpresseditssupportfor the actioninitiated by WIPO, and requested it to continue on the same lines for the sake of a betterfutureforLDCs.

The Delegation of Switzerland commended WIPO for the quality of working documents15. and the overview presentation made by Mr. Cas telo, and stated that decision - makers, economicoperatorsandthegeneralpublicshouldunderstandbetterwhatcouldbederived from IP as a precious to olfore conomic development. For illustration, the Delegation mentionedtheworkoftheInternationalB ureauinthefieldofgeneticresources,traditional knowledgeandfolklorethathadhelpedtohighlightthepositiveroleofIPindeveloping countries as well as in LDCs. The Delegationalsoexpressedtheimportanceofspecificareassuchasenforcementanduseof informationtechnology(IT)innationalIPoffices.Concerningthecooperationprogram,the Delegations aidthatitsGovernmentfeltencouragedtoparticipateinWIPOactivities, such as training,PCTsearchingoranewworkshoponinnovationsupportserviceslaunchedin2001 incooperationwiththeDirectorateofDevelopmentandCooperation(DDC),inadditi onto bilateralactivities which were more focused. It cited a cooperation program with the Governmentof VietNam, launchedin June 2001 for three years, to develop an IP systemin various areas encompassing compliance with the TRIPS Agreement, including fourseminars intheareasofTRIPS,copyright,industrialdesignandplantvarieties.Otheractivities

included study visits of Vietnames experts to Europe, developing the IT network, translation of international treaties into the local language, Engli sh-language courses, establishing a modern library and training of judges. These activities, once concluded positively, might lead to other useful activities.

- TheDelegationofEgyptalsosupportedthestatementconveyedbytheDelegationof AlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroup.TheDelegationunderlinedtheimportancewhichit attachedtothisCommittee,namelyinmakingthedevelopmentdimensionplayacentralrole intheprotectionofIPwhiletakingintoconsiderationthespecialneeds ofeachcountry.The DelegationreferredtothereportoftheCommissiononIntellectualPropertyRights establishedbytheUnitedKingdomSecretaryofStateforInternationalDevelopment,dealing withtheintegrationofIPinnationaldevelopmentpolici es.TheDelegationwelcomedthe holdingofaForumonStrategicIssuesfortheFuture(seedocument PCIPD3/2Prov.).The PCIPDdocumentscontainedimportantinformationreflectingtheimportanceofIPinserving economic, social and cultural objectives. Egypthad benefited from WIPO's activities in the field of the use of IT, development of collective management and awareness programs in the varioussectors, undertaken by the Cooperation for Development Bureaufor Arab Countries, andlookedforwardfor furtherintensifiedcooperationafterthepromulgationofLawNo. 82 inJune 2002, onthe protection of IP, which was considered a historical turning point within theframeworkofEgypt'seffortstofullycomplywiththerequirementsoftheTRIPS Agreement. This Committee should not only confirm the activities of WIPO, but also stress, asapriority, the various flexibility aspects which were available to help developing countries tocomplywithinternationalcommitments.DocumentPCIPD/3/3didnotrefer totheDoha Ministerial Declaration, which in its parts related to the issue of public healthwas relevant for the control of the controlthe legislative advice provided by the WIPO to its Member States. In preparing the ProgramandBudgetof2004 -2005,resourcesshouldbeincrease dforthecooperationwiththose developing countries which would be passing the stage of continuous modernization and developmentofIPwithalong -termperspective in the areas of training of human resources, upgradingnationalinstitutionsandintensifi cationofSME's,traditionalknowledgeand geneticresources, in order for countries to avail themselves of the mechanisms that have been madeavailablebyWIPO.Cooperationwithnon -governmentalorganizationsandcivil societyshouldalsobeintensified. The Delegational sounderlined the need of providing translation of WIPO technical meetings in the Arabic language. Finally, the Delegation expressedappreciationfortheInternationalBureau'sachievements.
- TheDelegationoftheDemocrati cPeople'sRepublicofKoreasupportedthestatement made by the Delegation of India on behalf of the Asian Group. The progress andachievementsmadeduringtheperiodunderreviewinthecooperationfordevelopmentsector were commendable. These achieve ments had contributed to strengthening the capacity of developing countries, LDC sinparticular, to fully utilize the intellectual property system for theireconomic, social and cultural development. In addition to WIPO meetings on a variety ofissuesrel atedtointellectualproperty,organizedatinternational,regionalandnational level, the NFAPs had served as an effective strategic and policy to olforen hancing technical cooperation, and the NFAP implementation activities had practically contributed to meeting thespecificchallengesinmodernizingtheintellectualpropertysysteminbothdevelopingand LDCs. The Delegation expressed appreciation of other activities, such as WIPONET.the WIPOWorldwideAcademy, collective management of copyright and r elatedrights, intellectualpropertyissuesrelatedtogeneticresources, traditionalknowledgeandfolklore and SMEs. Its tressed the important role of innovation promotion and of patent informationservicesprovidedbyWIPO.Inconclusion,theDelegati onlookedforwardtoWIPOfurther expandingits assistance to developing countries in the field of intellectual property, and asked

theInternationalBureautoconsiderincreasingallocationfortheparticipationofAsian countriesinmeetingsheldinGene va.

- The Delegation of Italy congratulated WIPO on its ambitious Cooperation for Development program, successfully implemented thanks to the support of multilateral and thebilateraldonorsandthevisionofitsDirectorGeneral.Duringtherepor tingperiod,the GovernmentofItalyhadcloselycooperatedwithWIPOinawiderangeofactivities, particularlyinthearea of SMEs, with the adoption of the Milan Action Planin February -levelactivitiesimplemented,tog etherwiththeWIPO 2001, and intraining, with high WorldwideAcademy,inTurininthepasttwoyears.Theseprojectshadbeendulyreported inthedocuments. The Government of Italyattached great importance to the intellectual propertydomain, bearing in mindthat intellectual proper tywasakeyelementineconomic development, especially for LDCs. For the future, in addition to continuing towork with WIPOintheareas referred to, the Government of Italy would be open to exploring the possibility of cooperation in other sectors, wi thparticularattentiontotheneedsofdeveloping countries.
- The Delegation of Malaysia supported the statement made by the Delegation of India on the Delegation of Malaysia supported the statement made by the Statement made19. behalf of the Asian Group. In its view, the International Bureau had achieved the objective o improvingnational capacities, promoting international cooperation for development, modernizingandutilizingtheIPsystemforeconomic,social,culturalandtechnological advancement of developing countries. The Delegation expressed satisfaction with the implementation of the Cooperation for Development program at the national and regional levelsandcommendedMr.Sabharwalforprovidingcontinuoussupporttothecountry.It stressedthattheIPissueshouldnotbeconfinedtoprotection,butshoulda toolforeconomic, social and cultural development. The Delegation was encouraged by the numberofinterregional, regional and national meetings or ganized, the holding of several high-profileactivities in the region, and by the utilizati onofWIPO's regular budget, but also the Japan Funds - in-Trust, UND Pandthe World Bankwhich added richness and diversity. MalaysiahasbenefitedfromtheJapanFITfortrainingofMalaysianofficialsinTokyo.The DelegationinformedtheCommitteethat MalaysiahadactivelypromotedtheInternettreaties. Asaresult, it was in the final process of acceding to both the WIPO Copyright Treaty (WCT) $and the WIPO Performances and Phonograms Treaty (WPPT). In the area of collective {\it the collection} and {\it the$ management, the Delegat ionacknowledged the preliminary study on ASEAN regional collective management under taken by WIPO upon a request from the ASEAN GroupConsultations (AGC) in Geneva. The Delegation assured the Committee that Malaysia would a support of the Committee of the CjointhePCTnextyear.Finally theDelegationunderscoredthemeaningfulparticipationof developing countries in WIPO activities held in Geneva, and expressed its wish that activities in Asia and the Pacific befurther enhanced and expanded.
- 20. TheDelegationofBrazilendor sedthestatementmadebytheDelegationofBarbados onbehalfofGRULACandcongratulatedtheCooperationforDevelopmentSectorforthe manyactivitiesandinitiativesundertakensincethelastsessionoftheCommittee.It requestedtoputonrecordthe needforallocating,inthefuture,sufficienttimetosessionsof theCommitteetoallowinteractionamongdelegations.TheDelegationfurtherpointedout thatcooperationfordevelopmentrelatedtointellectualpropertywasofgreatimportanceto Brazil.Becauseoflackoftime,theDelegationonlymentionedafewcooperationfor developmentactivities.InMarch2002,theGovernmentofBrazilandWIPOhadsigneda technicalcooperationtermsofreferenceagreementwithaviewtomodernizingtheNation IndustrialPropertyInstituteofBrazil,aprojectthatforesawtheimplementationofanumber ofimportantautomationmeasures.InAprilofthisyear,WIPOandtheCommunityof

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Portuguese-SpeakingCountries(CPLP), signed a cooperation agreement. The sefactswere evidenceoftheimportanceofthecooperationprogramandoftheneedforincreasingits budgetallocationunderWIPO'sbudget.ConcerningIP -relateddevelopmentcooperation,the Delegationemphasizedthatprogramsmustbedemanddriven, and enablecountriesnotonly tomeetobligationsbutalsotoexerciserights. Inordertoensurethecontinued effectiveness and usefulness of IP systems, the objectives of IP -relatedactivitiesmustbesubjecttoconstant reviewandupdatingsoastoremai nfullyconsistentwitheconomicandsocialgoalsofthe international community. The Delegation observed that the Permanent Committee should not a simple community of the property of the propertybeafraid of being innovative and creative in assessing the future of its cooperation for developmentactivit ies, and in making surethat IP -related technical assistance cooperation programswouldbefullyintegrated into national development plans of Member States. The importance of the Doha Declarati onontheTRIPSAgreement and Public Health cannot be overstated. The Delegation recommended that the International Bureau's cooperation for development agendas hould fully acknowledge and incorporate the provisionsoftheDohaDeclarationinrelationto publichealth.Moreover,theIPinitiatives should also fully take the Declaration into account and help to enable countries to be nefit from the flexibilities that were available under the TRIPS Agreement, for example the use of compulsorylicensinginth epursuitofpublichealthobjectives. Member Statesmustbeaided inoperationalizingthoseflexibilities. Another area of equal importance that could be exploredbyWIPOinpartnershipwithMemberStateswastheroleofcompetitionpolicyin theenactm entofaregulatoryframeworkrelatedtointellectualpropertyrights.

- The Delegation of Madagas carthanked WIPO and the Director General for their untiringeffortstomeetthechallengesfacingtheOrganization.Itwaspleasedwiththe progressmade in the enhancement of the ability of developing countries, and especially LDCs,tomakeuseofintellectualpropertyasafactorofeconomic,socialandcultural development. - 22. TheDelegation of theRepublicofKoreathankedWIPO,foritsexcellentplanning and implementation of programs. TheDelegation stated that the Republic of Koreawas one of the most successful beneficiaries of WIPO 's activities. Thanks to WIPO, the Republic of Koreahadr eached an advanced level in all aspects of intellectual property. The Delegation also mentioned important achievements reached by WIPO and the Government of the Republic of Korea, namely ability all agreement to jointly implement certain cooperation for

developmentactivities for the benefit of other countries, a joint study of the effect of IP in high-techindustries and a joint training program.

- The Delegation of Tunisiathanked Mr. Casteloand the Cooperation for Development BureauforAra bCountriesfortheaidandsupportgiventoitscountry.Itendorsedthe statementmadebyAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroup.Ithadnotedwithinterestthe DirectorGeneral'sstrategydesignedtostrengthentheroleofnationalofficeswithaview to developing and modernizing intellectual property systems and using them more efficiently. TheDelegationmentionedacertainnumberofoperationsconductedinitscountrywith WIPO'ssupport,namelythetrainingandsensitizingofanumberofpersons inauthorityin Tunisia with respect to intellectual property law, the modernization and computerization of industrial property and the organization of technical seminars on the PCT following Tunisia's accessiontothatTreaty.Inthatconnection,theDel egationdeclareditselfimpressedbythe energy, competence and flexibility that the Bureau had shown in responding to the needs expressed. It pointed out that the very useful assistance of WIPO was at present essential to prepareotherstakeholdersfort henewglobaleconomicchanges. Itadded, moreover, that other operators deserved to be trained and informed more in such areas as small and mediumsizedindustrialandcraftenterprises. The Delegation requested the assistance of the International Burea uinachieving those objectives and implementing the global cooperation projectwithTunisia.
- 24. TheDelegationofZambiaassociateditselfwiththestatementmadebytheDelegation ofAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroup,andbytheDelegatio nofBeninonbehalfoftDCs, andcommendedtheInternationalBureauforitsassistancetoAfrica,andinparticularLDCs, aswellasforitsinitiativesimplementedintheregion.Itacknowledgedtheachievementsin theareasoflegislation,strengthenigofinstitutions,administrationofIPandhuman resourcesdevelopmentasthepillarofsuccess.TheDelegationrecommendedthatmore resourcesbemadeavailablefortheAfricaBureauinordertoenableittocarryoutits outreachanddemystificationpr ograms,training,modernizationofIPofficesandprovisionof assistancetoresearchanddevelopmentinstitutions.Thisway,SMEs,inventors,researchers, traditionalknowledgeholders,artistsandothercreatorswouldbeencouragedtouseIPasa toolf orwealthcreation.TheDelegationconcludedthatstrengtheningtheLDCUnitmightbe onewaytopositivelytranslateMemberStates'statementsabouttheirdifficultsituationinto concreteaction.
- The Delegation of Spainpointed out that the Spanish Patent and Trademark Office was engage dinanintensive task of international cooperation in the field of intellectual property.AmongtheactivitiesprogrammedforthecurrentyearitmentionedtheLatinAmerican meetingtopublicizepatentiss ues,organizedjointlywithINPIBrazil,andtheseminar organized with that same country, WIPO and the European Patent Office (EPO) on industrialproperty information and the PCT for the benefit of Latin American countries. The seminar and the PCT for the benefit of Latin American countries are the property of the prwouldmakeitposibleforsearchfilesofSpanish -languagepatentdocumentstobecompiled. The Delegation also mentioned the collaboration that the Spanish Patent and TrademarkOfficehadstartedthatyearwithIbero -Americanoffices, taking the form of seminars and regionalworkshopstopublicizethenewNiceClassificationinSpanishandthetrainingof patentexaminers, the latter carried outjointly with IMPIMexico. Bilateral collaborative arrangementswereinplacewithChina,Mexico,Panama,Portugal,theRussian Federation, and Uruguay, and activities were being carried on in Spainitself. The Delegation spoke, moreover, of initiatives relating to the enforcement of intellectual property rights, saying that itscountryhadjoinedWIPOandtheEPOinsponsoringtr ainingandawarenessactivitiesfor

Ibero-Americanjudgesandprosecutors. Inconclusion, itrepeated its country's interestin contributing to a strengthening of international cooperation in the intellectual property field.

- The Delegation of Morocco supported the proposal made by the African Group, and expressed the wish that the Group's Coordinators hould submit it separately to their Committeefor assessment. It mentioned the cooperative action conducted in the course of recentyears, whi chhadhadaconsiderablybeneficial effect, bothinits own country and in otherbeneficiary countries. Among those initiatives, itmentioned the participation of officials of Araband African countries in training sessions, and also study tours. The Delegation finally invited WIPO to consider the possibilityofintroducingatrainingsys temfortrainersatregionalandsub -regionallevelfor allareasofintellectual property, and said that its country would be willing to host an initiative ofthatkind.
- 27. TheDelegationofUruguaysubscribedtowhathadbeensaidbytheRepre sentativeof GRULAC, and recognized the important part played by the Cooperation for Development programinthedemonstrableimprovementofallaspectsofintellectualpropertyinthe countries of the region. It acknowledged the valuable support that WIPO countryintheupgradingofitscopyrightlegislation, which could be expanded to include the preparationoftrainingandgeneralinformationmaterialontheprinciplesofthenew copyrightandrelatedrightslegislationthatwasgoingtobe implementedshortly. It likewise pointed to the benefits derived from the seminars and for umsorganized by its Government in concertwith WIPO, and the study on the relevance of cultural industries to the Gross Geographical Product of MERCOSUR countries. It concluded with amention of the need to increase the resources set as ide for the Cooperation for Development program, in order thattheevermorecomplex difficulties represented by intellectual property might be contended with, and acknowledged thei mportance of the Permanent Committee for the discussion of suchproblems.
- The Delegation of Jamaicathanked Mr. Castelofor his presentation and Mr. RocaCampañáandhisteamintheCooperationforDevelopmentBureauforLatinAmericaandthe CaribbeanfortheircontinuedsupportofJamaica's cooperation activities. It recalled that at thelastsessionoftheCommittee,theJamaicanIntellectualPropertyOffice(JIPO)hadjust beenestablishedonemonthprior.Sincethen,JIPOhadbenefited tremendouslyfrom WIPO'stechnicalassistancetobuilditscapacity, and to respond Jamaica's intellectual propertyneeds. The Delegation emphasized that further assistance, particularly in the area of automationandtraining, was critical as the Office c onsolidateseffortstoensurethatit deliversqualityservicetoJamaica'sintellectualpropertystakeholders.TheDelegation informedtheCommitteethatnationalseminarswererequiredtofurthersensitizeIPofficials intheareaofprotectionandpres ervationofbiological diversity, traditional knowledge and expressionsoffolkloreaswellasforSMEs. The Delegation stated that on March 12,2002, JamaicahaddepositedtheinstrumentsofaccessiontotheWCTandtheWPPT.The Delegationsaidthata nationalseminarwasneededtoimplementactiononthesetreaties, as wellasaworkshopforinventorsandoneonthebenefitsofthePCT,towhichJamaicawould

beacceding in the near future. The Delegation indicated that World Intellectual Property Day andJamaica's national intellectual property week were part of Jamaica's efforts to increase awarenessandunderstandingofintellectualpropertyrights(IPRs)andtheirimportanceto nationbuildingandsocio -economicdevelopment.Ontheseoccasions,ou were executed with tertiary institutions, the Jamaica Federation of Musicians and law enforcement of ficers. The Delegation thanked WIPO for the assistance provided in favor of the contraction of the contractioncollectivemanagementintheCaribbean.Finally,theDelegatio nexpresseditsgratitudeto WIPOforsupportingtheWIPOMinisterial -LevelMeetingonIPforCaribbeancountries. The WIPO Ministerial Meeting on IP for Caribbean Countries provided Caribbean MinisterswiththeopportunitytoreflectontheIPneedsoft hesub -region, and to devise strategies for addressingthem. Atthelastmeetingheldin Suriname, on June 3 and 4,2002, Ministers recognized the need for developing a strategy to assist Caribbean countries in promoting heIPsystembyCaribbeancountries.TheDelegation respectforIPRs, and the use of t informedtheCommitteethatattheFourthMinisterial -LevelMeeting,Ministersadopteda resolution requesting WIPO to commit the requisitere source sto assist Caribbean countrieswiththeplanningandi mplementationofpublicawarenessandenforcementcampaignsin individual countries. The Delegation expressed the hope that this and other resolutions adoptedbyMinisterswouldbeimplemented.

- 29. TheDelegationofCostaRicaendorsedthestate mentmadebytheRepresentativeof GRULAC, and pointed to the importance that its country attached to the development of intellectual property, as it was through its protection that human creativity, science and technology were stimulated and the world of literature and the artsenriched. It was especially supportive of WIPO's priorities regarding such things as the demy stification of intellectual property, the modernization of infrastructures, the digital program, the broadening of programs concerning traditional knowledge, genetic resources and folklore, electronic commerce and assistance to SMEs. It emphasized its country's desire to continue to reinforce its cooperation with WIPO intraining, the development of software and electronic commerce and the acquisition of technical documents. It thanked the Director General and the Cooperation for Development Bureaufor Latin America and the Caribbean for the cooperation and assistance received in the organization of seminars and visits to its country by experts and officials from the Secretariat.
- 30. $The Delegation of Cuba expressed its thanks to the International Bureau for the {\it Cuba} and {$ cooperationworkdoneinitscountry, mentioning especially the holding of World Intellectual PropertyDay,thecreation oftheInternationalIndustrialPropertyAulaforthetrainingof trainers and also the support for the holding of national seminars, the industrial propertymastershipprogramandcomputerizationactivities. It highlighted the importance of the Regional MeetingofHeadsofOfficesofLatinAmericanCountriesasaforumfordebateand the exchange of experience, which in addition provided the opportunity of devising strategies forfuturecooperation. It considered it necessary to increase the funds set as ideforthe trainingofhumanresourcesthroughtheWIPOWorldwideAcademy,andpromotingthemore activeparticipationofcountriesoftheregionintheWIPO NETproject.Itsuggested strengtheningandreshapingpatentinformationservicesandextendingstate -of-the-art searchesbysupplyingcopiesofscientificandtechnicalnewsarticlesonsuchsubjectsas traditionalknowledgeandnatural products. It also referred to the necessity of increasing cooperationonprogramsthathadtodowithinnovationi nSMEsandbuildingupactivities associated with the Intergovernmental Committee on Intellectual Property and GeneticResources, Traditional Knowledge and Folklore. It ended by endorsing the statement made bytheRepresentativeofGRULAC.

- The Delegation of India stated that the Government of India was committed to IP and the property of the propprotection as a tool for growth and development and informed the Committee that a modernIPRlegislativesystemhadbeenputinplace. TheDelegationpointedoutthatthenew **IPlaws** onpatents, designs, trademarks, geographical indications and layout -designsofintegrated circuits complied with the TRIPS Agreement and we reamong the most stringent in the world.This had been acknowledged by several organizations, including the eBusinessSoftware Alliance. The Delegation stated that its Government had embarked on a major modernization programfortheintellectualpropertyOffices.Ithadcommittedmorethan20 milliondollars toupgradingtheinfrastructureinpatents, designs andtrademarkofficestoenablethemto provideuser -friendlyITservices. This initiative, combined with the legislative measures taken.underscoredtheGovernment'scommitmenttoestablishaworld -classlegaland administrativeIPframework.TheDeleg ationalsostatedthatthecommitmentofthe Government of India to strengthen the IP framework had benefited greatly from the account of the property ofcooperationreceived from WIPO. This support had been critical inputting into place the new legalandadministrativeinfrastruc ture. ItinformedtheCommitteethatIndiahadrecently signedaFrameworkAgreementofCooperationwiththeInternationalBureau,thefirstofits kindinAsia, which could be come a model for similar cooperation between WIPO and other countries.Referri ngtothecollaborationwiththeWorldwideAcademy,theDelegation informedtheCommitteethattheIndiraGandhiNationalOpenUniversitywaslaunchinga distanceeducationprogramonintellectualproperty. TheDelegationextendedthefacilityof distance education on IP to other developing countries in Asia. These countries could be nefitby sharing the expert is eand knowledge that would be available as a result of the Indian and the contraction of the contractcooperationwithWIPO.ItinvitedtheInternationalBureau toconsiderdevoting tothis distancelearningprogramitsresourcesallocatedtoprogramsattheregionalandsub -regional levelsinAsia.TheDelegationappreciatedtheprogramsinstitutedthroughNFAPsand expressed the wish to see the seme chanisms further strengthened. ItconsideredWIPO's initiative on IP protection in relation to the preservation of biological diversity, traditionalknowledgeandfolkloreasagreatstepforward, as well as the initiative to harness both informationtechnologyandelectroniccommercei nrelationtoIP,asIndiahadflourishing software, multimedia, music, filmand publishing industries. It was important for developing countriestorecognizetheeconomicopportunitythatthesecopyright -basedindustries represent. The International Bureau could help developing countries to establish the in frastructure to provide protection for the IPRs of these industries to enable them to succeed.The Delegation expressed the wish to see the International Bureau develop appropriate solutionstothepr oblemsfacedindifferentareasofIP,takingintoaccounttheinterestofall stakeholders.WIPOmightalsoconsiderorganizingfurtherawarenessprogramsforcertain categories of professionals, civil servants, policy makers, enforcement officials, pate attorneys, academicians, teachers and students. The Delegation recognized the impact of the cooperation for development programs of WIPO on strengthening the IP framework in the cooperation of the cdeveloping countries and concluded by stressing that these programs had produce edsubstantial benefits. It stated that it for esaw no difficulties for the International Bureautoen hance the analysis of the property offinancial outlay for the development program, when embarking on the budget exercise early nextyear.
- 32. TheDelegationofHaitisubsc ribedtothestatementsmadebytheDelegationof BarbadosonbehalfofGRULACandbytheDelegationofBeninonbehalfoftheLDCs.It consideredtheworkachievedbytheCooperationforDevelopmentSectorremarkable,atthe sametimeadmittingthatmuch hadyettobedoneandthat,forsubstantialprogresstobe made,additionalresourcesbothfinancialandhumanwouldhavetobemadeavailabletothe relevantdepartmentsofWIPO,especiallytheBureauforLatinAmericaandtheCaribbean andtheLDCUnit .HaitihadinrecentyearsenjoyedthesupportofWIPOinanumberof

areas, among them the creation of the Haitian Copyright Office, the alignment of the country's national legislation on its international obligations and its inclusion in the WIPO project. For the future, the Delegation requested WIPO assistance in the following areas: human resource straining, notably with respect to traditional knowledge, electronic commerce and the facilities of universities; demystification of intellectual property is sues, and the collective management of copyright.

- 33. TheDelegationofColombiasaidthatitscountryattachedgreatimportanceto intellectualpropertyasaninstrumentofeconomic,socialandculturaldevelopment,which waswhytechnica lassistancewasimperativeforthemodernizationandadaptationofnational systems. Itmentioned the need to promote and encourage innovation in SMEs, especially with regard to the training and strengthening of human resources for the implementation and enforcement of intellectual property rights. It ended by thanking WIPO for the training programs and the computerization and modernization projects that had benefited its country.
- 34. TheDelegationofChinaexpresseditsappreciationforWIPO' sDevelopment CooperationProgramanditscommitmenttostrengthenintellectualpropertyinChina. The Delegationobservedthatintellectualpropertymattershadassumedcriticalimportanceina globalizedeconomy, and Chinawouldneedcontinuingcooperat ionfromWIPOtomeetthe challengeofrapidlyupgradingitsintellectualpropertysystem. Duringthepast20 years, Chinahadreviseditsintellectualpropertylegislationinordertocomplywithinternational standards. The Delegationattached muchimp ortancetothe Sino African Forum which had been held in China, as it helped to create a better awareness of intellectual property rights. It advocated the continued strengthening of the Academy. It also stressed the importance of encouraging regional and sub-regional cooperation on intellectual property issues.
- 35. TheDelegationofNicaraguareferredtothesignificantachievementsthatitscountry hadmadeintermsofthemodernizationofitsintellectualpropertythankstothesupport receivedfromWIPOandtheGovernmentofSweden.Inparticularitmentionedtheresults achievedinthecollectivemanagementofcopyright,andalsotheneedforsuchcooperation activitiestocontinueintheregion.Iturgedtheapprovaloftheregionalproje ctoncollective managementatthenextMeetingofHeadsofOfficesofLatinAmericanandCaribbean CountrieswhichwasshortlytobeheldinChile,andaskedtheSecretariatforassistancein identifyingnewprojectsthatwouldbenefittheprotectionofi tscountry'sintellectualassets.
- 36. TheDelegationofCongothankedWIPOforthebreadth,qualityandscopeofits cooperationactivities,andexpressedpleasurewithWIPO'sgrowingcommitmentonissuesof majorimportancesuchasgeneticresou rces,traditionalknowledgeandfolkloreaswellas informationtechnology.ItexpressedthewishthatthepresentsituationinCongowould neverthelessallowcooperationactivitiesinthecountrytobebuiltup,andthankedtheAfrica Bureauforthetrai ningandawarenessactivitiesthathadtakenplacerecently.Itendedby supportingtheproposalmadebytheDelegationofAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroupfor theformationofagroupofexpertsresponsibleforreflectingonthefuturedirectionof cooperationfordevelopment.
- 37. TheDelegationofKenyaexpresseditsappreciationandsupportforWIPO's DevelopmentCooperationprogramandthankedtheAfricaBureauforitscontinuedeffortsin assistingAfricancountriesinmodernizingthei rintellectualpropertysystems. TheDelegation acknowledgedthecontinuousandsubstantiveassistancereceivedfromWIPOindraftingand enactingnewlegislationonintellectualpropertyrightstoaccommodatechangesinthelocal, regionalandinternatio nalscene. Italsoconfirmed the benefits received from WIPO's support

incomputerizingandautomatingKenyanIndustrialPropertyInstitute(KIPI)andthe CopyrightOffice.TheDelegationaddedthatKIPIhadstartedtouse WIPONETfacilitiesand, recently,WIPOapprovedthelocationofstaffatKIPIwhowillworkcloselywithIPoffices intheregion.TheDelegationalsoconfirmedtheimportanceitattachedtotheprotectionof folkloreandtraditionalknowledgeandhighlysupportedWIPO'scooperationac tivitiesinthis area.ItacknowledgedandsupportedthecooperationactivitiesforSMEsandadvocatedthe continuedstrengtheningoftheAcademyand,inparticular,thatoftheprogramsof cooperationwithuniversities.Onthismatter,theDelegationin formedtheCommitteethata KenyanuniversityhadbeenrecommendedtoparticipateintheWIPOUniversityInitiative, thatwasabouttobelaunchedwithafocusonincreasingawarenessinIPRsinuniversitiesas wellasinresearchanddevelopment(R&D)inst itutions.

- 38. TheDelegationofSenegalthankedWIPOfortheactivitiesundertakeninfavorof Senegalinfieldssuchasgeneticresources,traditionalknowledgeandfolkloreand,speaking initscountry'scapacityasPresidentoftheAdministrat iveCouncilofOAPI,expressed satisfactionwiththecollaborationbetweenthetwoOrganizations.Itemphasizedthe importanceofcooperationfordevelopmentininternationalrelationsandthatofintellectual propertyasafundamentaldevelopmenttool,andurgedWIPOtopayparticularattentionto developingcountries.TheDelegationexpressedthewishthatcooperationactivitiesreston conceptualbases,thatWIPOengageinapartnershippolicywithorganizationsoftheUnited Nationssystem,notablyWH Oasanobviouspartner,asindicatedbytheDohaDeclaration, andthatthePermanentCommitteeonCooperationforDevelopmentholdannualsessions.It endedbysupportingtheproposalmadebytheDelegationofAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfrican Groupfort hecreationofapolicyreviewgrouptoguideWIPO'sfutureactivitiesinthefield ofcooperation.
- 39. TheDelegationofSudanendorsedtheinterventionoftheDelegationofAlgeriaon behalfoftheAfricanGroup.Itreferredtothemainactivi tiescarriedoutinSudanon intellectualpropertyrelatedmatters,supportedbytheGovernmentandWIPO.Oneofthe mainachievementsduringthislastperiodwastheestablishmentoftwoSectionswithinthe CommercialGeneralRegister,oneofthemdedica tedexclusivelytotheregistrationof industrialpropertyrights.Inaddition,anewintellectualpropertylibrarywasrecently established,butmorereadingmaterialwasneeded.TheDelegationinformedthatalllawson intellectualpropertymattershad beenamendedandsenttoWIPOtobecommented.It recognizedandappreciatedWIPO'sassistancetoSudan,inparticularinthefieldoftraining activities,whichhadpermittedthetrainingofmorethan100legaladvisersinthelasttwo years,andbysup plyingofficeequipment.Theseactivitieshadbeenprovidedmainlythrough theAcademyandtheArabBureauofWIPO.TheDelegationrequestedtheInternational Bureautoassistinestablishingatraininginstituteforintellectualpropertyrights.
- 40. The Delegation of Australia believed that WIPO's technical cooperation program was one of the most significant and critical elements in its overall responsibility to promote the use of intellectual property systems worldwide, for the effective prote ction of intellectual property rights and the consequent economic benefits to society. Australia would continue to support WIPO's technical cooperation activities. It commended the extent and range of cooperation for development under taken by the Internation all Bureau and noted the desirability of using the occasion of the Committee meeting stoen gage in more interaction with Member States' delegates to promote better targeting of individual needs, more strategic planning of future programs and more effective measurement of the outcomes of this work. It welcomed the new format and a genda of this session as a positive move to address these aspects of the Committee's work.

- 41. TheDelegationofMexicosaidthatcooperationfordevelopmentwasanim portant elementinthestrengtheningandefficientadministrationofnationalintellectualproperty systems. Itexpressedits support for what had been said by the Representative of GRULAC to the effect that greater human and financial resources should be set as ide for the Cooperation for Development Program. It expressed its appreciation of the work conducted by WIPO in the cooperation for development sector, and also the close collaborative relations enjoyed by its Government with the Latin America and Caribbean Bureau.
- 42. The Delegation of Qatarex pressed its thanks to the Director General and to the Arab Bureau for their continued efforts in assisting Qatarin modernizing its intellectual property system. It reiterated its interest in the continued assistance of the Arab Bureau and requested that more awareness building programs in promoting understanding of intellectual property beimplemented, such as the two regional meetings which had been held in April 2002, hosted by Qatar. The Delega tion expressed the view that the Cooperation for Development Program should embark on more activities and benefit from the allocation of more funds.
- The Delegation of Venezuela pointed to the substantial amount of work that the43. InternationaBureauhaddonesincethepreviousmeetingoftheCommittee,andsaidthatits GovernmentwaspleasedwithandgratefulfortheassistancereceivedfromWIPO.It recognized that the great number of activities carried on during the period in question had been possible thanks to the dedication and professional is most hest afforthe InternationalBureau. Iturged the Secretariatto continue with those activities, emphasizing that greater budget ary resources would be necessary for the purpose. It expressedthedesirethatWIPO. aspartofitslegislativeassistancetodevelopingcountries, mightalert them to the necessity, when they adopted newleg alprovisions. of making the most of the flexibility allowed by international agreements. It suggested that WI POshouldcontinuewithitsassistanceinthe establishmentandmaintenanceofappropriateinfrastructuresintheintellectualpropertyfield, anactivity from which its country had benefited. It recognized the importance of the studies carriedonbyWIPO ontherelationbetweenintellectualpropertyandtheconservationof biological diversity, on the protection of traditional knowledge and expressions of folklore and one lectronic commerce adding that work on them should continue. It emphasized the importance that its Government attached to the collaboration necessary between WIPO and the collaboration of theWTO, and urged stronger relations with UNCTAD. It also recognized the relevance of the workconductedbytheWorldwideAcademy.Itsaidthatmuchremainedtobedone,and acknowledgedtheneedtosupportsmallandmedium -sizedenterprisesasthedrivingforceof innovationactivities. Itaddedthat, initsopinion, WIPOcooperationactivities should incorporatetheworkprogramcontainedintheDohaMinisterialDeclarati AgreementandPublicHealth.ItpointedoutthattheDeclarationhadrecognizedissuesof particularinteresttodevelopingcountriesinasmuchastheyhadtodowiththelatitude afforded by the Agreement for the pursuit of active policies ofproductivedevelopment.It alsomentioned the need for efforts to be made in all related fields, including the corporate, industrialandresearchfields, in all of which there was a call for more cooperation. It ended itsstatementwitharequestto theSecretariatthatfuturereportsgiveanaccountof cooperationactivities conducted in each region, in such a way that the annual achievements of the Programmight bemore readily assessed.

- TheDelegationofArgentinathankedtheInterna tionalBureaufortheeffortsthatithad been carrying on in the various fields of cooperation for development, especially through the LatinAmericaandCaribbeanBureau,andendorsedthestatementmadebytheRepresentative of GRULAC, especially with regard to the need to height enawareness of the importance of intellectualproperty. Its tressed the usefulness of the WIPO training courses addressed not onlytotheownersofrightsbutalsotousers, magistrates, agents of these curity forces and customs personnel. Iturged the continuation of those activities, and thanked WIPO for the supportthatithadgiventotheUniversityofBuenosAiresintheholdingofpostgraduate coursesoncopyrightandrelatedrights, at the same time asking for that support tocontinuein thefuture. It highlighted the need for cooperation to be tail or ed to the particular characteristicsofeachcountryandregionandtoitsneedsandlevelofdevelopment.It particularlyappreciated the activities of the International Bur eauconcerningsmalland medium-sizedenterprises, asubjectarea in which it asked for its country to be more actively considered for the various programs, and those concerning technology transfer, which it regardedasamajorcontributiontodeveloping countries.
- TheDelegationofElSalvadorsaidthatitsubscribedtothestatementmadebythe Representative of GRULAC, especially with regard to the need to channel more resources towardsWIPOcooperationactivities.Itrecognizedtheimpo rtanceoftheProgram.which hadhelpedstrengthenitscountry's intellectual property potential, and emphasized the recognition that had been given at the previous Meeting of Heads of Industrial PropertyOfficesofCentralAmericanCountriestothevariou scooperationactivitiesconductedbythe International Bureauforthebenefit of countries of the region. The Delegation reported on specificactivitiescarriedoninitscountryundertheauspicesofWIPO, and thanked the InternationalBureaufortheas sistancethathadbeengiventoElSalvador,especiallyinthe modernization and strengthening of its national legal framework, in the development and strengtheningofcomputerizedpatentandtrademarksystemsandinthetrainingofcollective copyrightan drelatedrightsmanagementsocieties, to name only those. It ended by pointing totheimportancethatitscountryattachedtotheCommitteeasaforumfordecisionsonand theplanningandchannelingofcooperationactivitiesforthebenefitofdevelopin gcountries.
- 46. TheDelegationofAlgeriadeclareditselfpleasedwiththeactivitiescarriedonbyWIPO inthefieldofcooperation, and in particular with the assistance received in the adaptation of Algeria's intellectual property system, bot hinlegal terms and with respect to the enforcement of rights. It said that its country's cooperation needs formed part of the WTO accession negotiations currently going on, and it made aspecial mention of the assistance received from WIPO to bring its intellectual property legislation into line with the TRIPS Agreement. The Delegation also announced Algeria's intention to ratify the WCT and WPPT, and spoke of the need to focus cooperation programs on the fight against piracy and counterfeiting. Its ai dthat Algeria would be willing to signacooperation agreement with WIPO.
- 47. TheDelegationoftheUnitedStatesofAmericacommendedWIPOforitsongoing effortstoprovidetrainingandtechnicalassistanceintheareaofintellectualproper ty.It welcomedWIPO'sfocusonenforcementofintellectualpropertyrights, asevidencedbythe workoftheInternationalBureauinconjunctionwiththeAdvisoryCommitteeon Enforcement.TheDelegationsaidthatoneofthecorefunctionsofWIPOwasto encourage trainingactivities.Overthepastyear, officialsfromtheUnitedStatesofAmericahadalso participatedinthetrainingofofficialsfrommorethan75 countriesthrough120 seminars, workshopsandtrainingprograms, whichhadtakenplacebot hinhostcountriesandinthe UnitedStatesofAmerica, someinconjunctionwiththeInternationalBureau.

- 48. TheDelegationofNigeriaendorsedthestatementoftheDelegationofAlgeriaon behalfoftheAfricanGroup.Itexpresseditsgratit udetoWIPOandthankedtheDeputy DirectorGeneralandtheDirectoroftheAfricaBureaufortheirpersonalcommitmentto strengtheningintellectualpropertysystemsintheAfricanregion.TheDelegationalso mentionedthesupportitreceivedfromWIPOe speciallywithregardtotrainingthestaffof theNigerianCopyrightCommission,whichhadledtobuildinggreatercapacityinthe Organization.Itemphasizedtheneedtostrengthenthecapacityofcollectiveadministration andtoreintroducetheHologra mSchemetofightpiracy.TheDelegationalsoobservedthat NigeriaattachedspecialimportancetothelinkageoftheIntellectualPropertyOfficestothe WIPONET.
- 49. The Delegation of Lesothocommended WIPO for its ongoing efforts and initiati ves in the area of development cooperation. It pointed out that it faced in frastructure constraints regarding its intellectual property system and would like to appeal for WIPO's support on this is sue, in addition to assistance in the field of WIPO NET, the TRIPS Agreement, collective management, and other global intellectual property is sues, such as ecommerce, traditional knowledge, genetic resources, etc.
- 50. TheDelegationofMalawiendorsedthestatementmadebytheDelegationofAlgeriaon behalfoftheAfricanGroup.ItalsothankedWIPOforthesupportandassistancegivento MalawiandtotheCopyrightSocietyofMalawi(COSOMA)whichhadreceived,duringits tenyearsofexistence,fullcooperationindifferentforms.Itexpressedthew ishthatthis assistancecouldcontinueasCOSOMAintendedtoimproveitsservicestocreatorsinthe countryandtoincreasecooperationwithothercollectivemanagementorganizations.The DelegationcalleduponWIPOtoincludeinitsannualprogramare gionalintensivetraining courseoncopyrightandcollectivemanagementcurrentlyorganizedbyCOSOMAonan ad hocbasis,andtostrengthenitsassistancetocollectivemanagementorganizationsin Africa.TheDelegationwarmlywelcomedtheextensionofAR IPO'smandatetoinclude copyrightandrelatedrightsandappealedforWIPO'sassistanceinthatrespect.
- 51. TheDelegationofPeruthankedWIPOforthesupportthatitscountryhadreceivedfor the strengthening of its intellectual property. I tmentionedthatitsGovernmentwasworking atvariouslevelsonthedevelopment, exploitation and enforcement of intellectual property rights. Atonelevelitwas developing at eaching program for primary school staff which wouldenabletheminturntoi mparttheknowledgeandobservanceofintellectualproperty rightstotheirpupils. It was also at a very early stage of organizing workshops with SMEs which highlighted the advantages of using and respecting intellectual property rights, and in that connection the country was very interested in WIPO cooperation to bring such events to thenoticeofSMEs. Another level, which required greater emphasis, was that of support for inventorsandresearchers; the Delegationsaid that the National Inventors' Con organizedeveryyearinPeru,whichreliedonWIPO'spatronageforthepurpose.It mentionedthatanationalseminaronIndustrialPropertyandTechnologicalInformation would also be held that year for the benefit of a cademic and institutional r esearcherswhich wouldlikewiseberelyingonWIPOandEPOassistance.Finallytherewasthelevelof policing:itscountryhadchannelleditseffortsintothefightagainstpiracyandcounterfeiting, bothserious problems in Peru. It added that seminar shadbeenheldonthesubjectforpolice forces and also magistrates and prosecutors. The Delegation welcomed the initiative taken by WIPO, the SPTO and the EPO in organizing a seminar formagistrates and prosecutors which wasduetobeheldshortly, and emphasizedtheneedforduecontinuitytobeimpartedtosuch events.ItconsidereditimportanttohaveWIPOsupportfortheholdingofseminarson enforcementandbordermeasures. Itended by giving its support to the statement made by the

Representative of GRULAC which emphasized the need to allocate more human and financial resources for cooperation activities.

- The Delegation of Trinidad and Tobago commended WIPO on the innovative format adopted for the meeting of the Committee with theintroductionofthefocusedafternoon sessions. Italsocommended the Bureau for its ongoing activities and initiatives in the area of technical cooperation, and expressed its deep appreciation for the activities implemented in TrinidadandTobago.Its tressedtheneedtoreinforceandintensifynotonlyNorth/South cooperationbutalsoSouth/Southcooperationinthefieldofintellectualproperty.The Delegation endors ed the statement made by the Delegation of Barbados on behalf of the account of the property of the properGroupofLatinA mericanandCaribbeancountries.ItvoiceditssupportfortheDelegations thathadspokeninfavorofanintensificationofWIPOtechnicalassistancetodeveloping countries with a view to enhancing collective management activities, automation of intelletual property offices, and demy stification of intellectual property. Since intellectual -cuttingissue,itcalledforwideningofWIPO'scooperation propertyhadbecomesuchacross nettobringinotheragencies and ministries, the private sector and aca demia.Itstressedthe criticalimportanceoftheNFAPswhichallowedindividualcountriestofocusontheirspecific needsandtoidentifytheareasinwhichsocietycouldreapsocio -economicbenefitsfromthe intellectualpropertysystem. The Delegatio nexpresseddeepappreciationforWIPO's assistance in collective management and urged WIPO to continue to assist in the developmentand expansion of the Caribbean Copyright Link (CCL) and to helpest ablish collectingonwheretherewasnoneyet.ItacknowledgedWIPO's societiesinallcountriesoftheregi assistanceindevelopingatrademarkdatabaseforCaribbeanCountries, successfully implemented in Trinida dand Tobago and Barbados, and encourage dits extension to other and the properties of the propeCaribbeanislands. The Delegati on also looked forward to rapid implementation of the automationprojectindevelopingapatentdatabaseforitscountry, and by extension, for the Caribbean. The regional meeting of patent experts needed to deal with this matter should be convenedsoon. Inthis regard, the Delegation recalled the offermade by the Government of TrinidadandTobagotohosttheregionalmeeting.TheDelegation,inaddition,requested hosting a Regional Trade mark Training Course for the Caribbean once every two years.
- 53. TheDelegationofChilethankedWIPOforthesignificantsupportthatithadreceived fortheconductofvariousintellectualpropertyactivities.Itfullyendorsedthestatement madebytheRepresentativeofGRULAC,andagreedwithotherdeleg ationsthatWIPO's agendashouldgivedueconsiderationtotheDohaMinisterialDeclarationontheTRIPS AgreementandPublicHealth.ItsupportedtheproposalbytheDelegationofIndiaforthe extensionofWIPOcooperationactivitiestootherareassuch asuniversities,researchcenters andpoliticalcircles,andinsistedthatproblemsdetectedbyindustrialpropertyofficesshould besettledinasystematicway.
- 54. TheDelegationofMozambiqueendorsedthestatementoftheDelegationofAlger iaon behalfoftheAfricanGroup.ItexpresseditsgratitudetoWIPOandcongratulatedthe InternationalBureauontheintensityoftheactivitiesconductedsincethesetting -upofthe Committee.Inviewoftheadoptionofnewlaws,theDelegationreque stedmorespecialized trainingespeciallyforjudges,policeofficersandcustomsauthorities.Itinformedofthis considerableinterestofpublicandprivateinstitutionsinMozambiqueforissuesof intellectualproperty,thelackofqualifiedteachersf orimplementingtrainingprogramsand thelackofappropriateteachingprograms.Consequently,itrequestedthattheAcademy shoulddeveloptrainingprogramsinPortuguese.

- 55. TheDelegationofNepalreferredtoongoingWIPOassistancetoNepal ,essentiallyin thefieldofcopyrightlawandinstitutions.WhileanewCopyrightActwasalreadyinplace, Nepalneededfurtherassistanceinstafftrainingandestablishmentofcollectivemanagement, aswellasthroughWIPO NETparticipationandintell ectualpropertyofficeautomation.Nepal waspreparingitsaccessiontotheWCTandtheWPPT.
- 56. TheDelegationofBoliviareportedontheeffortsthatitscountrywasmakingto modernizeitsintellectualpropertylegislationsothatitconform edtointernational undertakings.ItpointedtotheimportanceoftheWIPOCooperationforDevelopment Program,andsuggestedthatactivitiesconnectedwithtraditionalknowledge,thetrainingof humanresourcesandassistanceshouldbeexpanded.Itagre edthattherewasaneedto increasetheresourcessetasideforthevariouscooperationactivitiesthatcouldbeidentified, andpointedtothebenefitsoffinancingtheparticipationofcapital -basedexpertsinWIPO meetings.
- 57. The Delegation of Ecuador repeated its Government's appreciation of the cooperation workdone by WIPO and emphasized its importance to the intellectual property development of countries. With that in mindit who le he artedly endorsed the statement made by the Representative of GRULAC.
- 58. The Representative of the African Union supported the statement made by the Delegation of Algeria on behalf of the African Group, and, in particular, the proposal for establishingamulti -disciplinarygroupofexperts. Thep rimarytaskofthisCommitteeand theworkinggrouptobeestablishedshouldbetocreateaframeworkwhereintellectual propertywouldbedirectlyandfullyrelevantandappliedtoimprovingthewelfareofall people. The framework should clearly and str onglydirectthedevelopmentofintellectual property, towards immediately improving human welfare. Humaning enuity would then have thepractical role of devising the means for best developing intellectual property in that context. That protection of int ellectualpropertyrightsshouldnotprimarilybedesignedto maximize profits for the holders of intellectual property rights, and only in this manner indirectlybenefitsociety. Itshouldratherbetheotherwayround: Protection of intellectual propertyrightsshouldprimarilyanddirectlybeaimedatimprovingthehumanconditionand promotinghumanwelfare. Therefore, the framework for protection and promotion of innovationmustunequivocallybedesignedtoputhumanwelfarefirstandforemost.It shouldnotbeforgottenthathumaningenuitywasnotcreatedbytheenactmentoflawson IPRs. Humaning enuity had an autonomy that far surpassed any such laws, and would always beappliedtofindingsolutionstoourproblems. IPR regimes should recognize thiswitha freshperspectivetakingintoaccountthechallengesthatfaceparticularlydeveloping countries. The African Unionurged WIPO to continue its good work, in proactively being engagedwithARIPOandOAPI.Cooperationbetweentheseorganizatio nswasoneofseveral waysinwhichdevelopingcountryconcernscouldbeaddressed.
- 59. TheRepresentativeofARIPOthankedWIPO,inparticulartheDirectorGeneralandthe AfricaBureau,fortheactivitiesundertakenwithARIPOanditsMemberSt ateswhichhad strengthenedtheircapacitytoutilizetheintellectualpropertysystemfortheireconomic, socialandculturaldevelopment.Hestressedtheimportanceofinformationtechnologiesand oftheWIPO NETprojectandexpressedhissatisfactionwi thregardtotheassistancereceived byARIPOandthreeofitsMemberStatesinthisfield.Heexpressedthewishthatafull implementationoftheprojectinallMemberStatesofARIPOtakeplace.Therepresentative alsostressedtheimportanceofNFAPs andRFAPsasameansfordevelopingcountriesto modernizetheirintellectualpropertysystemsintegratingnewglobalchallengessuchasthe

protectionoftraditionalknowledge,geneticresources,andfolkloreandthepreservationof biodiversity. Hepra isedthe WIPO/WTOJointInitiative for LDCs and the establishment of a special unit to assist these countries. He concluded his statement by expressing the wish that the existing cooperation befurther strengthened, particularly inview of the implement at ion of ARIPO's new mandate in the field of copyright and related rights.

- 60. TheRepresentativeofOAPIthankedWIPO,andespeciallytheAfricaBureau,forthe diversityandeffectivenessoftheactivitiesconductedbythem. TheRepresentativee ndorsed thestatementsmadebytheDelegationofAlgeriaonbehalfoftheAfricanGroup,andwas pleasedwiththeeffectivecooperationthathadestablisheditselfbetweenWIPOandOAPI, whileatthesametimewishingthatitmightbeincreasedinthearea softraining,the disseminationoftechnicalandscientificinformationandabovealltheexploitationof inventions. Itsaidthat, followingaMinisterialConferencethathadbeenheldinLibreville, OAPIexpectedtobecomeinvolvedintheprotectionan dexploitationoftraditionalmedicines, whichentailedharmonizationofthemarketingapprovalproceduresforsuchmedicines. Asit regardedtheexploitationoftraditionalmedicinestobeconsistentwiththelogicoftheDoha Declaration, itexpressedt hedesiretoreceiveWIPOsupportinthatconnection.
- 61. TheRepresentativeoftheLeagueofArabStatesexpressedhisgratitudetoWIPOand thankedtheDeputyDirectorGeneralandtheDirectoroftheArabBureaufortheirpersonal commitmentto strengtheningintellectualpropertysystemsintheArabregion. Healso acknowledgedthesupportreceivedfromWIPOunderthememorandumofunderstanding betweentheLeagueofArabStatesandWIPO. Tocomplementitsefforts, theLeagueofArabStateswo uldseekWIPO'scooperationincertainspecificareas, including: human resourcesdevelopmentthroughtheestablishmentofnationaltraininganddevelopmentofa legislativeframeworkconcerningtraditionalknowledgeandfolklore.
- The Representative of ICSID informed the Committee that ICSID represents industrial designers in the broadest sense, who are increasingly SMEs from developing countries. It emphasized that as the economies of these countries developed and grew, so did in digenous designcapability, and IPR sgained also in importance commercially, so cially and culturally. TheRepresentativecongratulated the International Bureau for the impressive number of meetingsheldandcontactsmadewhichmusthavestimulatedcallsforever -increasing financialassistance. Its uggested that with limited resources, definition of priorities and focus wasessential.ReferringtothereportoftheBritishCommissiononIntellectualProperty Rightswhichcontainedmanyoftheargumentsusedagainstth esystem,theRepresentative suggestedtoproducefiguresabouttheactualbenefitstodevelopingcountries, todemystify and simplify theis sue for the public, including creators, and to encourage the use of patent problemsastheyarise,inordertoavoidwasteoftalent andotherregistereddatabasestosolve andinspiration.
- 63. InrespondingtospecificissuesraisedbysomeDelegationstheSecretariatinformedthe CommitteethatthecourseoftheWorldwideAcademyinSpanishhadnotbeencan celled,but onlydeferred.ThenextcoursecouldbeexpectedtotakeplaceasearlyasFebruary2003. TheDohaMinisterialConferenceDeclarationontheTRIPSAgreementandPublicHealth hadconfirmedtheflexibility,whichtheTRIPSAgreementprovidedf orIPlegislationof developingcountries.ThatflexibilityhadalreadybeenbuiltinWIPO'slegislativeadvice activitieslongbeforetheDohaConference.Furthermore,theDeclarationallowedLDCsto deferimplementationofcertainprovisionsoftheTRI PSAgreementuntil2016.WIPO's legislativeadvicepracticehadbeenupdatedaccordingly,tomakethesenewoptionsapparent forLDCs.WIPO'sInternetsitemadethecorrespondinglegislativeadvicetoolsaccessible foreverybody.TheSecretariatnotedt hattheDohaDeclarationrecognizedthatWTO

Memberswithinsufficientornomanufacturing capacities in the pharmaceutical sector could face difficulties in making effective use of compulsory licensing under the TRIPS Agreement. Therefore, the Declaration had requested the competent or gans of WTO to find a solution. The legislative advice practice of WIPO could not anticipate the decision sto be taken within the WTO. Regarding the suggestion to closer cooperation with WHO, the Secretariat stated that in various regional meetings or ganized by WIPO on Doha - related subjects, WHO had participated and would be further invited.

64. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocument PCIPD/3/3. It also noted the proposal by the African Group, for the creation of a group of experts on intellectual property and development, and also the fact that the matter would be considered in consultations among regional groups.

- 65. DiscussionwasonthebasisofdocumentPCIPD/3/6. The Secretaria tout lined the progress made by the Academysin ceits creation and made particular reference to the growth inactivities from Jan uary 2001 to June 2002. The keypoints made in the presentation were: the growth in the number of participants in the programs of the Academy, numbering over 7,544 in that period; the range of activities designed to meet the needs of abroad target audience and the increasing number of strategic partnerships between the Academy and key in stitutions designed to enhance the effectiveness and broaden the reach of the Academy.
- The Delegation of Venezuela, while commending the Academy for its w 66. ork.notedthat moreinformationwasrequiredwithregardtotheproposedcoursestobeofferedviadistance learning on Traditional Knowledge, Folklore and Genetic Resources. The Delegations aid the control of the contherehadbeenadropinthenumberofparticipantsforthe distancelearningcourseinSpanish inthereporting period as compared to the previous one. It added that the distance learning programwasthemostsuccessful, and expressed the wish that other areas and programs might meway. The Delegation suggested that the Academy continuetobepromotedinthesa shouldshareitsexperienceofdistancelearningprograms withother countries, and thanked it for the informational ready shared with Venezuela. It expressed the wish that the advanced of the control ofcoursesindistan celearningwouldbelaunchedsoon. It inquired about the number of participantsindistancelearningfromVenezuelaaswellasofthosewhohadbenefitedfrom thefellowshipprogram, adding that such information should be received more regularly by Geneva Missions. Its upported the launch, and urged the implementation assoon as possible, ofamastercourseinintellectualpropertyviadistancelearningaswellasofcourseson intellectualpropertyandtechnologytransfer,intellectualpropertyandpubl icpolicy(health andeducation). The Delegationals ostressed the need for greater collaboration between the Academyandotherinstitutionsaswellastheimportanceofconductingtrainingprograms withintheregionsratherthaninGeneva. Finally, ite xpressedthehopethattheAcademy wouldholdcloseconsultationswiththemissionsinGenevaonaregularbasisandprovide informationregardingitsactivities.
- 67. TheDelegationofSwedensupportedprogramsdirectedatjudges,andtheimporta nce of using casestudies for this purpose. It also attributed importance to the support given to the International Association for the Advancement of Teaching and Research in Intellectual Property (ATRIP) as well as to a propose dnew course onlicensing and technology transfer which augured well with regard to contract ual practices of Traditional Knowledge. The

Delegationsupported the proposed course on copyright for Librarians, and it expressed the view that joint collaboration rather than competing with the the rinstitutions was the way forward for the Academy.

- 68. TheDelegationofMaltasupportedtheintroductionofamasterprogramviadistance learning, which in its view was particularly important for small countries, especially considering that, due to the size of the student population, there was not sufficient demand for universities to introduce as eparate master program on intellectual property. It also wondered why a certificate was offered at the conclusion of each module of the UNIS Acourse rather than a diploma at the end.
- The Delegation of Egypt commended the Academy for its achievements in the field of the Academy for its achievement of tcapacitybuildingandtrainingofhumanresources. This success was reflected in the significantincreaseinthenu mberofbeneficiariesofitsprograms. The Delegation supported thelaunchingofanewdistancelearningcourseinthefieldoftraditionalknowledgeand transferoftechnology. Ithopedthatthe Arabiclanguageversion of the distance learning coursewo uldbelaunchedsoonasthiswouldcertainlywidenthescopeofbeneficiariesofthe Academy's activities specially in Egyptandother Arabcountries. The Delegation pointed to theneedthatthecoursesoftheAcademyreflectthepluralityofviewsregard ingintellectual propertymatters, specially atatime when intellectual property protection had an impact on otherfieldssuchastheprotectionofpublichealthandtheenvironment. The Delegation was reservedregardingtheintroductionofafeestructu reintheAcademy'sactivitiesasWIPO hadaninternational public service vocation, which should be preserved. Seeking external fundingbytheAcademyshouldbewithinthelimitssetbytheUNsystemandthenecessity ntegrity. The Delegation highlighted the need for ofpreservingitsindependenceandi increased attention to teaching and research in IP matters in the activities of the Academy.However, this should not affect the existing cooperation between the Academyanda cademic institutions. The Del egation called for an effective increase in the resources allocated to the AcademyintheProgramandBudgetforthenextbiennium.
- 70. TheDelegationofChinastressedthefactthattheAcademyshouldincludemore participantsfromintellectual propertyofficesandstafffromenterprisesinitstraining programs. Itemphasizedtheneedtohaveacomprehensivecurriculumaswellasteaching materialsatbasicandadvancedlevels. TheprogramoftheAcademyshouldincludethosefor highlevelof ficialssuchasjudgesandgovernmentofficials, middlelevelstaffsuchas managersofIPoffices, librarians, and elementary courses suchast he summer courses for governmentofficials, students, etc.
- 71. TheDelegationofMexicohighlightedth eimportanceofeducationforthe demystificationofintellectualpropertyandsaidthattheAcademycouldplayafundamental partinthattask.Itstressedtheneedtobuilduptheprogramoftrainingoftrainers,adding thattheproposalsconcerningfee sandaccreditationasaformaleducationalinstitutionshould belookedatcarefully;itcouldnotpronounceonthemforthemomentasitwasthefirsttime thattheyhadbeenputforward.Itendedbymentioningtheadvisabilityofholdinganannual meetingtodiscussmatterssuchastheproposalssubmittedbytheSecretariat.
- 72. TheDelegationoftheRepublicofKoreaproposedthatinordertoreachouttoawider audience,theAcademyshouldcreatedistancelearningcourseswhichcouldbeo ffered withouttutorassistance.ItalsoproposedthattheSummerSchoolbemadeavailabletoself sponsoredstudentssothatmorepersonscouldderivebenefitsfromthatprogram.Inaddition, theDelegationfurtherproposedtointroduceatuitionfeesy stemonconditionthatWIPO

would return the fee if the participant successfully complete the course. It would serve as a good stimulus and motivation to them.

- 73. The Delegation of Zambia commended the policy development program of the Academy, which had been particularly useful in Africa. It asserted that the Academy should be provided more funds as it had demonstrated its success.
- 74. The Delegation of Sudan commended the Academyand the detailed report and expressed satisfaction with the cooperation between the Academyand Sudan. It considered that it would be useful for the Academyto provide more detail in terms of the qualifications obtained by its students.
- 75. The Delegation of Canadain quired whether the Academyh ad conducted an impact assessment following each program and expressed satisfaction at the increase in the level of participants now selected for the program jointly organized with the Canadian Intellectual Property Office.
- 76. The Delegation of the Russian Federation expressed its satisfaction for the conclusion of the Framework Agreement of Cooperation between WIPO and ROSPATENT. The Agreement had already been bearing fruit with the recent holding of an Academyses sion on the teaching of intellectual property in Moscow. It also expressed its appreciation for the offering of the DL101 course in Russian.
- 77. TheDelegationofIndiaexpresseditssatisfactionattherecentsigningofthe FrameworkAgreementbetweenWIPOandtheMinistr yofHumanResourceDevelopment, GovernmentofIndia.ThroughthisAgreement,ajointdiplomacoursehadbeenenvisagedto beofferedwiththeIndiraGandhiNationalOpenUniversity,whichofferedgreatpotentialfor theparticipantsbothinIndiaandoth ercountriesofthesub -region.Itexpressedsatisfaction aboutthefactthatsome30% oftheparticipantsintheDLcourseinEnglishwerefromIndia.
- 78. The Delegation of Ethiopiahighly valued the various training programs of the Academy in which nationals of Ethiopiahad participated and requested more information to be provided regarding the Summer School application procedures and the Long -term Fellowship Program.
- 79. The Delegation of Thailand suggested that the courses offere dby the Academyshould meet local university requirements and courses should focus on subjects like traditional knowledge and e-commerce. As regards the feest ructure the Delegation added that participants from developing countries, countries with econo mies intransition, as well as the LDCs, should be exempted from any fees that WIPO might establish.
- 80. TheDelegationofUruguaysuggestedmaintainingaproperbalancebetweenthe numberofcoursesofferedbytheAcademyinindustrialproperty andcopyrightbyincreasing therangeofavailableoptionsforparticipationinthelatterbranchofintellectualproperty.It highlightedtheneedformoreinformationtobesuppliedtoMemberStatesontheprograms offeredbytheAcademy.Itconsidered thatanincreaseinfellowshipswasanessentialmeans of supportingresearchandthetrainingofprofessionalsandtrainers.Itendedbyemphasizing theimportanceofthedistancelearningprogramandrecommendingthatitcontinueingreater depth.

- 81. The Delegation of Moroccoinquired about the background of person sparticipating in the Distance Learning Program of the Academyand requested for a break down of the participant sperregion. It mentioned the proposal made under the previous a gendaitem concerning the trainer training system, and asked the Academy what roleit could play in the design and implementation of that system with the support of WIPO.
- 82. TheDelegationofColombiaexpressedsatisfactionattheprogressrepo rtprovidedby theAcademyandemphasizedthattrainingwasoneofthemaininstrumentsforlending greaterstrengthtointellectualproperty.Itsharedtheviewthattrainingshouldfocuson strengtheningthehumanresourcesofnationalpatentoffices,a ddingthatoneshouldnot disregardtheimportance,fortheirleveragingeffect,ofthecooperationagreementsthatcould besignedwithuniversitiesandotherinstitutionsintheacademicsector;itaskedformore informationonthetermsofsuchbilater alcooperation.Itendedbywholeheartedlysupporting thefree -of-chargecharacterofthecooperationaffordedbyWIPO.
- 83. The Delegation of Nigerian oted the importance of Academysessions as functional tools for the creation of networks especially among professors of intellectual property in Africa. In this connection, it recalled the Academysession held in Abujain 1999 and expressed the need to plan a similar program in Nigeria.
- 84. The Delegation of Cubaex pressed its appreciat ion for the courses offered by the Academyandes pecially the Distance Learning Program. It expressed concernation decrease in the number of participants in the Academy programs and sought a highlevel of funding for the same. It suggested an increase in the number of participants in the face to face training programs, as the seprograms cannot be replaced by distance learning. It suggested further that the rewas an eed to maintain close collaborative ties between the Academyand WIPO's regional cooperation bureaux, which would make for a better selection of national candidates for International Bureau fellowships. It recommended that any substantive change that one might wish to make to the work of the Academyshould be promptly submitted to all Member States for consultation. It ended by recommending that the representatives of developing countries should not pay fees for their participation in Academy courses.
- 85. The Delegation of Kenya expressed its appreciation for the programs conducte dby the Academy and made aspecific reference to the recently concluded program for university professors held in Eldoret. It also looked forward to concluding a partner ship agreement with the Academy.
- 86. The Delegation of Perucommended the WIPOWorldwide Academy for the work done in the course of its four and a halfyears of existence. It was grateful for the opportunity that its country had had of benefiting from the Academy's programs; they had made it possible to strengthen in tellectual property in Peruthrough the training of human resources. It mentioned its interest in the conduct of programs at the regional level, and its willingness, with that in mind, to take part in the organization of Spanish language programs for Latin America. It added that, while WIPO's Copyright Collective Management Division had held seminars and meeting son the subject in Latin America, more emphasis needed to be placed, in its opinion, on the conduct of training courses for collective management societies, which had an important part to play in the protection of authors' and composers' rights, and supported the holding of a training program for trainers, as proposed by the Delegation of Algeria.
- 87. The Representative of OAPI referred to the Agreement concluded with the Academyin 1999 and expressed its satisfaction at outtheway it had been implemented. He supported the

activities relating to the training of judges and expressed the wish to initiate more activities in cooperation with the A cademy.

- 88. TheRepresentativeofARIPOstatedthatARIPOhadaFrameworkAgreementof CooperationwiththeAcademyandaddedthat,withintheframeworkofthatagreement,ithad beeninvolvedwiththedistancelearningcourseoftheAcademyfrom itsinception.He expressedhisappreciationforthecooperationhisorganizationhadreceivedfromthe Academyandlookedforwardtocontinuingcooperation,especiallyinviewoftheproposed establishmentoftheregionaltrainingcenterfollowingitse stablishment.
- Inresponsetosomeoftheissuesraised, the Secretaria treiterated that advanced courses indistancelearningaswellastheotherlanguageversionsoftheDL 101wouldbelaunched itieswereincorporatingtheDL soon.Itobservedthatanumberofunivers 101intotheir curriculum and awarding the appropriate credit to the students who took the course. With regardtothedropintheSpanishparticipationintheDL 101, it noted that the course was offeredfreeofchargeand therewerenorestrictionsonthenumberofparticipants.It $therefore encouraged delegations to assist the Acade myind is seminating information on the {\it the acade myinds} and {\it$ courseintheirrespectiveregions. It confirmed that the UNISA program would offer a diplomafollowin gconclusionoftherequiredmodules. - 92. The Delegation expresseditsgreatsatisfactionwiththedevelopment oftheCaribbeanCopyrightLink(CCL) project. Its aid that it was important to deal not only with traditional collective management ofmusicbuttoalsoconsiderotherfieldssuchasliteraryandworksofarts,performingartists aswellasfutureregime sinthefieldoftraditionalknowledgeandfolklore. The Delegation was of the view that close cooperation with the private sector, like the Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (CISAC), was significant; therefore it hoped that WIPO wouldcooperate with non -governmental organizations. It added that there was a need to ensurecompatibility within ternational technical standards, such as workidentification. Collectivemanagementsystemswouldneedtotakeintoaccounttheinterestsofall interested stakeholdersandtoavoidconflictswithpresentandfuturecompetitionlaw.
- 93. The Delegation of Togo emphasized the importance of the assistance that its country had received from WIPO, that had contributed to the establishment of the Togolese Copyright Office (BUTODRA), which for four years had been taking care of the proper distribution of authors' royal ties. It was thanks to that assistance that collective manager ment had been

computerized. Itreferred to the computer hardware that had been installed and to the logistical support provided by a technician to ensure the proper functioning of the computerized collective management system. The Delegation noted the effectiveness of the system installed, which for the last four years had allowed copyright royal ties to be distributed without recourse to an outside company, as was the case for other countries. It high lighted the relevance of the assistance of WIPO to the least developed countries in general, and Togo in particular, as a means of settling the collective management of copyright on a sound basis. It thanked the International Bureau for having produced the documents supplied to delegations.

- The Delegation of Cuba thanked the Secretari at for the documentationpresentedon activities under taken in the field of collective management, and expressed its appreciation of theworkdonebyWIPO'sCollectiveManagementDivisionandtheLatinAmericaBureau.It saidthatitscountryhadbeenabeneficiaryinthatimportantarea, having organized, to gether with WIPO, two nationals eminars and one regional seminar on the visual arts, which was to takeplacefromNovember19to22.Itmaintainedthatacopyrightsystematthenational levelcouldnotdeveloptoitsfullest extentwithoutstrictmanagementofrights, and it was for thatreasonthecountryhadbeenworkingactivelyonthataspect. Itthereforeattached the utmostimportancetothecreationoftheDivisionandalsotothelinesofcooperationthat werebeing developedinconnectionwithcollectivemanagement. The Delegations aid that thereweretwomanagementbodiesinCubaatpresent,oneformusicanddrama,whichinthe nearfuturewouldincludeaudiovisualworks, and theother, recently created, for thev isual arts.
- 95. TheDelegationofJamaicaconcurredwiththeideathatcollectivemanagementwasat thecentrestageforcommercialdevelopmentoftheculturalindustriesindevelopingcountries intermsofenhancedexportperformanceandopportu nitiesforemployment.Itnotedthat supportfortheregionalsystemhadstrengthened. The Delegation expressed gratitude to WIPO and the General Society of Authors in Spain (SGAE) for the technical assistancegrantedtotheCaribbeanCopyrightLinktoe nsureitseffectivefunctioning. Itsaidthatthe CaribbeanCopyrightLink(CCL)hadbeenacceptedasanassociatememberofthe $International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (CISAC). It expressed the need for WIPOtotakethenecessarystepstointegrateJAMCOPY,theJamaicanSocietythathadbeen setuptomanagereprographicrights, and JAPAS that managed the rights of performers, as well as JAMRAS, which represented record producers, into the regional system and CCL. It well as JAMRAS are the regional system and CCL are the regional system and the region of thewelcomed the initiative salready undertaken by WIPO in that regard with JAPAS. The Delegationfeltthatthesystemshouldbeextendedtoothercategoriesofrightsin cluding reprographicandphotographicworks. Additionally, it considered that greater training was requiredforstaffusingthecollectivemanagementsoftware(SGS).
- 96. TheDelegationofNigeriastressedthatcollectivemanagementwascritical to the effective protection of copyright and related rights. Its uggested WIPO to undertake a fact finding mission in conjunction with CISAC to stream line the operations of existing collective management organizations in its country. It said that an organization to manage reprographic rights had recently been established in Nigeria. It added that the establishment of a society for the rights of the film industry was also under consideration.

- TheDelegationofNicaraguacongratulatedtheSec retariatonthedocumentsubmitted onsuchanimportantsubject, which drew on the main activities conducted in connection with collectivemanagement.ItsaidthatitscountryhaditsLaw312fullyinforceonthe protectionofcopyrightandrelatedright s, which made proper provision for the composition of collective managements ocieties. The present situation was that the main national authors andperformershadcreated the first collective managements ociety, called OCARINA, for musicrights, butitwa sopentoallothergenres. It pointed out that the creation of managementsocieties was for its Governmentarich source of job creation. The Delegation askedtheSecretariattosetinmotiontheregionalprojectforCentralAmericaconcerning managementsocieties, and asked for it to be approved at the next Meeting of Heads of Offices of Latin American and Caribbean Countries, which would shortly betaking place in Chile.ItencouragedtheSecretariattoarrangeforitsimplementationtostartassoo nas possible. The Delegationals ospoke of the progress made towards its country's accession to theWCT,WPPTandPCT.
- The Delegation of Uruguay commended the Collective Management Division for its activities, and thanked it for its efforts . It said that Uruguay was avalid testimony to theconcernsoftheDivisionanditsefficiencyanddedicationinhandlingthesubjectofcollective management, because, as was clearly apparent in the document, Uruguay had contributed with theorganizatio nof, and had been host to, a number of meetings at which the problems and concernsofcollectivemanagementhadbeenanalyzed. Its aidthat its country had a clear perception of the importance of collective management, not only from the point of view of theorybutalsobecauseithadtesteditspracticaladvantages:Uruguayhadcopyrightand relatedrightsmanagementsocietiesthathadbeenactiveformorethan60years, and the General Association of Authors of Uruguay, with its Argentine counterpart, h adforyears been holding training courses for the officials of societies. The Delegation pointed out that the option of the property ofthe results a chieved to date by the Division foreshadowed still more successinits futureoperation, and with that it mindit requested WIPO to con tinuetosupportitswork.
- 99. The Delegation of Chinathanked WIPO for its assistance in helping its country in establishingthefirstcollectivemanagementformusicalworksandreportedthatthesociety hadbeeninplacefor10yearsandinfu lloperation. Itsaidthatrecent developments, such as multimedianetworksinstitutionsandnewmediaanditsrespectiveauthors, hadtobetaken intoaccountinthisfieldofcollectivemanagement. The Delegation pointed out that the cooperation relations between developed anddevelopingcountriesneededtobereinforced. Itadd edthatrightsofperformerswereto beaddressedandanadequateinfrastructurewastobesetup. Itreiterated the readiness of its $country to work in this area. The Delegation suggested that WIPO further strengthen its {\it the New Market Ne$ cooperationwithIFPI,IFRRO,CI SACandotherinterestednon -governmentalorganizations.

- 100. TheDelegationoftheRussianFederationinformedonthelegislativedevelopmentsin itscountry.InOctober 2002,thecopyrightissueshadbeenexaminedatthegovernmental levelin ordertobringthelawinlinewiththeinternationaltreatiesandtobeinapositionto accedetotheWTO,theRomeConvention(1961)andtheWCTandWPPT.TheDelegation expresseditssupportforcollectivemanagementinthiscontextandadvisedthatt hePatent Officewouldhaveresponsibilityforcoordinatingdevelopmentsincludingtheimplementation ofasingleregistrythathadrecentlybeenapproved.
- 101. TheDelegationofMalaysiaconsidereditnecessarytomaintainworkoncollective managementontheagendaoftheCooperationforDevelopmentSector.Itsaidthatexchange ofexperienceshouldbeencouragedandmoreregionalcooperationandseminarstobe undertaken,suchastheeventheldinIndiainDecember2001.TheDelegationreferre dtothe ASEANstudyonpossibleregionalcooperationincollectivemanagementproducedbyWIPO andofferedtoholdameetinginitscountrytodiscussthatpreliminarydraftstudy.Malaysia wouldwishthataworkshopbeheldasafollowup.
- 102. TheDelegationofMalawiconsideredthatcollectivemanagementwasstillinitsinfancy inAfrica, and that training incollective management was an essential element in development. Currently the collective management organization of Malawi (COSOMA) had been providing training on an adhoc basis. It mentioned the organization of a two -week training course on copyright and collective management as the type of training that was required in the circumstances and expressed the wish that the course be programmed to take place annually. The Delegation reported that some African societies experienced problems of sharing copyright documentation required for their collective management operations. It suggested the establishment of an etwork to overcome the problems and facilitate electronic transmission of information between African collective management organizations. It supported WIPO activities in this area.
- 103. The Delegation of Algeria pointed to the rich content of the document submitted by the International Bureau, which encouraged support for the strengthening of collective copyright andrelatedrightsmanagementactivities indeveloping countries. Although Algeria had since 1973, the year of the creation of the ONDA, accumulated a wealth of collectivemanagement experience, it was essential to consolidate those foundations and pass through a qualitative stagewhichwouldinvolveupgradingmanagementtoolsinlinewiththeevolutionof informationtechnologyandchangesininternationalstanda rds.TheDelegationmentioned certainobjectivesforcollectivemanagement, namely the modernization of computer tools, the necessity of taking due account of the collective management of related rights-which hadexistedinitscountrysince1998 —and theneedtoprovideforproperstafftraining. The Delegationreferredtothesub -regionalworkshoponthecollectivemanagementofcopyright andrelatedrightsthathadbeenheldinRabatinJune2001, attheendof which aplan of actionhadbeenadopt edinfavorofEgypt,Lebanon,Morocco,Tunisiaanditsowncountry. Itrequestedafollow -uptothatplanofactionthathighlightedtheregionaldimension.It wishedtoseecooperationactivitiesfordevelopingcountriescontinueinsuchawayasto affordbetterprotectiontocopyrightandrelatedrights, developcollective management and createanenvironmentconducivetointellectualcreation. The Delegation was pleased to note the cooperation agreement concluded between WIPO and CISAC.

- 104. The Delegation of Egyptsaid that it fully supported the policy of WIPO in the field of collective management of copyright and related rights in favor of developing countries which it considered as a tool for economic, so cial and cultural development of countries. It referred to the plan of action adopted at the sub regional workshop in Moroccoin June 2001 and was looking forward to its implementation. The Delegation emphasized the importance of increasing cooperation, exchange of views and experience between countries of the region in the field of collective management.
- 105. The Delegation of Saint Lucia congratulated WIPO on the excellent work it had do net o dateinthefieldofcollectivemanagementofcopyrightandrelatedrights. Thanks collaborationbetweentheregionandWIPO,Saint Luciahadmovedinrelativelyshortperiod oftimefromacountrywherenosystemformanagingsuchrightswasinplacetoonewherea strongcollectivemanagementenvironmentwasnowestablished.It consideredtheCaribbean Copyright Link (CCL) to be an innovative and successful solution for the Caribbean region as $awhole and added that WIPO should accelerate and deepen its support for the CCL. The {\it the content of the co$ Delegationfeltitwasnecessarytoconsolidateth efirstphaseoftheRegionallyFocused ActionPlan(RFAP)fortheCaribbeanregionandtomoveintothesecondphasewhich shouldincludeassistingnewsocietiesintheregion, for instance in Suriname and Antigua and Barbuda, where local initiatives were already in motion. It noted that several countries in the regionincludingDominica,Saint KittsandNevisandSaint VincentandtheGrenadines,had no infrastructure and proposed that WIPO and the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States(OECS)consider acollaborativeinitiativeundertheOECS -WIPOAgreementtoestablish collectivemanagementsocietiesinOECScountries.Finally,theDelegationnotedthatitwas essentialtoadevelopmentprojecttoprogrameducationalseminarsdirectedspecifically at usersofcopyrightedworksandthepublicasameanstoraisecopyrightawarenessbutalsoto facilitatetheactivitiesofnewcollectivemanagementorganizations.
- 106. TheDelegationofNamibiaexpresseditsfullsupportfortheWIPOprogramf or establishmentofcollectivemanagementorganizationsindevelopingcountries.Itreferredto thecollectingsocietyofitscountrywhichhadcomeintoexistencenine yearsagoandwhich wasincompleteoperation.Itsaidthatthenationalcollectivem anagementorganization providednotonlyroyaltiesbutalsomoralsupporttoauthorsandcomposers,whowere encouragedtocreatemoreworks.TheDelegationwasoftheviewthatactivitiesrelatedto collectivemanagementshouldbeextendedbeyondthefi eldofmusicalworkstoother categoriesofworks,suchasliteraryworks,filmsandphotographs.
- 107. TheDelegationofThailandcongratulatedWIPOforitsworkandthankedallMember StatesforelectingThailandasVice -ChairofthisPermanentC ommitteeMeeting.It underlinedtheimportantroletobeplayedbyWIPOinestablishingcollectivemanagement organizations.Itmentionedproblemsofconvincingmusicuserstopayroyalties.Itsaidthat suchproblemdidnotconfinetoitscountry.Iwasoftheviewthattherightsownersand usersshouldbemoreinformedoftheirrightsandobligations,andexperiencefromother countrieslikeAustraliaorfromEuropecouldbenefitdevelopingcountries.Itsuggestedthat astudycouldbeundertakenontheexperienceofcountriesincontrollingthepotential monopolyofauthorsofmusic.TheDelegationfurthersupportedWIPO'sassistanceto organizeaworkshopinoneoftheASEANcountriesonaregionalframeworkoncollective management,asafollow -uptotheDraftPreliminaryStudyontheFeasibilityofthe EstablishmentofanASEANCollectiveManagementSystem.

- 108. TheDelegationofIndiajoinedtheDelegationofMalaysiainpraisingtheRegional SymposiumonCollectiveManagementofCopy rightandRelatedRightsforAsiaandthe PacificCountriesheldinMumbaiinDecember 2001.Itrecalledthatitscountryhad flourishingsoftware,multimedia,music,filmandpublishingindustries,andthatitwas importantfordevelopingcountriestore cognizetheeconomicopportunitiesthatthese copyrightbasedindustriesrepresent.TheDelegationstatedalsothat,totakeadvantageofa country'spotentialinthesefields,thoseindustriesmustbegivenadequateprotection.It expressedthewishtha tWIPOhelpdevelopingcountriestoestablishtheinfrastructureto provideprotectionfortheintellectualpropertyrightsofthoseindustries.Itsaidthatcollective managementactivitiesshouldbekeptontheagendaoftheCooperationforDevelopment.
- 109. The Representative from the European Patent Office (EPO) referred to the conclusions of a report of an ASEAN meeting on copyright, related rights and collective management. One of the conclusions drawn in that report was that national law swere required to balance the monopoly rights of collective management or ganizations. It quoted the example of the German legislation.
 - 110. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocument PCIPD/3/5.

<u>AgendaItem7: TheDigitalAgenda:ImplementationoftheWIPOCopyrightTreaty(WCT) andtheWIPOPerformancesandPhonogramsTreaty(WPPT)</u>

- 111. TheitemwasdiscussedonthebasisofdocumentPCIPD/3/9.
- 112. TheDelegationofCostaRicasaidthatits countryattachedgreatimportancetothe entryintoforceofthetwotreaties, and haddeposited its instruments of ratification in the course of the current year. The treaties had made provisions available that would not only protect the interests of creators but also make it possible for works to be created, distributed and monitored in the digital environment with greater confidence. It added that their implementation would generate new benefits for States by establishing an adequate legal framework that would guarantee for eigninest mentand contribute to the promotion of electronic commerce. It encouraged countries that had not yet ratified the treaties to do so, and the International Bureautocontinue its work of advice and assistance with a vito bringing about their implementation.
- 113. TheDelegationofSwedencongratulatedWIPOforthecomprehensiveanddiversified activities undertakentopromotetheWCTandWPPT.Itunderlinedtheimportanceofthese treaties for the protection of local creativity and folklore. The Delegation expressed its appreciation for the efforts of the International Bureautoevaluate the economic importance of intellectual property and, in particular, copyright in the national economy. It unders cored the efficiency of such studies in convincing reluctant policy makers to have a positive attitude towards in tellectual property. Referring to paragraph 29 of document PCIPD/3/9, the Delegation pointed out that the implementation of the set reaties would not revolution, but the most important is sue swere to ensure proper implementation of technical protection measures and rights management information. Sufficient policy options were available that would bring balance in the benefits.
- $114. \ \ The Delegation of the United States of America expressed satisfaction about the entering into force of the WCT and WPPT this year, and appreciated the efforts of WIPO to the property of the WCT and the WCT and the property of the WCT and t$

promotetheirimplementation. Itaddedthatitwas gratifying to see the universal acc of these treaties, since more than half of the members were from developing countries, 40% from countries intransition and only 5% from developed countries. In this regard, the Delegation noted the leadership taken by developing countries in embracing the digital age, hence, showing their recognition that the way forward in economic development began with creating a conducive environment. The Delegation further pointed out that the critical phase with regard to the set wo treaties was the implementation and enforcement of the established standards so that the Internet and digital environment would be protected against piracy. Finally, the Delegation stated that it looked forward to working with current and new members of the treaties to ensure as eamless and piracy - free web.

- 115. The Delegation of Sudan commended the many positive aspects and advantages which canbedrawnfromtheWCTandtheWPPT.However,someissuesremainedoutstanding andtheyweretobedealtwithasamatterofpri orityinthepursuitofinternationalprotection ofcreativeworks and performances. The Delegation expressed that access to digital networks wasaprerequisiteforawellfunctioningsystemfortheprotectionofintellectualpropertyina digitalenviron ment, but access to digital networks was not affordable to many developing countries, particularly in Africa. Thus it stood as a stumbling block on the way of these countries to make real progress towards establishing institutions of creators, performance sand producerscapableofmeetingthechallengesofthedigitalenvironmenttotheextentthatthey can explore advantages of the treaties to derive benefits. Building digital networks required expertiseandknow -how, connectivity and basic -infrastructure requirements which were not withineasyreachofmanycountries. The Delegation believed that the protection provided under the WCT and the WPPT was equally important to be extended to traditional knowledgeandexpressionsoffolkloresincetheydepicte danembodimentofcreativityand inventiveness. The Delegation emphasized that the work of the Intergovernmental Committee on Traditional Knowledge, Genetic Resources, and Folkloreshould be supported and guided addedthatwhiletheWCTandWPPTprovided towardsdeliveringconcreteoutcomes.It protectiontocertainworksoffolkloreandarts, itremained the concern that obligations under those treaties would not have the desire deffects by many developing countries, that local creatorsandtraditional knowledgeholdersgenerateincomeandbenefitsfromtheirworksin ordertoimprovetheirsocialliving conditions. The Delegation remained sceptical asto whetherinvestmentsinaconsiderablenumberofdevelopingcountrieswouldleadtojob creation for the local population in substantial proportions, because more often investors were keenonguaranteeingtheabundanceofmoderninfrastructure,advancetechnologyand expertisetoruntheirinvestments, and hence the preferable option would be to import hem fromabroad.
- 116. The Delegation of the Republic of Koreaacknowledged the important role which the WCT and WPPT can play in the digitalera. It observed that the fact that the membership of these treaties so far was largely composed of deve loping countries and countries in transition sent both a positive and negative signal. The Delegation requested WIPO to encourage developed countries to join these treaties.
- 117. TheDelegationofAlgeriahighlightedtheadvantagesofaccessiont ototheWCT and WPPT as a mean sofmeeting the challenges represented by the spread of digital technology, preserving the interests of creators in order to protect the magainst unauthorized use of their works and promoting creativity. It announced Alger ia's firm intention to adaptit slegal system to the new technological environment and to international standards in order to be in a position to accede to the WCT and WPPT. It encouraged WIPO to pursue its cooperative

workfortheimplementationofthet reaties, not only interms of the upgrading of legislation but also to create an environment conducive to the observance of the rights enshrined in them.

- 118. TheDelegationofSenegalcommendedWIPOfortheactivitiescarriedoninconnection withtheimplementationoftheWCTandWPPT.ItannouncedSenegal'sratificationofthe treatiesanditsintentiontoaskWIPOfortechnicalassistanceinadaptingitslegislationto theirprovisions. TheDelegationwonderedatthesmallnumberofratificat ionsonthepartof industrializedcountries. ItinsistedbywayofconclusionontheneedforWIPOtofocusits actiononpublicizingthetreatiesandbringingthemtothenoticeoftheinterestedparties, namelycreators, who quite of tenhadonly avery limited knowledge of the rights written into international instruments for their benefit.
- 119. The Secretariat, responding to issues raised, said that the International Bureau, and in particularitsCopyrightSector,wouldcontinuetopromotethe treaties, and organize for a etc. onimplementationissues, also targeting developed countries to the extent required. The fact that, for instance, countries in Western Europehadnot become parties to the treaties so far, wasapparentlyduetotheneedt ogofirstthrougharegionalcopyrightharmonizationprocess withintheEuropeanUnionandtosubsequentlyadoptnationalimplementinglegislation.He agreed with the Delegation of Senegal in that, in addition to establishing implementing legislation,mo rehadtobedonetosensitizethegeneralpublic,aswellasprofessionalcircles concerned in WIPO Member States, and raise awareness about the benefit of a modern and the concerned in thcopyrightprotectionsystem.WIPO'sCooperationforDevelopmentProgramextendedto these areas, as well. In response to the Delegation of Sudan, heagreed that the new protection provided for by the WPPT for performances of folklored idnot totally accommodate the need of the control of ttoprotectfolkloreatinternationallevel. The International Bureauhad viewoftheDelegationthattheIntergovernmentalCommitteedealingwiththisimportant issueshouldbringaboutconcreteresults. Withrespecttothebalancebetweentechnical measurestocontrolaccesstocopyrightedmaterialandlimi tations and exceptions for users, which national legislation could provide for, he confirmed that the TRIPS Agreement provisiononlimitationsandexceptionshadbeentakenoverinthetwoWIPOtreaties; however, balancing these rules against the treaties' provisionsonlegalprotectionforaccess controltechniqueswasanewchallenge, which the International Bureautookinto accountin itslegislativeassistanceaswellasinitsworkshopsetc.onimplementationissues.
 - 120. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocument PCIPD/3/9.

- 121. DiscussionswerebasedondocumentPCIPD/3/4.
- 122. TheDelegationofSpainexpresseditsinterestintheautomation project,recognizingit asameansofimprovingworkintheIP offices.Itmadereferencetothepositiveimpactof theSeminarheldinBrazilonIndustrialProperty,thePCTandelectroniccommunication. TheDelegationreiteratedSpain'sinterestinau tomationprojectsasatoolforexchangeof informationonpatentsandlodgingofpatentapplicationselectronically,aswellasalinkfor theLACregionwiththePatentOfficeoftheUnitedStatesofAmericaandtherestofthe world.

- 123. TheD elegationofCubaexpressedappreciationforthetechnicalsupportprovidedby WIPOtotheLACregion,urgingthenationalofficestoplayamoreproactiverole.Itthanked theOrganizationforthedeploymentoftheWIPO NETsystem,andsuggestedthatthe equipmentforitsuseshouldbeintegratedinnationaloffices'existingtechnological infrastructures,whichwouldmakeitpossibleforthepatentandtrademarksoftwaretobe installed.Itwelcomedandsupportedtheelectronicpublicationsproject,whic hwouldgive Ibero-Americancountriesthebenefitoffull -textpublicationofpatentdocumentsinSpanish, andalsotheworkdoneonthatprojectbyWIPOandtheSpanishPatentandTrademark Office.
- 124. TheDelegationofSaintLuciaexpressedi tscommitmenttotheautomationof IP offices,asitimprovedtheproductivityoftheoffices.Itexpressedsatisfactionwiththe RegionalTrademarkInformationSystemfortheCaribbean,whichhadalreadybeendeployed intheIP officesofBarbados,Trini dadandTobagoandJamaica,pointingoutthatthesame systemwouldbeinstalledinSaint Luciawithinthenextcoupleofmonths.TheDelegation, however,expressedconcernregardingtheWIPO NETkitwhichcouldnotbeusedforother activitiesintheoffi ce,thusplacingastrainonsmallIPoffices.IturgedtheInternational Bureautoinitiatediscussionswithsuppliersofthekitsothatthisproblemcouldberesolved.
- 125. The Delegation of Ethiopia thanked WIPO for all the technical assistan ceand capacity building support provided to Ethiopia over the years and expressed particular appreciation for the inclusion of Ethiopia in the six pilot countries for the IPO ffice Automation Projectin Africa.
- 126. The Delegation of Nicaraguapo intedatthe importantin vestment Nicaraguahad made inhuman resources for automation of its IP office. In this regardit paid tribute to Sweden and Spain for their assistance in favour of this project. The Delegation expressed support for the WIPO NET project.
- 127. The Delegation of Colombia thanked WIPO for its work in the LAC region which resulted in Colombia being one of these vencountries where WIPO sentautomation missions. Its tressed the importance of strengthening the IPO ffices and urged for the signing of more cooperation agreements with other developed countries wishing to assist developing countries.
- 128. TheDelegationofKenyarecognized,andexpressedsatisfactionwith,thelongstanding cooperationbetweenWIPOandKeny aandmadeparticularreferencetotheautomation assistancedatingbacksince1995.InthisregardtheDelegationexpresseditsthankstoWIPO forKenyabeingselectedasoneofthesixpilotcountriesfortheIPOfficeAutomationProject inAfrica.The DelegationalsonotedwithappreciationtheassistancereceivedfromWIPO throughtheNFAPsandtheWIPO NETprojectandreiterateditscommitmentforfuture cooperation.
- 129. The Delegation of Nigeriaack nowledged with appreciation the assistance given by WIPO to the Nigerian Patents, Designs and Trademarks Office as well as the deployment of the WIPO NET kits. It requested that this assistance be extended to the Nigerian Copyright Commission and the two approved collectings ocieties based in Nigerian.

- 130. TheDelegationofJamaicaexpressedsatisfactionwiththeassistancegivenbyWIPO andreferredtothemeetingheldinBarbadosin2001whichhadresultedinthedevelopment anddeploymentofthetrademarkssystemfortheCaribbean.It thankedWIPOfor undertakingthethreeautomationmissionstotheJamaicanIPofficeandtheassistance providedthroughtheNFAP.TheDelegationemphasizedthatautomationandtraining remainedpriorityareasforJamaica,andspecificactivitieswouldb epursuedthroughthe NFAP.
- 131. The Delegation of Egyptunder lined the importance of the automation project as it contributed to the effectiveness of the IP offices. It thanked the International Bureau for its technical support in this regard which is characteristic to the automation of the Egyptian Patent Office. The Delegation emphasized the need for an exchange of information in this area.
- 132. The Delegation of Peruthanked WIPO for the automation of IPO ffic es and expressed its appreciation regarding the next WIPO NET Seminar to be held in Peru. It expressed Peru's interestin, and support for, the electronic publication of industrial property information.
- 133. TheDelegationofMozambiquepointedat thesignificantimpactwhichautomationcan haveonthemodernizationofIPofficesindevelopingcountriesandparticularlyin Mozambique,addingthatMozambiquehadinvestedmuchintermsofinfrastructureand administrativearrangementsfortheWIPO NETproject.InthesameregardtheGovernmentof Mozambiquewascommittedtoconductinganationalsurveyofitsindustrieswiththeaimof possibleadaptationtonewtechnologies.Inthatway,theinformationtechnologythatwould beprovidedby WIPONETp roject,wouldbeacrucialcontribution.Thechallengefacing WIPOandtheIPofficeswasthetransformationofthepaper -basedofficeswithinadequate infrastructureandtechnicaltoolsintomodernfullyautomatedoffices.TheDelegation stressedthenee dforhumanresourcetrainingbeingoneofthekeycomponentsforthe automationprojects.TheDelegationreiteratedMozambique'sinterestinbenefitingfromthis Program.
- 134. TheDelegationofSweden,referringtoparagraph22ofdocumentPCIPD /3/4, expressedsatisfactionthattheautomationactivitiescoveredbothindustrialpropertyoffices andthecollectivemanagementsystems.Pointingoutthatalthoughtherewasnoregistration perseinthecollectingsocieties,theyhadtohandleenormou samountsofinformationon rights,worksanduserswhichwouldbefacilitatedthroughautomation.TheDelegation consideredofficeautomationasanimportantelementfortheIPofficesalsointhelightof Article62oftheTRIPSAgreementwhichstipulat edthatintheacquisitionofIPrightsthere hadtobeprocedureswhichpermitthegrantingorregistrationoftherightwithinareasonable periodoftimesoastoavoidunwarrantedcurtailmentoftheperiodofprotection.
- 135. TheRepresentativ eofOAPIexpressedhisgratitudetoMr. CasteloandtheDirector GeneraloftheFrenchInstituteofIndustrialPropertyfortheirsupportandadviceinthe implementationoftheautomationofOAPIfromthereceptiontothepublicationofitsofficial IndustrialPropertyGazette.HeindicatedtheparticularinterestofOAPIintheautomationof itsMemberStates'officesforacloserworkingrelation.HeurgedWIPOtotakethese concernsintoconsiderationastheautomationofthenationalofficesandal inkagetothe OAPIsystemswouldbringclosercooperationandintegrationinintellectualpropertyissuesin theregion.

- 136. The Representative of ARIPO reiterated the importance which ARIPO attached to the automationofintellectualpropertyoff ices,particularlythatofitsSecretariatinHarareandits MemberStates, and thanked WIPO for the successful implementation of the WIPO projectinitsSecretariat.ARIPOwaslookingforwardtothesuccessfulimplementationofthe automationprojects in Kenya, Lesotho, Zimbabwe and Namibia. The Representative urged WIPO to accelerate the development of the software for deployment in the automationprojectsinitsMemberStatessothattheycouldtakeadvantageoftheITsystemsandsothat $an online\ link between the ARIPO database and those of Member States would be$ established. This was particularly desirable as ARIPO's own POLITEs of tware (developed and the property of the property ofbyEPO)wasbeingtestedandwouldbeoperationalbyJanuary 2003. The Representative referredtot hefiveyearinformationtechnologyplan(ARIVISION)adoptedlastyearin NovemberbyitsAdministrativeCouncilwhich,buildingonWIPO NETandPOLITE, sought $to ensure that ARIPO would be ready for electronic filing by the year 2006. That year was {\it the transfer of the transfer of$ chosenspecificallybecause, firstly, by 2006 the majority of ARIPO's Member States would havetocomplywiththeTRIPSAgreementand,secondly,underthePatentLawTreaty (PLT), some IP of fices might cease to accept applications in paper form by June 2, 2005.
- 137. The Secretaria twelcomed the constructive and encouraging remarks and comments of the Delegations on this item and reiterated WIPO's commitment with respect to implementation of the Intellectual Property Office Automation Project. It informe dthe Committee that the deployment of the automation project in Africa was beginning with Kenya, one of the pilot countries, in November 2002.
 - 138. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocument PCIPD/3/4.

- 139. DiscussionswerebasedondocumentsPCIPD/3/7andPCIPD/3/8.
- 140. The Delegation of India highlighted the fact that since India's accession in December 1998, Indiah adwitnessed the highest growth rates in terms of use of the PCT system. More and more sectors of the population: researchers, inventors, companies and universities, had been using the PCT system for seeking patent protection abroad. Thus figures in the filing of international applications had doubled every year. The Delegational so stressedthattodate, Indiahademergedasthethirdlargestuserinthedevelopingworld, the fourthlargestamongdevelopingcountriesandcountriesintransitionandthe worldwide. Furthermore, the Indian Council of Scientific Research ranked second among the analysis of the contraction of theprincipalusers of the PCT in the developing world. The Delegation expressed its gratitude to WIPOandinparticulartoMr.Casteloandhiscolleagues fortheorganizationofseminarsand workshopsinIndiawhichhadbeenverybeneficialforallstakeholdersinthesystem. The Delegationmaderecommendationsforthemaintainingandstrengtheningofcooperationto supplementeffortsoftheIndianGovern ment.Itfurtherrecommendedtheorganizationof specializedtrainingprogramsgearedtocivilservants,policymakers,academicians, enforcementofficials, patentattorneys, teachers and students.
- 141. The Delegation of the Russian Federation underlined the importance that the Government of the Russian Federation attached to the WIPOT reaties including the PCT. The Delegation stated that given the success of the implementation of the PCT in most countries, it was important to promote the use of the PCT indeveloping countries and countries in

transition. The Delegation recommended to reduce PCT fees for developing countries and countries in transition and called on WIPO for greater assistance in the areas of seminars,workshopsandmissions. TheDelegationstatedthatafeereductionwouldallowthose countries to devote finances to their own national systems. The Delegational so recommendedthatanelectroniclibrarybecreatedinordertoacceleratetheimplementationof the PCT. The acces stothat library should be facilitated for their patent and trademark of fices aswellasforstakeholdersinthesystem. Thequestion of financing would need to be addressedsincethedocumentscontainedintheelectroniclibrarywouldneedtobetransla ted into Chinese and Russian. The Delegation further recommended to establish cooperationlinkstoenhancetheefficiencyofpatentofficesintheprocessingofapplications. Italso calledontheInternationalBureauforassistancethroughexpertsinth eareaofevaluationand transfer of technology. The Delegation thanked the International Bureau for its cooperationand assistance especially in the field of the PCT.

- 142. The Delegation of Moroccothanked WIPO for the cooperation extended to Mo roccoin theareaofthePCT.TheDelegationstatedthattheGovernmentofMoroccowasnegotiating withexportersandreiteratedthatitwouldreinforcecooperationwiththeInternationalBureau inordertopromoteawarenesssoastoenhancethesuccesso fthePCT.TheDelegation describeditscountry'spositiveexperiencewiththeMadridSystem.Thesystemhadworked well,inparticular,asreflectedintheincreaseduseandprotectionofforeigntrademarksin Morocco. Unfortunately, the same could not besaidinthereversedirectionwithrespectto national trade marks. The Delegation therefore commended the International Bureau for the property of the prreferringtotheunderutilizationoftheMadridSystembynationalenterprisesinmany developing countries. The Delega tion indicated that its Government was already starting to work with national enterprises, especially exporters, in building awareness about the MadridSystemandthatitwishedtostrengthensuchactivities, incooperation with WIPO, so as to correct the imbalanced escribed and ensure that national enterprises would also be able to take betteradvantageofthebenefitsofferedbythesystem.
- 143. The Delegation of Cubaunderlined the excellent work done by the Developing Countries(PCT)Divisione specially with respect to its training course on PCT -EASYgiven to the staff of the Office and users of the system. The Delegational so expressed thanks to the account of the property of tDivisionforitsgeneralassistanceintheimplementationoftheTreatyandstressedthepoi nt that Developing Country Member States needed to participate more actively in the PCTSAFEproject, which would allow for the filing of international applications on line. The DelegationalsothankedtheDevelopingCountries(MadridandTheHagueSyste ms)Division for the assistance and cooperation they had provided to its country. The Delegation expresseditsappreciationforthecontinuedsupportofferedconcerningtheimplementationand administrationoftheMadridSystem.TheDelegation,inpartic ular,congratulatedWIPOfor havingorganizedearlierthisyeartheWorkshopontheImplementationandAdministrationof the Madrid System for developing countries and countries in transition party to the system.
- 144. The Delegation of the United States of America was pleased to announce the passage of legislation to ratify the Madrid Protocol and looked forward to participating in the Madrid Systemonce the needed procedures were put into place within the next year.
- 145. TheDelegationo fSudanmentionedthatalthoughSudanwasconsideredaleast developedcountry(LDC),ithadstartedtheimplementationofthePCTintheearly1990's andreceivednumerousrequeststhroughthereceivingoffice. TheDelegationfurtherstated that certain applicants and inventors have made enquiries with respect to the secrecy and confidentiality of the PCT system. The Delegation expressed the hope to receive the

necessaryassistanceinimprovingtheservice. The Delegation emphasized the fact that despite the 75% reduction of certain PCT fees, the amount was still abunden some one for applicants from Sudan. The Delegation requested a further review of the feesy stem.

- 146. The Delegation of Egyptstated that Egypt was proceeding to the accession nofthePCT andexpresseditsgratitudetotheInternationalBureauforthecooperationeffortsfacilitating accession. The Delegation made special reference to the national colloquium held in Egyptin 2001 which had been avery successful event. The De legationreiteratedthateffectiveuseof thesystemwouldbereflectedintheabilityofdevelopingcountriestotakeonquestions related to traditional knowledge. The Delegational soma dereference to the proposal to includetraditionalknowledgeinth epriorartsystemofthePCT.Itstatedthatthisproposal wasveryusefulandcouldhelpextenduseofthesystembydevelopingcountries. The Delegation also recalled that its country was party to both the Madridand The Hague systemsand expressed it scomplete support for the statement made by the Delegation of Morocco. TheMadridandTheHaguesystemswereunderutilizedbynationalenterprisesindeveloping countries, and WIPO needed to further increase its cooperation activities to assist exporters and manufacturers in Egypts othat the yould make better use of those systems, especially as farastrademarkanddesignprotectionabroadwasconcerned. The Delegation hoped that an increaseduseofthesystemsmightalsoleadtoaddressingissuesrela tedtotraditional knowledge.
- 147. The Delegation of Nicaraguas aid that accession to the PCT was intended with a view to promoting national and innovative development. The Delegation expressed the hope that the instrument of accession could soon be transmitted to WIPO and that WIPO would assist in the implementation of the treaty.
- 148. The Delegation of Kenya emphasized the fact that the Government of Kenya recognized intellectualpropertyrightsasanimportanttoolfortradeandasac ornerstoneformodern economic policy. The Delegation added that Kenyahad put the necessary machinery in place fortheeffectivemanagementofintellectualpropertyrightsinthecountry. Itunderlined the factthatKenyaispartytomanyintellectual propertytreaties, including the PCT and the MadridSystem, and that most aspects of industrial property, copyright and plant varieties could be protected in Kenya. The Delegation advocated the need for WIPO to ensure that the properties of the protected of tintellectualpropertysystem flect the needs of developing countries, in particular as regards theimpactonthesocio -economicdevelopmentofthesecountriesandtoavoidconflictwith publichealth. The Delegation added that new intellectual property legislation had been adopted to accommodate changes on the local, regional and international scenes, thus improving and strengthening the protection, enforcement and management of intellectual propertyrightsinitscountryandensuring conformity within ternational obligations. The Delegationalsohighlightedtheimportanceofthetechnicalinformationdisclosedinpatents documents and informed that KIPI has a Patent and Documentation Centre which houses over a part of the contract of the contr12milliondocumentsonpatentsfromallpartsoftheworld. The Delegat ioninformedthat one of the functions of KIPI was to provide patent information to the public from this database. Kenyahad continued to pursue international cooperation in the intellectual property fieldbybecomingpartytoseveralglobalprotectionsy stems, as well as to the WTO, and was currentlymakingeffortstoaccedetoothersuchmultilateralarrangements.
- 149. The Delegation of the Republic of Koreastated that during the last five years there had been are markable increase in PCT applications filed in the country. In the year 2001, nationals and residents of the Republic of Koreahad filed the highest number of international applications (2.318) filed indeveloping countries, placing the country in the eight position in

theworldint ermsofthenumberofPCTapplications. The Delegation further expressed its gratitude to WIPO for the efforts and cooperation in building awareness on the advantages of the PCT. The Delegation pointed out that the PCT fees never the less remained beyond the reach of most small and medium sized enterprises (SME) and individual inventors. The Delegation requested that consideration begiven to the reduction of PCT fees for SMEs and individual inventors. The Delegation announced that its country was in the process of acceding to the Madrid Protocol in the very near future.

- 150. TheRepresentativeofARIPOreferredtothelinkbetweenARIPOandtheHarare ProtocolandtheevolutionoftheaccessiontothePCTbyARIPOMemberStates(from3 to 10),pr eandposttheformallinkbetweenARIPOandtheHarareProtocol.Hestatedthat helookedforwardtothedaythatallARIPOMemberStateswouldbepartytothePCT.The RepresentativeexpressedthankstoWIPOfortheassistancerenderedtoMemberStates and ARIPOitselfintheareaofPCT.HereiteratedthefactthatdespitethenumerousPCT seminars,thenumberofPCTapplicationsemanatingfromtheregionstillremainedsmall. TheRepresentativerequestedthattheDevelopingCountries(PCT)Division considerthe organizationofmoreseminarsinthenexttwoyears.
 - 151. The Committee noted with appreciation the information contained indocuments PCIPD/3/7 and PCIPD/3/8.

- 154. The Delegation of Barbados, on behalf of GRULAC, expressed the desire that the Secretaria two uldin corporate and implement the various recommendation nsmaded uring the meeting of this Committee, in particular the need to increase all kind of resources for the cooperation for development activities. The Delegation concluded by noting that this fact should be keptin mind during the next meeting of the Program and Budget Committee.
- 155. TheDelegationofIndia,speakingonbehalfoftheAsiangroup,highlightedtheuseful discussionsthathadtakenplacebothintheplenaryandintheForumonStrategicIssuesfor theFuture.Thismeetinghad giventheopportunitytodiscussdifferentactivitiesinthe cooperationfordevelopmentsectorandtherelatedworkdonebyotherdivisionsofWIPOon development.TheDelegationexpresseditswishthattherecommendationsmadeduringthe meetingbeinco rporatedinthepoliciesofthecooperationprogramstostrengthenthem.

156. The Delegation of Chinahigh lighted as an important progress the format of the meeting. The Delegation further expressed its interest that in the future more issues sho included in the Forum to be discussed by delegations.

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157. Mr.RobertoCastelo,inhisclosingremarks,thankedtheCommitteeonbehalfofthe DirectorGeneral,forthewaythediscussionstookplace.Hehighlightedthefactthat,onthis occasion,adifferentformatforthesessionhadbeenadoptedandwelcomedbydelegations. Healsoreferredtothefactthatimportantconclusionshadbeenraisedfromtheforumthat shouldguidetheactivitiesofthesector.Hethankedalldelegationsf ortheirconstructiveand frankparticipationaswellastheChairforhercapacityandtheworkdoneinconductingthe meeting.
