### Intellectual Property Protection in Switzerland

n	1848	Birth of modern Switzerland (new Swiss Confederation)
n	1879	first Federal Law on trade marks
n	1888	first Federal Laws on patents and on industrial designs
n	1888	"Office of intellectual property" opened 6 employees budget: CHF 65'000 (USD 53'000)
n	1996	<b>Swiss Federal Institute of Intellectual Property</b>
n	2006	200 employees budget: CHF 55m (USD 45m)

### Switzerland in the international

- Member of EFTA, but not the EU
  - Situated in the centre of Europe
  - Export-oriented economy



# Switzerland and the Hague Agreement



- Joined in 1928
- Member of all three versions
- Among the first Contracting Parties to ratify the Geneva Act (2002)



Advantages of the Hague Agreement

- Agreement
  Access to protection in a number of important economies
- One Office (the International Bureau)
- One language
- One currency and a single set of fees
- Uniform dates of renewal
- Simplified management


Number of deposits by country of origin, 2000 - 2005

he Geneva Act - the Swiss Perspective

### Main motives to use the Hague system

- No alternative there is only one way to obtain protection in a number of states with one application
- Among the Contracting Parties are some of the most important export markets (Germany, France, Italy)
- Simplicity of the registration procedure

#### The Geneva Act – a step forward

- Sufficient flexibility for Contracting Parties with an examining office
- No safeguard clause
- Possibility for intergovernmental organisations to become members

### Some minor grievances of Swiss users

- No electronic filing
- Older registrations not accessible in the electronic register
- Parallel existence of three versions
- A number of important countries are still not members (USA, Japan, South America)

#### **Conclusions and outlook**

- The Hague Agreement offers a reasonably efficient way to obtain registration in multiple jurisdictions
- With the establishment of a link between the international registration system and the European Union's Community Design (expected in 2007), the geographical scope will be greatly enlarged and the attractiveness of the system further enhanced
