NEPAL

Inventive step:

- i) There is no definition of a person skilled in the art
- ii) There is no specific methodology employed for evaluating the inventive step
- iii) Prior art: Distinct between pre-existing and what the invention contribution a new matter

It is because of lack of policy, insufficient legislation, well established institution, guidelines, competent human resources and basic facilities.

Sufficiency of disclosure:

The invention must involve an inventive step which could not be obviously deduced by a person with average knowledge of the technical field. They are to be understood as searches for identifying companies/inventors who are active in a specific field of technology.

Process:

- 1. Receipt of an application with the fees of NRs. 2000/-
- 2. Investigation
 - a. Formality Examination
 - b. Substantive Search and Examination
 - c. Technical Committee
 - Department of Industry forms a Technical Committee comprising of experts from related government bodies, academic institutions (NAST, RECAST, College, etc.) and expert from private institution to examine patent document and other necessary steps.
 - d. The finding of the technical committee is communicated to the applicant who may amend the patent document accordingly.
 - e. Technical Committee may review, search and examination based on amended document.
 - f. On the recommendation by the Technical Committee the final decision on patent registration is taken by the Department of Industry.
 - g. The applicant shall pay the registration fee of NRs 10000/- for seven years.
 - h. The patent registration shall be published by the government of Nepal in the Nepal Gazette under the Patent, Design and Trademark Act 1965.
 - i. The patent shall be valid for a period of 7 years from the date of registration. The patent could be renewed in every seven years for two times.
